W. S. BYERS CLAIMS DAMAGES.

HE SUES G. W. RIGBY ET ALII FOR \$10,000.

Use of the Waters of the Umatilla River is Involved and the Case Will Attract Much Attention.

W. S. Byers, owner and manager of the Pendleton Roller mills has entered suit against several prominent citizens to recover \$10,000 damages for taking water from the Umatilla river above Pendleton, thus diverting the water from the river and lessening the flow through the millrace which runs his mills. The suit was filed by Judge John J. Balleray, of this city, as Mr. Byers' attorney, Williams, Wood & Luthien, of Portland, being also retained as counsel. The complaint recites that Mr. Byers owns certain rights in the waters of the Umatilla river for the uses of milling here; and that the defendants have, by the diversion of the water and leading it into irrigating ditches, injured him to the extent of \$10,000 by decreasing the flow of water.

These are named as defendants: Ex-Judge James A. Fee, Indian Agent Charles Wilkins, Thomas Thompson, George W. Rigby, William T. Rigby, and these Indians, Hook Soot, Hopson, Wa-win-ta-lia-sono-mi, Pete Kalyton, Is-ka-mak, Nish-ga-wo-tia, and Good Man.

What Mr. Byers Claims.
Mr. Byers claims 10,000 mfrs of the waters of the Umatilla river, and from the 1st of July to the 1st of November the stream does not carry that amount, consequently he has not enough to run his mill to its full capacity.
The Indians mentioned in the complaint own lands along the Umatilla river above Pendleton, which were allotted to them under the acts of March 3, 1885. These lands have been leased by Messrs. G. W. and W. T. Rigby, Fee and Thompson, who have taken out three irrigating ditches, so Mr. Byers claims, which reduce the amount of water available for him to operate his flouring mill at the season of the year when it is mostly needed.

Case Will be Hard Fought.

WANT AN EASTERN WHEAT MARKET.

Walla Walla Commercial Club Asks for Lower Rates.
Walla Walla, W. T., Aug. 2.—The Commercial club met on Thursday in the city hall to take action regarding the opening of new avenues of commerce to the farmers of the northwest generally and of the Walla Walla valley in particular.

It is believed here that during the past two years the cargo-smoking vessels plying between coast ports, China and the east have not afforded sufficient carrying capacity to transport the cereal yield of the northwest, thus forcing the farmer either to hold his grain with a poorer prospect of shipment the following season or to dispose of it to eastern dealers at vastly reduced figures. Present tonnage figures show that during the shipping season of 1900-1901 ocean transportation will be less available than formerly and as the grain yield is very much in excess of former crops the growers will suffer proportionately.

The object of this meeting was to secure certain transportation concessions from the transcontinental railway lines which will permit of grain being laid down in Omaha, Chicago or St. Paul, Minneapolis or Duluth at a

figure that will permit of its being entered into competition with eastern products, thus opening a new outlet to the Pacific northwest and benefiting the shippers upon whom the railroads are in a great measure dependent.

Alleges a Combine.
The greater portion of the flouring mills and warehouses of this section are under control of a combine, the object of which it is said is not to aid the farmers but rather to obtain their products at the lowest possible figures. It is from this evil also that an avenue of escape will be sought.

Resolutions were presented and efforts made to have other commercial organizations in the various cities urged to unite in the effort to advance the welfare of the grain growing industry.

A committee will call upon President Mellen of the Northern Pacific railway when he visits this city next week and to lay before him the exact facts of the case and urge that some action be taken. All are united in the statement that the railway companies owe allegiance to the farmers of this section. It was the product of the farms that caused the building of the roads; it is the hauling of these farmers' crops that has made the railroad venture a successful one. An appeal will be made, with what result later events will determine.

Does This Mean Fight?
N. P. Co. Refuses After Aug. 15 to Turn Over Wheat at Wallula to O. R. & N.
Another incident, in the struggle for railway supremacy on the north coast, has raised the question:
"Will the O. R. & N. and N. P. now begin the bitter fight threatened a year ago, by entering each other's territory with branch lines?"
The information comes from Portland that the Northern Pacific Railroad company has served notice that on August 15 the existing agreement with the Oregon Railroad & Navigation Company by which wheat has been turned over to the latter from the former at Wallula junction for shipment to Portland, will be terminated.
Notification of the suspension of the agreement was so sudden that the officials of the Oregon Railroad & Navigation have not had time to decide on a course to pursue. The wheat turned over to the Oregon Railroad & Navigation by the Northern Pacific last year at Wallula amounted to 28,000 tons.
It is the belief of many shippers in Portland and that the Oregon Railroad & Navigation will now be forced to protect its interests by extending its line up the Snake river to Lewiston and thence into Clearwater, and that it will also be forced to build numerous feeders in eastern Washington.
