invitation to attend the national en-  
campment of the Grand Army of the  
Republic in Chicago next month.The new Hamburg-American line  
steamer Deutschland made her return  
trip from New York to Plymouth in  
five days, 14 hours and six minutes,  
despite two days of fog.Famine and pestilence are sure to  
strike the region of Tien Tsin soon.  
Hundreds of thousands of Chiramen  
are leaving their homes in the districts  
where fighting is going on, without  
means of support.The supplementary estimates neces-  
sitated by the prolongation of the war  
in South Africa amount to £11,300,000,

**ACTION SEEMS NECESSARY**In London Chinese Information Is Not  
Believed to Be Reliable.**A DISAGREEMENT AMONG ADMIRALS**Advance on Peking Will Be Delayed Unless the  
Powers Will Agree Upon a Supreme  
Leader for Combined Forces.London, July 26.—While the latest  
impression derived from the array of  
conflicting telegram is that a portion  
of the foreign colony at Peking may  
have escaped slaughter, until a recent  
date, the general consensus of the best  
informed opinion of Europe seems to  
continue to favor the acceptance of the  
new news and prompt action thereon,  
the contention being that the only pos-  
sibility of definitely ascertaining the  
truth is by allied commanders inquir-  
ing for themselves at Peking.Judging from the news from Tien  
Tsin, regarding divisions among the  
admirals there, the prospects for a  
speedy advance seem endangered, un-  
less the governments speedily agree  
upon a supreme leader.Telegrams from Shanghai report that  
Li Hung Chang has taken up his abode  
at the arsenal, as a measure of precau-  
tion.Reports are current that a number of  
missionaries, American or English, has  
been murdered in Shan-Si.Do Not Like the Edict.  
Washington, July 26.—Notwith-  
standing the signs of activity the state  
department had nothing this morning  
of interest touching the Chinese situa-  
tion.The imperial edict promulgated yester-  
day by the emperor, at Canton, has  
left a disagreeable impression here.  
Despite the Chinese minister's view to  
the contrary, this edict is looked upon  
as suspiciously like a preliminary to  
a formal declaration of war.The state department had no infor-  
mation today of any kind from the of-  
fice in China, and Acting Secretary  
Hill said the Chinese minister had re-  
ceived no communications from China.Rioting Breaks Out.  
London, July 26.—A dispatch from  
missionary sources, dated at Shanghai,  
says: "Rioting has broken out at Ai  
Yuen Fu, the capital of the province of  
Shan-Si. There are no details. Rioting  
has also occurred at Hui Loh,  
south of Chi Li. All missions were  
destroyed. Our friends escaped to the  
country but are still in great danger."

Panicky Conditions at Hankow.

St. Petersburg, July 26.—The Rus-  
sian agent at Hankow telegraphs, un-  
der date of July 22, as follows: "The  
foreigners here are in constant state of  
panic, owing to the hostility of the au-  
thorities. The American and British con-  
suls have recommended their respective  
people to send their families to Shang-  
hai. The viceroy has taken the neces-  
sary measures to protect the foreigners."The Russian minister at Seoul re-  
ports that a Russian detachment from  
Korai arrived at Peking Yang with  
the loss of 15 killed and many  
wounded. They fought their way  
through the opposing natives at the  
point of bayonets. General Grodekoff  
in a dispatch, dated Chabarovsk,  
states that a detachment of railway  
guards safely brought over 220  
persons and officials to Zargabait.A steamer with Russian troops  
aboard was bombarded by Chinese  
from the banks of the Yalu river. The  
Russian commander landed on the  
Chinese side of the river, attacked the  
Chinese forts in the face of a heavy  
fire. The Russians were repulsed. The  
Chinese lost 300 killed, while the  
Russians lost only seven. A desultory  
bombardment at Blagovostchensk is  
continued.

A Conference at Chicago.

Chicago, July 26.—Mr. Towne will  
be in this city tomorrow to confer with  
the members of the national commit-  
tee, who will arrive here for that  
purpose. The gentlemen composing  
the two committees to notify the candi-  
dates for president and vice-president,  
named by the Kansas City convention,  
will meet at the Grand hotel, Indian-  
apolis, on August 8.

Trouble at Panama.

Kingston, Jamaica, July 26.—Ad-  
vices from Colon announce that the  
governor General, Lord Lansdowne, has  
been heard the British cruiser  
Leader. So much disorder prevails  
at Panama that ninety marines have  
been landed from the Leader for the  
protection of the consulates.

Peace Reigns Again.

Washington, July 2.—The state de-  
partment has received a dispatch from  
Colonel General Guebara at Panama,  
announcing the collapse of the revolu-  
tionary movement there. The liberals  
unexpectedly surrendered and quiet  
now prevails at Panama.

Regis Acquitted.

Graguignan, France, July 26.—The  
trial of Max Regis and eleven of his  
friends here ended today with their  
acquittal. Regis is a notorious Jew  
baiter and the ex-mayor of Algiers.

