GENERAL NEWS.

Japan, if necessary, can send 70,000 men to China.

In Germany, 20,000 officers and 20,000 men have volunteered for Chinese service.

Sir William Vernon Harcourt, liberal leader, estimates the cost of the Boer war at \$400,000,000.

It is strongly intimated that Oregon school land business is manipulated by officials for the benefit of private graft.

Navy department shares the general distrust that all was not well on the battleship Oregon when she went ashore.

A letter from Kerrelle, in southwestern Texas, states that in a large section north of there crops and nearly all kinds of property have been destroyed by floods, and scores of families are homeless and destitute. An appeal has been sent to Governor Sayers for public aid.

Senator Scott received a letter at republican headquarters from Senator Hoar in reply to an invitation extended to the Massachusetts senator to take an active part in the campaign. Senator Hoar expressed his hearty sympathy with the work of the republican national committee. He will speak only in Massachusetts.

An amusing incident in connection with the coming marriage of the king of Serbia is that the wedding has been postponed because the Serbian throne is in Paris, whither it was sent as part of the Serbian exhibition. So the throne has been packed back to Belgrade as quickly as possible and the wedding is timed for any day before Sunday.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The citizens of Eagle Valley, have made arrangements for a Harvest Home picnic on August 21 and 22.

A mortgage for \$1,000,000 has been placed on record to secure bonds for the Seattle-Tacoma Railway company, which is constructing an electric line between the two cities. Work is to be prosecuted at both ends of the line.

A short time ago Miss Ella Hendrick, of McMinnville, made application for the position of assistant teacher in the government school at Unalakpa, where Miss Mann is teaching. On Saturday last Miss Hendrick received notification of her appointment to the position.

James J. Hill, president of the Great Northern railway, and party are on the road for the South. President C. S. Mellen of the Northern Pacific and party are on the St. Paul & Duluth line, and have not yet started for the South. President Mellen will arrive in Walla Walla next week.

Night before last some Japs employed by the O. R. & N. Co. were held up in the yards at La Grande and yesterday afternoon Marshal Childers arrested two hobo on suspicion of being the parties who committed the act, but they were turned loose.

At Eugene, Mrs. Nancy Hull died at the residence of Dr. B. F. Russell, Thursday, aged 86 years, 11 months and 21 days. She leaves two sons, Manlove C. Hull, of Boise City, Idaho, and Hugh J. Hull, of Los Angeles, Cal., and two daughters, Mrs. Miner, at Billings, of Springfield, and Mrs. Maggie N. Russell, of Thurston.

George W. Gray, an Oregon pioneer of 1865, and an old and respected resident of Salem, died at 9 o'clock on Monday last at his residence in Salem, aged 80 years. Mr. Gray had been sick for several months past, and of late had failed very fast, and his demise was not unexpected. Mr. Gray was a native of Tioga county, Pa., where he was born Aug. 5th, 1820.

KILLED IF TROOPS ADVANCE

IMPERIALISTS GIVE THIS AS FINAL EDICT.

Secretary Hay Uses Some Grave Language.

REMARKS SOUND LIKE WAR

Cablegrams Indicate Lack of Energy by the Army and Beginning of Disagreement.

Shanghai, Aug. 3.—Liu Kun Yi, viceroy of Nankin, and Sheng, administrator of telegraphs and railways, and Taotai, of Shanghai, have both declared officially that the foreign ministers are held by the Chinese government as hostages, and that, if the allies march to Peking, they will all be killed.

Washington, Aug. 3.—Secretary Hay's reply to Li Hung Chang has closed negotiations with China unless the old viceroy is able to secure a full acceptance of our terms relative to the foreign ministers and that at once. No orders, therefore, looking to a relaxation of the preparations for the advance on Peking have gone out of Washington, for, as the situation is described by one of the leading officials here, "there will be no bargaining on our part in advance of concessions by the Chinese authorities of the full and free communication with the foreign ministers."

Secretary Hay talks like War. There is, moreover, a note ominously close to actual war in Secretary Hay's declaration that the conduct of the Chinese government "is unfriendly." That kind of language is extreme in diplomacy and it is only a narrow step between it and formal war. The impression prevails here that the Chinese government, if it is not absolutely bereft of power to act in defiance of the Boxers, will accept our terms and some such action is looked for very soon.

