#### PENDLETON HORSES AT SALE.

Trainer speaks of the Flyers Now training at the Fair Grounds.

The Salem Statesman has this about Pendleton horses at the state fair grounds, training for coming events: "Frank Frasier, who a few years ago became famous as the owner of the great Oregon pacer, Chocallite, will enter to the Salem track on Tuesday of this week with a splendid string of the best horses. Among them is the famous pacer mare, Umahollis, with a record of 2:17 1/2; Westfield, black stallion, trotter, 2:22 1/2; Billy Wilkes, Hasalo, black stallion, green pacer, by Westfield.

"The fine string of Cris Simpson, of Pendleton, is here under the care of George Wright. The horses are Bill N., a trotter with a 2:29 1/2 mark; Alta Norte, a pacer by Del Norte, 2:16 1/2; Sumner N. B., a trotter with a record of 2:17 1/2; Santiam, a green stallion, by Caution; and a green trotter by McKimney.

"Erwin, of Pendleton, has John Edison, a pacer stallion, 2:29 1/2, and Oreta, bay trotting mare, by Caution, with a record of 2:22 1/2.

"George E. Peringer, of Pendleton, has a stable of splendid horses. In charge of Trainer A. E. Heller. The string is headed by the racing stallion, Pathmark, the 4-year-old son of Pathmark, the famous Oregon performer, with a 2:30 1/2 record, who was last year sent to Canada. Pathmark is a green horse, but at the free-for-all pace at Everett, Washington, on July 6, he won the day in 2:17 1/2, against some famous horses, the purse contested for being \$1000; it was a marvelous performance, and ruinous to those betting on the race, as Pathmark was not considered a possibility. Other horses in this string are Dewey Ann, a pacer, 2:28 1/2; Chehalis Maid, a 2-year old mare; Kinsey Mack, a 2-year old trotter; Sly Edda, a green pacer mare, and Dr. Long's Trilby, a 2-year-old pacer."

### A WALLA WALLA FIEND.

#### HE ASSAULTS TWO WOMEN AND ROWLY ESCAPES LYING.

One Was Emma Kidwell. Formerly of Pendleton—Walla Walla People Much Enraged.

Emma Kidwell, 15 years old, who was criminally assaulted and stabbed at Walla Walla Saturday, by a fiend in human form Ed Sutherland, was formerly a resident of Pendleton. She is well known here, is entitled to respect from all. Her actions, therefore, had not warranted Sutherland in approaching her.

Mrs. Durkee, the second woman Sutherland assaulted, is also a respectable woman, employed in the steam laundry there.

The details of the terrible affair, which followed so closely after the killing of Buchanan by Simmons, warrant the belief that Sutherland is a fiend of the Theodore Burrant type.

The meagre particulars in the East Oregonian of Saturday evening, are supplemented as follows by an account in the Walla Walla Union:

#### Girl Horribly Assaulted.

"Emma Kidwell, the 15-year old stepdaughter of W. A. Stuart, was the victim of an attempted criminal assault within 100 yards of her home in the southeastern part of the city about 10 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The girl fought so desperately, however, that her assailant abandoned his designs and, stabbing her several times in the body, left her for dead among the brush and weeds, and escaped in the brush.

#### Story as afterwards told by the girl herself indicated that she had been returning from the residence of George Whitehouse. After crossing from Second street to Chestnut she saw a man behind her. His actions were not suspicious and she paid little attention to him until she reached the Yellow Hawk bridge where she turned into a lane leading to her father's house. In an instant he was beside her and held her in his grasp. Not minding his threats demanding silence she began to scream.

#### Fought Her Assailant.

"A severe struggle ensued. The man attempted to use force with the frail girl and she, in her maddened fright fought like a tigress. Unable to control her her assailant began using force. Brutally he beat her about the head and face and finally choked her until she was insensible.

#### How long she lay there unconscious is not known. When first seen she had crawled or walked to her home, a distance of about 100 yards, and had fallen headlong into the barbed wire fence near the house. She was then bleeding from her wounds and only semi-conscious.

#### The girl's stepfather W. A. Stuart, found the dying girl and carrying her into the house, at once started for a doctor.

#### Attempted a Second Assault.

"At 9 o'clock Saturday night, at Seventh and Poplar streets, Sutherland attempted to assault Mrs. Minnie Durkee, and was arrested. He had escaped the officers since the assault on Emma Kidwell. Sutherland narrowly escaped lynching at the hands of the enraged populace."

#### STIRRED UP LEHMAN SPRINGS.

Young Man From Heppner Makes the Place Lively for a Short Time.

Lehman Springs, Aug. 6.—The other day at this place, a company of young men from Heppner made the camp rather lively for a time, and sort of performed the bad-man-with-a-gun act, by shooting at the stovepipes and otherwise manifesting a playfulness not compatible with the best breeding. In some manner, a number of them Heppner got into bad relations with each other, and the spirit of antagonism thus engendered caused them to form what looked like a battle array, and threaten to leave on the field of action both dead and wounded.

#### LA GRANDE'S DESTRUCTIVE FIRE.

Loss Estimated at \$100,000.—O. R. & N. Station in La Grande.  
La Grande suffered a serious loss by fire on Saturday night, beginning at 7:30 o'clock, when the conflagration began in the implement warehouse of Bolton & Bodner, and instantly, almost, enveloped that immense structure in a sea of flames. It is the most destructive fire La Grande has had since 1883, when the entire town nearly went up in smoke. This time, according to the Journal, it was difficult to prevent the flames from spreading and going beyond control. From the Journal of last issue is taken the following: "The warehouse and its contents, with the exception of a few wagons, were completely consumed; the O. R. & N. depot was a mass of ashes; two hundred yards of quadrupled track with about 35 loaded box cars are left in ruins. It was only by the most strenuous effort on the part of the firemen that the row of bricks on Jefferson avenue and the round house and coal bunker were saved. Fire broke out in them several times but was suppressed. The freight warehouse was also saved with difficulty. The company's ice house was included in the loss. Bolton & Bodner's papers, book accounts, etc., were all in the safe, and are preserved. The railroad company's papers are in a bad shape; some were saved, some scattered by the crowd eager to help, and a large part, including those in the telegraph office, were burned.

The fire company worked with heroic energy, but six streams seemed for time hopelessly inadequate. If the wind had been in the opposite direction, the business part of town would have been completely destroyed. The loss was very great even under favorable conditions. That of the O. R. & N. cannot of course be estimated for many days. The insurance on the Bolton & Bodner property was \$10,500 and the loss much greater. The box cars might have been saved but the switch engine had to be removed dead engine from the round house until it was too late.

"The 9 o'clock passenger was delayed for some time but was passed on the side tracks. Telegraphic communications were destroyed with the west but the telephone was being used."