Dead on Catalina Island.

Los Angeles, Calif., July 26.—Edward  
Fischer, of Whittier, Washington, who  
has been staying on Catalina is-  
land for the past six weeks, be-  
came unconscious while out fishing and  
died two hours later from Bright's  
disease.

Plot to Assassinate.

San Domingo, July 26.—A plot to  
assassinate the governor of Santiago,  
Roman Caceres, has been discovered  
and 25 conspirators are imprisoned.  
Several military officers are involved  
in the plot.

Colonel Liscum's Successor.

Washington, July 26.—Colonel  
Charles F. Bohe, who succeeded to the  
command of the Ninth Infantry at the  
death of Colonel Liscum, has been or-  
dered to proceed at once to China. He  
is now at Manila.

Chickens Burned Up.

Chicago, July 26.—A fire in the com-  
mission house of H. L. Brown & Co.  
caused a damage of \$505,000 and  
the death of 6,000 chickens. Three girls  
are reported missing but it is believed  
they escaped.**RIOT IN NEW ORLEANS.**Grew Out of the Killing of Policemen  
by Two Negro Toughs.New Orleans, July 6.—After being in  
the hands of lawless mobs for several  
hours New Orleans at daylight again  
assumed a peaceful and orderly con-  
dition. The disturbance occurred about  
five o'clock, when a white baker,  
whose name is unknown, was shot in  
the leg, while a crowd of rioters were  
chasing a gang of negroes. The rioting  
grew out of an intense feeling engen-  
dered by the murder of Captain Day  
and Patrolman Lamb and the wound-  
ing of Officer Mora by a desperate  
negro named Charles. One man has  
been killed in the riots and three  
others will die, and 15 are wounded.  
Reports have reached the police head-  
quarters from various sections of the  
city giving information of the beating  
of negroes. Work on the levee, where  
negro labor is largely employed, has  
been suspended. The big grocery and  
provision houses are also practically do-  
ing nothing, because they cannot get  
negro drivers to risk their lives. Gov-  
ernor Heard will call out the militia to  
preserve the peace of the city.**THE BOERS AND BRITISH.**A Stubborn Battle Between Them on  
the 24 and 25 Inst.London, July 26.—Lord Roberts re-  
ports that General Hunter's command  
was heavily engaged on July 24 and 25  
in the hills south of Bethlehem. The  
Boers were strongly entrenched and  
fought stubbornly throughout the 24th  
and compelled the British to retire  
from some of their positions with  
about fifty casualties. At last accounts  
General Hunter had worked around  
into the Brandwater basin in the rear  
of the Boers, while General Hector  
Macdonald and General Bruce Hamil-  
ton were blocking the outlets in front  
of the Boers who had evacuated their  
positions at Wineck.**THE GOLD DEMOCRATS.**SENSATIONAL SPEECH BY HALDEMAN  
AT INDIANAPOLIS.He Announces his Reasons for Support-  
ing McKinley in 1896 and Bryan  
in the 1900 Campaign.Indianapolis, July 25.—By a unani-  
mous vote of the national committee of  
the national democracy assembled  
here, the sense of the nation with re-  
gard to the recent mass meeting at the  
Plaza hotel in New York, was de-  
clared, as was also the plan to place  
the gold democratic ticket in the field  
this year.Of the 30 members of the national  
committee, there were present 19, sev-  
eral of them holding proxies. A sub-  
committee presented an address setting  
out the proposition for fusion and a  
third party ticket. The eastern and  
western men opposed the propo-  
sition. When it came to W. D. Halde-  
man, president of the Louisville Con-  
gress, a sensation was sprung.  
Halde-man, in 1896, contributed valua-  
ble aid in actively raising funds for  
the organization and maintenance of  
the work of the gold democracy. When  
he concluded his withdrawal from the  
room. In the course of his speech he  
said:"In 1896 I took upon myself abun-  
dantly from the Kentucky demo-  
crats and I did it because I believed,  
with my friend, Henry Watterson, in  
the righteousness of the refusal to com-  
promise with disunion on a question  
of sound and stable currency."  
"I believed then that the nation's  
honor in the stability of its money was  
involved, and if I believed that in this  
respect there was any danger now I  
would stand this day against the regu-  
lar democratic organization.""No sane man believes this danger  
exists. The free and unlimited coinage  
of silver and gold at the ratio of 16 to  
1 without the consent of any other  
nation, has been relegated to another  
generation by this nation. My heart  
goes out to those who struggle for lib-  
erty in every nation, and I applaud  
and approve the expression of the  
democratic platform sympathizing  
with the Boers, a people who may be  
robbed of free citizenship in order to  
help English greed to gather to its  
coffers the diamonds and gold of South  
Africa."I am compelled, with a sense of  
what is due to free America that I love  
to earnestly and actively support an  
American whom I believe loves his  
country and whom I believe the high-  
est and best type of American citizen,  
and thus believing, I shall vote for  
and support William Jennings Bryan."  
Halde-man then moved that the  
money now in the treasury of the gold-  
democratic organization be paid to  
"that splendid democrat, able leader  
of democrats of the east, David B.  
Hill, to use as his judgment may di-  
rect."When the vote on the question of  
fusion and a third ticket was taken,  
Gordon Woodbury of New Hampshire  
was the only committeeman present  
who favored a third party ticket. The  
vote stood 26 to 1 against the propo-  
sition. Woodbury at once moved that  
the vote be made unanimous and this  
was done. A committee of three was  
appointed to draft a manifesto setting  
out the position of the national  
democracy regarding the issue now be-  
fore the people.

