MAKING MACK VERSUS DUPUIS.

Plaintiff Gets Nominal Damages for Assault Made Upon Him.

The case of George Mack versus Joseph Dupuis came up at 10 o'clock this morning before Justice of the Peace Fitz Gerald, in the Association block. J. J. Halleray appeared for the plaintiff and T. G. Halley for the defendant.

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This suit was an action for specific damages to the amount of \$100, and \$150 more general damages, and was the outcome of an assault committed by Mr. Dupuis upon Mr. Mack on the afternoon of May 24, 1900. Dupuis admitted the assault and claimed justification for his action. The jury of five was instructed by the court that having admitted the assault, the defendant must pay damages, the amount thereof to be decided by the jury.

After short consultation, the amount of damages was fixed at \$1.

Both of the principals were seen after the case had been decided and the amount of damages fixed. Mr. Dupuis was quite well satisfied with the verdict, but Mr. Mack was not. He declared in unequivocal language that he intended to at once proceed to carry the case to the circuit court.
