GENERAL NEWS.

The official journal at Rome has published a decree prohibiting the exportation of arms to China.

The project for building the American & Pacific railway from Banderos Bay, Mex., to Phoenix, has been abandoned.

The name of ex-Governor Wolcott, of Massachusetts, is under consideration as successor to General Draper as Ambassador to Italy.

General James H. Wilson, who arrived in New York, has been ordered to proceed immediately for San Francisco, en route for China.

Estes G. Rathbone, recently director-general of posts in Cuba, was arrested in Havana. Mr. Rathbone remained in the court room all day awaiting the decision of the judge in the matter of acceptance of Francisco Gamba, one of the richest Spanish merchants of Havana, as bondsman for \$125,000, the court refusing the bond.

The proposed banquet at Manila in commemoration of the amnesty proved a failure, owing to a misunderstanding between the Filipinos tendering it and the American civil and military authorities regarding speeches. After two hours' delay the banquet was finally finished. Commissioners Taft and Wright and Gen. MacArthur were in attendance. No political speeches were made.

A severe tornado passed through Trail county, N. D., Saturday, and across the river into Minnesota, where it split into two parts. The path of the storm in Trail county was 37 miles long and four miles wide. Three miles north of Caledonia the house of Thomas Everson was demolished and his 17-year-old son killed. At Caledonia the City hall and Presbyterian church were wrecked, and nearly every building in the town was injured. So far as known, the Everson boy was the only one killed.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

At a well attended meeting of the Silverton Hopgrowers' Association, 800 acres were represented. To pay \$3 1/3 cents per box for picking was the unanimous vote of all present. An agreement was signed by growers, under forfeiture of \$50, for paying a price exceeding this.

John Lelan Henderson swam across the Columbia river last Thursday evening, making the distance in 20 minutes. He started from the Davidson mill and landed just below the White Salmon wharf. Hansberry and Jukes accompanied him in a row boat and acted as time keepers.

The Sunset Telephone company's failure to reach a settlement of the strike of its employees, with consequent service to patrons, has led many business houses at Seattle to order their phones removed and to employ bicycle messengers. Resolutions adopted indicate that the business men are not pleased with the company's course, but side with the girls who are out.

A warrant is out for the arrest of R. E. Edwards, of Alsea. The complaint was sworn out by Deputy District Attorney Bryson, and it charges defendant with larceny and adultery. It alleges that he has in the past now living a wife from whom he has never been divorced. Edwards was married in Albany February 1 last to Miss E. S. Strake, of Alsea.

J. S. Stump, a pioneer river captain, has been selected to take charge of the steamer Billings today, July 30, at Pass on the upper Columbia, for the Central Navigation company. The Billings will enter general traffic service on the Columbia and Snake rivers at once. The freight for the present will be handled from the Parsons wharf at Big Eddy, above The Dalles and seven miles below Columbus.

ITALY'S KING WAS KILLED

A Weaver Shoots Him at Monza From Hatred of Monarchies.

ROME GREATLY STIRRED AT THE ACT

Prince Victor Emmanuel Already Wears the Crown of His Assassinated Sire; McKinley Sends Condolence.

Monza, Italy, July 30.—King Humbert was shot three times and killed here last night. The assassin was arrested and gave his name as Angelo Bressi.

Rome, July 30.—The excitement and emotion here consequent upon the assassination of King Humbert at Monza, last night, is momentarily intensifying. All the shops are closed.

Washington, July 30.—The United States government has been officially notified of the succession of Prince Victor Emmanuel to the throne of Italy. He is a son of the dead king.

Corfu, July 30.—The new king of Italy is expected to arrive here tonight.

London, July 30.—A dispatch from Monza, received here today says that the assassin Bressi is from Patterson, N. J.

London, July 30.—Beyond a brief announcement of the fact, nothing with regard to the assassination of King Humbert has been allowed out of Monza.

Washington, July 30.—President McKinley has sent a message of condolence to the Italian government on the death of King Humbert.

Bressi Killed Humbert Because He Hated Monarchical Institutions.

Monza, Italy, July 30.—After the shooting of King Humbert last night by an assassin, as soon as his majesty's attendants could realize what had happened, he was placed in his carriage and driven rapidly to the palace. He was, however, beyond human aid. The assassin was born in Prato in 1869 and is a weaver by trade. He says that he had no accomplices, and that he committed the deed because of his hatred of monarchical institutions. He reached Monza July 27 from Milan.

ANTI-GOBBELITES ALLIG POLITICS.

Say That Is Motive Behind Prosecution of Caleb Powers and Others.

Georgetown, Ky., July 30.—In the trial of Caleb Powers, charged with being an accessory before the fact to murder William Goebel, Attorney Faulkner for the defense stated that it was admitted that Caleb Powers and Charles Finley organized and brought to Frankfort a crowd of mountain men on January 25, but that this was only to petition the legislature and not to intimidate that body. He said the defense would show that politics was responsible for the present prosecutions.