Fighting May Bring Them to Terms. Possibly a battle will be required to bring the imperial government to the point of acceptance, though in that case it is questionable whether the original conditions would be regarded as still open to acceptance. If the Chinese government now accepts, however, the United States government will be face to face with one of the most delicate and momentous diplomatic tasks ever undertaken. It must attempt to redeem its promise to use its good offices in favor of China, and in the present temper of some of the European powers the greatest difficulties may be expected to arise in the prosecution of an attempt.

Chinese Efforts Will be Credited. It is the confident expectation of the officials here, however, that if the Chinese government actually and in good faith meets all four conditions laid down by the president in his reply to the Chinese emperor's appeal for aid, that at least a majority of the powers now represented in China will accept that as the proper base upon which to cease present hostilities and open negotiations for a settlement. A decision of this kind would be a great relief to the minority else an international entanglement might arise.

It is not believed at the war department that the advance has been made as yet from Tien Tsin.

MOVEMENT OF THE TROOPS.

March Began on Sunday—Americans are Co-operating.

London, Aug. 3.—The forward movement for the relief of the foreign legations in Peking began on Sunday, July 29. A message from Tien Tsin on that date says the advance guard of Russians, occupying the right flank, and the Japanese pushed on to the river without opposition. The expectation is that the whole allied expeditionary force, 29,000 men, would be on the march by Tuesday, July 31. Sixteen hundred Americans and 2,300 British are co-operating. It is proposed to follow the river, using boats to carry food, ammunition and artillery. Shanghai correspondents learn that the Russians were defeated north of New Chwang, and that a body less than 100 strong is endeavoring to relieve a force besieged at Toshi Chow by 40,000 Chinese and numerous guns.

Chinese Meet Serious Resistance.

Washington, Aug. 3.—Bad news comes this morning from Admiral Remy in a report indicating that serious resistance has developed to the progress of the Peking relief column. The fact that the Japanese have suffered severely in endeavoring to relieve a force besieged at Toshi Chow by 40,000 Chinese and numerous guns.

Japanese Meet Serious Resistance.

Washington, Aug. 3.—The navy department this morning received the following cablegram from Admiral Remy: "Taku, August 2.—General Chaffee reports that 8000 Japanese, while scouting towards Hui Tang, lost three men killed and had 25 wounded. The enemy were entrenched in loop-holed houses."

NUMEROUS CONFERENCES ASSEMBLED.

International Conference of Christian Workers and Other Meetings.

East Northfield, Mass., Aug. 3.—There is an intense interest to-day at the opening of the annual general international conference for Christian workers. This is the oldest of the Northfield gatherings, instituted by the late Dwight L. Moody, and the present session is the first to be held without the leadership of the great evangelist. At these meetings the major Christian doctrines are presented by able bible students; plans and methods of Christian work are discussed by the clergy and lay workers; various Christian enterprises are represented, and the promotion and deepening of spiritual life are especially sought. The proceedings were opened with a sunrise praise meeting and after breakfast the regular program was taken up. The conference will continue eighteen days.

Milwaukee, Wis., Aug. 3.—The feature of this morning's session of the convention of commercial lawyers was a paper on "Needed Commercial Legislation," read by O. E. Childs, of Sterling, Ill. The paper was full of interesting points and recommendations which were added to by the suggestions of numerous delegates during the general discussion which followed. An early adjournment was taken to permit the visitors to join in a visit of inspection to various industrial and manufacturing plants in and about Milwaukee. The convention will conclude its business tomorrow.

Chicago, Aug. 3.—Reformers, politicians, college professors and students for social conditions have gathered in large numbers at Lake Bluff, where the annual national sociological convention opened today. Some of the topics scheduled for discussion during the coming week are "Imperialism, Expansion and Trusts," "Social Settlements," "The Liquor License System," "Labor and Capital," "Christian Citizenship," "Woman in Church and State," and "Field of Sociology."

Pairs, Aug. 3.—In the hall of congress at the exposition today the Thirtieth International Medical congress was opened with a large attendance. The women delegates occupied the seats of honor, while the galleries were filled with the families of the foreign delegates, including the United States, Canada, England, Germany, Austria, Roumania, Spain, Portugal, Greece, Norway and Russia. Mr. Lannelongue, president of the international committee, delivered the inaugural address, to which brief replies were delivered by the foreign delegates, each speaking in his own language.

Managua, Nicaragua, Aug. 3.—In the Nicaraguan congress last evening President Zelaya announced the termination of concessions to the Maritime Canal company and formally proclaimed the existence of the Eyrre-Cragin canal concession.