Charles Tracey is Chairman.

Indianapolis, Ind., July 26.—At a  
meeting of the national committee of  
gold democrats today Chas. Tracey, of  
New York, was elected chairman to  
succeed Geo. Foster Peabody, who re-  
signed on account of ill health. It  
was decided to establish headquarters  
in Indianapolis. The committee ad-  
journing subject to the call of the  
chairman.

Activity at Mare Island.

Vallejo, Calif., July 26.—Orders  
have been received at the Mare Island  
navy yard to place in commission the  
colliers Justin and Nero, and prepare  
them to depart for Chinese waters  
with fuel for the fleet stationed there.

at his home here.**TRIED TO KIDNAP BOWLIN**The Kentucky Extradition Case Stirs  
Up the Town of Weston.**THEY ENTERED HIS HOUSE AT NIGHT**Constable Dykes, of Milton, Fires Several Shots  
at the Fugitive as He Escapes in  
Darkness From the Officers.Weston, Or., July 26.—Special to  
the East Oregonian.—This town has  
been stirred most profoundly by what  
many of the citizens of prominence re-  
gard as an outrage against law and de-  
cency, in an attempt to arrest J. B.  
Bowlin (Smith) in the dead of night,  
by officers from Milton, after Bowlin  
had been on the streets all day, and  
had not tried to escape, and could  
have been taken, if anyone had come  
with proper authority, in the day-  
time. It was by the presence of mind  
of his wife, who held a lighted lamp  
in the officers' faces, and thus allowed  
him to escape, that the forcible kid-  
napping of Bowlin was foiled. The  
story reads like a border romance,  
these being the details:Last night at about 10:30 o'clock,  
Constable J. W. Dykes, of Milton,  
and another officer, supposed to be  
Officer Campbell, of the same place,  
entered the house of Bowlin here, by  
going through a window, that had been  
left raised when the family retired.  
They found the family in bed, and  
presented a warrant signed by Governor  
Geer, for his arrest on a charge of ut-  
tering a false deed, in Whittier county,  
Ky. This warrant is supposed to have  
been taken surreptitiously from the  
court house in Portland.The warrant referred to in the one  
G. C. Moore, the Kentucky lawyer  
who came to get Bowlin, asked Sheriff  
Blakely for, to show to his lawyer,  
and then took away, both he and  
Officer Kendall, of Kentucky, disap-  
pearing—Ed.Mrs. Bowlin went out from the  
house, and, just as she entered again,  
she held a lighted lamp in the face of  
the officers, her husband making his  
escape in the darkness. One of the  
family held on to Constable Dyke's  
clothing, preventing him from going  
out for a moment, and, finally, re-  
flected his escape. The other officer  
went out through the window.

Fired Several Shots at Bowlin.

Constable Dykes so it stated by the  
family, fired twice at Bowlin as they  
were yet at the house, and then, fol-  
lowing him down the street, fired ad-  
ditional shots at him.

Citizens Armed to Protect Bowlin.

The sentiment of the prominent citi-  
zens is that the night attempt to ar-  
rest Bowlin, after he had been on the  
street all day, was not justifiable, and  
they have promised him protection. A  
number of them have volunteered to  
see that no officer arrests him, and will  
do so, if necessary, with armed force.

Device to Protect Bowlin.

For the purpose of protecting Bow-  
lin, a device has been devised, and  
Dave Lavender, to hold him against  
any other officer, a warrant was sworn  
out by Dr. J. A. Best, alleging insan-  
ity, and he was to be taken to Pendle-  
ton, where it was designed to place  
him under the protection of the courts.  
Although Bowlin had disappeared, the  
citizens knew where he had gone, and  
said they could produce him at any  
moment.

BOWLIN HAD BEEN GIVEN IMMUNITY.

Possessed a Copy of Judge Hartman's

Order for Officers to Let Him Alone.  
When Bowlin was released after the  
two habeas corpus proceedings, he was  
given a certified copy of Judge Hart-  
man's order, setting forth at length  
the facts and findings in this  
language: "And it is further ordered  
that upon the presentation by the pe-  
titioner of such certified copy to any  
officer of this court, that such officer  
immediately release the petitioner if  
held or detained by such officer upon  
the same cause of arrest for this same  
charge, and that such officer render to  
the petitioner immunity from arrest
