THE ORIENTAL SERVICE.

It Will be Increased From Portland to Meet Every Demand.

President A. L. Mohler of the Oregon Railroad & Navigation company, discussing the probable effect of the Chinese troubles on the commerce of the Pacific coast, said:

"Portland's Oriental steamship service will be increased to meet the demands of the port. The O. R. & N. has arranged to secure several first-class vessels to add to the fleet already in service. In the meantime shippers will be protected against loss."

The O. R. & N. company is alive to Portland's interests and has made all necessary plans for increasing the Oriental service, but is not yet prepared to make the official announcement. It may not be generally known, but it is nevertheless a fact, that the present Chinese trouble has materially reduced the import and ex-

port traffic, and until order is restored there can be no stability to Oriental commerce. In the meantime ample provision for the protection of Portland's trade is being made.

It is learned that the increased Oriental service will be established with the consent of the Union Pacific. Mr. Mohler had recently arranged to secure three large steamers of the first class for the trade here, but they were pressed into service by the British government for the transport business.

TEACHERS' EXAMINATION.

Oregon Practice Toward Those Holding Certificates From Other States.

The examination for teachers' certificates is in progress at the court house, having commenced Wednesday at 9 o'clock a. m. County Superintendent J. F. Nowlin, Rev. F. L. Forbes and Prof. J. E. Cherry constitute the examining board. There are 16 candidates for honors, 10 for county certificates and six for state certificates.

Among those applying for a county certificate is Prof. C. H. Knapp, who has been elected to the position of principal of the public schools at Weston. He holds a life certificate from the state of Washington, and was principal last year of the Ritzville schools. Those facts avail him nothing when he comes to Oregon to teach, with the exception that he is given credit for 27 months of experience in teaching, making it possible for him to receive a first grade certificate if he succeeds in passing the examination as without having had any practical experience in teaching he could only get a third grade certificate. This practice at first glance might seem to work a hardship upon those holding certificates from other states, but the practical working of the law has time and time again been proven to be beneficial to the best educational interests of the state and to the solidity of the public school system.
