### CAUGHT BY THE EXPRESS.

J. C. SALTmarsh, OF BIRCH CREEK, THE VICTIM.

Accident happened on West Webb St. Pendleton, at 5:30 o'clock Thursday Evening.

J. C. Saltmarsh, who resides four miles beyond the Lee crossing on Birch creek, met with an accident Thursday evening that will probably cost him his life. He and his 14-year-old son Carl had driven to Pendleton, each with a four-horse team, their wagons loaded with wheat. They had left their loads at Byers' mill, had finished their trading and the discussion of business matters and were on their way home. Carl was driving along some distance ahead of his father.

The hour was 5:30 o'clock and the "Chicago-Portland special" from Portland was due and on time. Mr. Saltmarsh is quite well along in years and deaf, so that he carries a speaking trumpet to assist him in hearing. He reached the O. R. & N. Co.'s track, where it crosses Webb street, but was oblivious to the fact that the train was approaching, although the fierce shriek of the whistle was apparently sufficient to arouse almost anyone to a sense of impending danger. There was a crash when the cowcatcher struck the rear end of the wagon, piling man, wagon and the pole team in a muck. The lead team ran away. Mr. Saltmarsh was picked up in a mill and placed upon the observation platform of the tourist car and brought on to the passenger depot, and from there was taken to Cole's hospital. Conductor Cotman doing everything possible to expedite matters and get prompt surgical assistance. Drs. W. W. Vincent, O. R. & N. Co. surgeon, and Dr. W. G. Cole, took charge of the case. Mr. Saltmarsh's skull on the right side is badly crushed, which, with other injuries, including a badly bruised back, make his condition very serious, and his chances for recovery slight.

Mrs. Saltmarsh was summoned and arrived in due time, and with her son Carl, remains at the hospital.

R. & N. company is far in excess of the most sanguine expectations of any member of the association, no one having hoped that the modest request made by Pendleton to the company would receive such liberal attention.

#### Milton People Will Contribute.

Mr. Hull promises to give this his personal attention, and went to Milton on Thursday to interview orchardists there. Those who are in a position to secure a representative display of Walla Walla valley fruits will be seen by Mr. Hull, and a representative of the Pendleton Fair and Carnival Association will visit Milton in a few days to complete arrangements. It is well known that no section of country produces fruits superior to those of the Milton vicinity, and that so wide-awake and enterprising a man as Mr. Hull has consented to emphasize the matter at Milton is a cause for congratulation on the part of the people here. Everyone may rest assured that the Milton locality will not be behind any other section in showing to the world what they produce in their orchards and gardens.

#### IN AND AROUND WESTON.

The Blalock Farm Below Milton Sold for \$30,000.

The East Oregonian is indebted to the Weston Leader for the following items: C. C. Cookburn & Sons, the extensive Coarse creek farmers, have purchased the Blalock farm of 1442 acres below Milton, for a reported consideration of \$30,000. A combined harvester was included in the deal, and passed through town yesterday, en route for the Julius Williams ranch.

His family accompanied him, and Mrs. Brassfield visited Monday at the home of her sister, Mrs. J. B. Beaton, near town.

An incipient harvest field fire occasioned considerable alarm at R. Jamieson's place above town Tuesday, being noticed after the dinner hour. A blaze was noticed in a setting that the engine had left four hours before, and a dash was at once made for it. The men arrived just in time, for in a moment more the fire would have reached a pile of straw and destroyed the setting.

John Larson, who is employed at Fletcher's mill, cut his left foot severely with an axe about two weeks ago, slicing off a strip of flesh about an inch wide from the left side of the foot, including a transverse section of the little toe. Some amateur surgery was practiced at the mill, but the wound did not heal well, and Mr. Larson came to town Monday for treatment by Dr. Best.

H. G. Walker, of the firm of Walker Bros., reports that they have been thrashing two million tons of Helix. The poorest crop harvested averaged 30

bushels and the best 39 1/2 bushels. All yields fell about 10 bushels below early estimates, but the quality is excellent. Hugh noticed that late sown grain invariably made the best yield, and inclines to the opinion that the "cold spell" this spring injured the grain sown earlier. Walker Bros.' wheat yielded from 35 to 37 bushels per acre. Thompson Warren, who is government auditor at the Rosebud Indian school in South Dakota, writes to his home at Weston a description of a typical Dakota hail storm. The hail broke all the window panes, 433, in the west side of the big school building, and rattled the stove pipes on the blacksmith shop like grape and canister. The white missiles were bigger than walnuts, and in ten minutes covered the ground to a depth of three inches. Mr. Warren misses the beauties of Eastern Oregon weather.

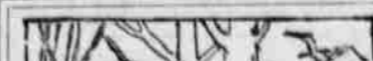