Boss Platt Still Doing Business.

New York, July 30.—Senator Platt when questioned about the report that he was about to retire from the leadership of the republican party and from active politics in this state on account of ill health, replied: "There is no truth in it, whatever. I am just as well as I ever was, and am still doing business."

Fishermen's Strike Off.

Vancouver, B. C., July 30.—The salmon fishermen's strike was declared off this morning. The fishermen are to receive nineteen cents per fish throughout the season, irrespective of the quantity of fish caught. The cannerymen agreed to recognize the Fishermen's Union. So, there have been mutual concessions.

Sutherlandshire Total Wreck.

London, July 30.—The British ship Sutherlandshire, Captain Nichol, from Rotterdam, for Portland, Oregon, grounded at Sarnia on July 27 and became a total wreck. Thirteen of her crew were drowned.

Chaffee Arrives at Taku.

Washington, July 30.—The war department has received word from Gen. Chaffee that he arrived at Taku Saturday night.

Five Thousand Boers Surrender.

London, July 30.—An official dispatch from Lord Roberts dated July 29 states that General Prinsloo and 5000 Boers have surrendered.

MAK VERNUS DUPUIS.

Interesting Case Before Justice Fitzgerald Postponed Until August 8.

George Mack has instituted suit against Joe Dupuis, for \$250 damages, as a result of an assault by the latter upon him on May 24. The case was to have been tried at 10 o'clock this morning, but was postponed, owing to the fact that Judge J. J. Halleray, attorney for Mr. Mack, went to Portland this morning. T. G. Halley, Esq., is counsel for Mr. Dupuis.

On May 24, Mr. Dupuis attacked Mr. Mack, using a board as a weapon, and for that was compelled to appear before Recorder Beam, and was fined \$10 and costs, for violation of the city ordinance.

In the encounter, Mr. Mack suffered a fracture of the right arm near the wrist and was unable to work at his business, being an employee of Henry Gierlich, for five weeks. The damage suit is brought for the purpose of having Mr. Dupuis pay Mr. Mack for his loss of time, for surgeon's charges and for costs and disbursements of the suit.

GERMAN DETACHMENT LOST TEN.

Herr Gelow Says Relief Troops Should Speedily Advance on Pekin.

Berlin, July 30.—The German consul at Tien Tsin has telegraphed under date of July 28 to the foreign offices here as follows:

"The German secretary of the legation at Pekin, Herr Gelow, writes on July 21: 'Thanks for your news of July 19. The condition of Cordes is satisfactory. The remaining members of the legation are all right. A detachment of the guards lost ten killed and fourteen wounded. The houses of the legation, much damaged by the cannon fire, are held by the guards. The attack of Chinese troops on us ceased on July 16. The speediest possible advance of the relief troops is urgently necessary.'"

The Cordes mentioned was with Baron Von Kotteler when the latter was murdered.

Confirms the German News.

Washington, July 30.—The secretary of state received at midnight from Mr. Fowler, American consul at Che Foo, a dispatch dated July 29 at noon. Fowler says: "A letter from the German legation dated the 21st instant received at Tien Tsin says the German loss is ten killed and twelve injured. The Chinese ceased their attack on the 12th. Baron Von Kotteler's body is said to be safe. The American, Dutch and Spanish legations were destroyed, and the French legation partially. A letter from the Japanese legation, dated the 22d, arrived at Tien Tsin on the 25th. Ten battalions of Chinese shelled the legations consecutively from the 20th of June and stopped on the 17th of July, but may renew the shelling. The enemy are decreasing. The German, Russian, American, British and half the Japanese and French legations are still defended. The Japanese say they have food for six days, but little ammunition. The emperor and empress are reported to be at Pekin."

BOWLIN HAS GONE TO ALASKA.

WILL ASSIST W. F. MATLOCK WITH LATTER'S SHIPMENT OF HORSES.

Moore and Kendall Heard From at Walla Walla Where They Resided Behind Closed Doors and More Mystery.

J. B. Bowlin, alias Smith, who has occupied a conspicuous position in the legal circles of Umatilla county during the past three weeks, is on his way to Alaska in company of W. F. Matlock. Mr. Matlock left Saturday evening, and from reliable information it is learned that Mr. Bowlin went with him, to assist in looking after a couple of carloads of horses which are being taken to that far north country.

Other Kentuckians Heard From.

The last heard of Messrs. Moore and Kendall, the gentlemen from Kentucky who came to Weston for Bowlin, is that they were in Walla Walla in a private room, having not gone to the trouble to register at a hotel, and that they were getting very anxious as to the outcome of their trip.

Mrs. Bowlin at Weston.

