WOODCRAFT SESSIONS AT SALT LAKE.

GRAND GUARDIAN C. C. VAN ORSDALL WILL ATTEND.

Her Ambition to Report 17,000 Members in Good Standing Has Been Realized.

On Monday morning next the east-bound train, passing through Pendleton, will have aboard about 60 delegates to the head camp and grand circle sessions of Woodcraft to convene in Salt Lake on the 15th.

At Pendleton the party will be joined by Grand Guardian VanOrsdall, and her private secretary, Miss Bishop; Grand delegate, Mrs. Johanna Roller; Grand Manager, M. E. Crosey; of Palouse; Grand delegates, Mrs. Cora Wilson of Pullman, Mrs. Pearl Atwood of Spokane, Mrs. Dr. Stiles of Walla Walla, Mrs. Viola Damiles of California; and the head camp delegates from Eastern Washington. They will reach Salt Lake on the morning of the 14th, and will be the delegates from other parts of the nine states of the Pacific jurisdiction. The two sessions will be composed of about 140 delegates and supreme officers, and promises to be the most important in the history of the two orders.

An East Oregonian representative called on Mrs. VanOrsdall at her office this morning, and in reply to queries she said in substance: "The Grand Circle books closed for the term 1898-1900 on June 30, in order to give the grand officers an opportunity to complete their reports. The work of the term up to that date covered just 22 months of active work, and the total results make a very fine showing for a young order. There were, in that time, credited to the organization department 11,229 new certificates issued, and 130 new members granted. "I have attained my ambition to report 17,000 members in good standing to the second grand session, with several hundred in addition for good measure.

"In this time I have signed warrants on our benefit fund for \$108,000, we have outstanding claims approved, and not paid, and we have on June 30 over \$15,000 cash surplus in this fund. "To give you some idea of the magnitude of our growth, I will say that assessment No. 1, for April, 1897, brought in \$28, while assessment No. 2, for June, 1900, brought in \$500, enough to pay our annual claims. Our plan is to collect a regular monthly assessment, not an assessment when a death occurs. This has put us on a sound financial basis from the beginning, and enabled us to meet our obligations in full, always and promptly. Our death rate for 1900 only, 1.5 per thousand, and for 1901 only, 1.2 per thousand—an extremely low rate in the experience of benefit orders for the past two years, with the heavy general mortality rate of the country, in 1898 and 1900.

"All things considered, I am very proud of the Women of Woodcraft, whose record shows that a benefit order composed almost wholly of Women can be run successfully and is as sound financially as orders composed wholly of men. The only requisite is sound financial principles and strict business methods, and these have held from the foundation of the order. "Mrs. VanOrsdall has been at the head of the order since its organization, being one of the incorporators. Upon her shoulders have rested the chief burden of the executive and organization departments, as well as a supervisory control of all the other departments. The phenomenal growth and success of the Women of Woodcraft is therefore an eloquent testimonial of her industry and ability as a fraternal organizer, and it is not strange that she has earned the reputation in the fraternal world as being one of the most successful leaders and business women in her line of work in the country.

Mr. Bowlin has been visiting recently at Hildway springs (no pun intended), and remained last night at the home of a distinguished gentleman not far from Pendleton. Mrs. Bowlin arrived this afternoon on the freight train from Weston, with additions to Mr. Bowlin's wardrobe, and the couple returned to their home in Weston on the train due to leave here at 8:35.

With the exception of his clothing, which in certain portions looked the worse for wear, Mr. Bowlin was looking well. He has conferred with his attorneys, Messrs. Carter & Raley, who give him assurance that the lawyers from Kentucky have gone to the end of their tether and that he has nothing further to fear. The circuit court of the county in Kentucky where the proceedings against Mr. Bowlin emanated will convene next Monday. Mr. Bowlin has hopes that the indictment against him will be quashed.
