DEATH WAS ACCIDENTAL.

Body of A. E. Gosland Was Not Exhumed at Athens.

District Attorney T. G. Halley and the coroner, Dr. W. G. Cole, returned on Monday evening's train from Athens, where they had gone to investigate rumors surrounding the death of A. E. Gosland, who was found dead in Wild Horse creek at Adams on Sunday afternoon, July 22.

At the time of the original investigation and subsequent burial of the deceased, there was scarcely a suggestion of foul play; but, as the rumors were so many, it was felt that it was quite a sentiment was worked up at Adams and Athens in favor of the theory that the man had been murdered. When the officers made their second visit to the scene on Monday, however, the rumors were found to be unfounded, and no person could be found with knowledge of the facts to give any testimony that would justify exhuming the body, which had been buried at Athens on the Monday morning after the death.

The people of Athens and Adams will now feel better satisfied, as the officers have shown their perfect willingness to make thorough investigation and publish all the facts. As a matter of fact, the officers at no time attempted to rush up anything connected with the affair. They took it to be a case of accidental death, and have learned of nothing since that time to disprove the theory formed immediately after having first viewed the body and examined the ground where the accident happened.

Something About That Fracture.
Quite as much as from anything else, the excitement arose over the statement that Gosland had suffered "a fracture at the base of the skull." This was true. But the significance of the statement was not understood. It is a familiar fact that a blow on another part of the head will sometimes cause a fracture at the base of the skull. This time, the reports altered the statement as it went from person to person, until it was asserted that Gosland's skull was crushed in. Crushing the skull and causing a fracture at the base of the skull are entirely different things. The case with which fractures at the base of the skull are caused may be illustrated by the well known surgical truth that numbers of times pugilists have been struck on the point of the jaw and suffered fracture at the base of the skull.

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FREE-FOR-ALL RUNAWAY.

Main Street was the scene of a general Mixup This Morning.
Shortly after 7 o'clock this morning a runaway occurred which attracted more than usual attention along Main street. The team which initiated the trouble, belonged to Frank Engdahl, who resides a mile and a half west of Nye. It was hitched to an ordinary farm wagon and started at the O. R. & N. Co. depot, ran the length of Main street, across Main street bridge, went on Jackson street nearly to the Custom mill. A horse attached to a cart in front of Randolph Martin's store, crossed the street and whirled along to Alta street, then dropped out. One of the hotel buses was also in it for a minute, as was also a lady on a bicycle, who narrowly escaped being run over.

Notwithstanding the early hour, there were many on the street, and they hurried along, too far behind to do anything, but close enough to see that there were numerous narrow escapes to horses and rigs hitched to standing along the sidewalks, and to pedestrians. Ben Hur's chariot race was simply a circumstance in comparison. George came jumping out of a saddle-horse as the runaway passed his Commercial stables, opposite Hotel Pendleton, and, after a swift ride, overtook the Engdahl team and brought it back.

Notwithstanding the many close shaves the damage was restricted to a few broken straps, and, within 10 minutes, the street was ready for another runaway, or anything else that would afford excitement.

Horses to State Fair.
James McKay left today for Salem with four horses, three belonging to Frank Frazier and one to Chris Simpson. He will put them in shape for the races at the state fair. Umaholis is the only one of Mr. Frazier's horses that will go in the race, the other two being green, and will be simply trained by Jim McKay. Santiam is the name of the animal sent by Mr. Simpson. Gus LaFontaine was to have sent a couple of horses, and another one, on the same train today, but they are both sick and unable to go. They may be forwarded later, if they recover as rapidly as hoped for, but the indications are that they will not be in the state races. Frank Frazier expects to leave next Sunday or Monday for Salem, to see how his horses are coming along.
