LAST WEEK WAS TORRID.

The Ninety was the Vogue Excepting One Day, Thursday. Observer William Hilton in his report for last week, ending at 6 p. m., says the temperature of last week was the temperature of this city, he recorded ninety or more on every day excepting Thursday, when the temperature was 87. There were three days in which it was above 90. Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, and for the remainder of the time the weather was warm enough to keep everyone from danger of freezing to death. The skies, too, were cloudless, and the sun therefore had the best of opportunity to get in its work and do a good job of shining. The details of the report are:

Max. min. for seven days, 103, 105, 100, 97, 90, 98; min. tem. for seven days, 55, 50, 61, 68, 59, 52, 50; mean for week, 77.3; average range, 23.1; rainfall, 0.03 inch; wind, prevailing, westerly; days, six clear, one part cloudy, soil tem., at 5 inches, 87.7; at 8 inches, 71.2; at 14 inches, 67.7; at 24 inches, 57.8.

REGARDED AS A SUSPICIOUS DEATH

ADAMS AND ATHENA PEOPLE DESIRE FURTHER INVESTIGATION.

District Attorney and Coroner Comply and Proceed to Athena to Examine Witnesses.

The sentiment at Adams and Athena has changed wonderfully in regard to the manner of the death of A. E. Gosland, the harvest hand who was found dead in Wild Horse creek, just back of Winnie Krebs' saloon at Adams on Sunday, July 22, at 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

District Attorney T. G. Hatley and the coroner, Dr. W. G. Cole went to Athena today to subpoena witnesses to appear at the district attorney's investigation being held at Athena.

The circumstances surrounding the death have been repeated time and again, but various rumors have been started on their rounds and are thoroughly believed by many now, which would have been scoffed at had they been referred to when the original investigation was being held.

Decayed was found in two feet of water, but very little if any water was found in his lungs, an indication in itself that he was dead before reaching the water.

Again, the pocketbook and paper giving instructions regarding the disposal of his body in case of accident were found 12 or 15 feet from the point where Gosland went over the bank of the creek.

Gosland May Have Had Money. One rumor even went so far as to say that there were signs of the body having been dragged several feet on its journey to the creek.

All these late phases of the case were not referred to when Coroner Cole and District Attorney Hatley held their examination on the Sunday afternoon and evening after the body was found, and some of those most anxious for the present investigation were at that time perfectly satisfied that the death was purely accidental.

A YUKON STEAMER SUNK.

Four People Were Drowned in Thirty Mile River—News From Dawson.

Phil McBrian, who has been one of Pendleton's representatives in Dawson City, N. W. T., has returned home. He brings news of the sinking of the steamer "Eurekas," upon which he came from Dawson to White Horse Rapids. The steamer turned back from there, going down the river, and in the swift Thirty Mile river was wrecked and sunk, four persons being drowned. Three were women and the fourth the partner of the boat.

It was understood that the steering apparatus got out of order and the pilot lost control of the craft, running onto the rocks.

The money taken was a five-dollar gold piece and enough silver to about make up \$10.

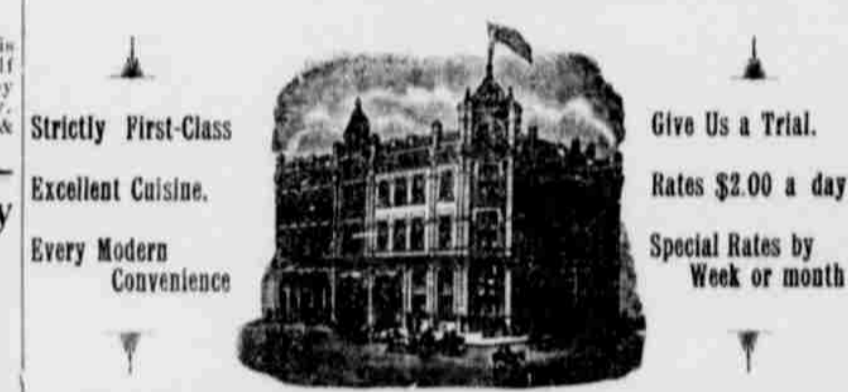