Mrs. Bowlin and children are still at Weston, and will remain there indefinitely, awaiting to assist in the prosecution of the three men for whom warrants were issued, if the cases are pushed. These warrants were against George Reynolds, acting constable of Weston, J. W. Dykes, constable of Milton, and Joseph Campbell, marshal of Milton. Mrs. Bowlin, who swore to the complaint upon which the warrants were issued, is of the opinion that the man clad in the linen duster, who accompanied Reynolds and Dykes on Wednesday night of last week when they visited the Bowlin home at Weston and attempted to arrest Bowlin, was Marshal Campbell, and that G. C. Moore wisely remained at Walla Walla.

CHICAGO MARKET.

July 30.—The Liverpool market opened off a full penny this morning which corresponded to our break of Saturday and the close was unchanged, 6-1-8.

Chicago opened 5-8 cent lower, 74 5/8, and touched 74 3/8 but the offerings were well taken and the close was practically the same as Saturday, 75 1/8 to 75 1/2. The visible supply showed an increase for the week of 225,000 and corn a decrease of 1,916,000. The receipts at winter wheat points are now less than last year when that crop was very short.

FOWLER HAS SENT US NEWS

Washington Believes Finally That the Legations Are Safe.

AUTOGRAPH LETTER GETS THROUGH

The Allied Forces in China Have Inaugured a Successful System of Private Message Carrying.

Washington, July 30.—The view which the Washington cabinet has taken from the beginning, that, with the exception of Baron von Kotteler, the legationaries at Pekin were alive, is being slowly but surely confirmed. The letter referred to by Consul Fowler as coming from the German legation at Pekin is supposed here to have been an autographic letter and as such is absolutely removed from the possibility of fraud. A Japanese report is also understood to have come down to the sea without having passed through Chinese hands. It was one of the first results of the private messenger system inaugurated by the commanders of the allied forces.

London is Convinced.

London, July 30.—At last the British government is convinced that the ministers at Pekin are safe. Officials here say that this afternoon's dispatches may be regarded as a striking vindication of the position taken by the United States secretary of state, John Hay.

CHINESE HOLD THEIR HOSTAGES.

Evidence Received in London that Ministers are Alive.

London, July 30.—The latest news from the far east seems to be consistent with the theory that the Chinese government has the foreign ministers alive, but means to treat them as hostages, while stories of massacre relate to other matters foreign to the colony in Pekin. Chinese officialdom, it is alleged, openly speaks of the ministers as hostages, whose fate depends on the decision of the powers in relation to the threatened bombardment of the legations. Reports are multiplying that a number of the foreigners were alive up to a late date.

London, July 30.—The British consul at Tien Tsin telegraphs to the foreign office today that a letter from a Japanese colonel in Pekin states that the legations were safe on July 22. There had been no firing on the legations since July 17. The consul adds: "A reliable messenger who failed to enter Pekin, but who reached there, returns, stating that there was no firing on the legations between July 15 and July 19."

LED MONGOLIANS INTO A TRAP.

Americans and British Killed One Thousand in Pekin.

Tien Tsin, July 22, via Shanghai, July 30.—Latest advices from Pekin under date of July 15 said that the legations are holding out. The Chinese attacked the legations on the night of July 10, but were led into a trap by the Americans and British and 1000 of them were killed. Afterwards they continued bombarding the legations more freely. Among the Chinese killed was General Ma. These advices were brought from Pekin by a courier.

LANDED IN JAIL.

Albert Smith Became Prominent for a Brief Period.

Albert Smith became quite prominent on the last three days of last week and ended on Saturday evening by being deposited in the county jail by Marshal Heathman, there to serve out a sentence of 25 and costs imposed by Justice Fitz Gerald.

Mr. Smith first bobbed into notoriety by having an altercation Friday evening with Mr. Kees, in John Schmidt's saloon.

The next day, to-wit Friday, he entered Ed Allen's saloon and endeavored to talk a drink out of Johnny Russell. He insisted on having the drink, without money and without price and it was only after Mr. Russell had fortified his position by logical argument and a three-foot club that he could be dissuaded from going back of the bar and helping himself to a stimulant.

The next heard of Mr. Smith was in connection with the transaction that landed him back on the bars. He went into Swearingen Brothers' saloon, and, after sizing up the situation, endeavored to get out the back way with a roll of blankets and a telescope valve that had been left there temporarily by J. J. Connor, a farm hand. Boss Swearingen prevented Mr. Smith from getting away, and Marshal Heathman made the arrest as a special officer. The culprit was taken before Justice Fitz Gerald, who prescribed the minimum fine on the recommendation for mercy interposed by District Attorney Halley, who prosecuted. The fine and costs are equivalent to 15 days in jail, and as Smith was without funds, he will have to serve the time.
