SYSTEM OF FAIR MANAGEMENT.

Public Urged to Visit Headquarters and Learn How Plans are Progressing. Regarding the management of the Street Fair and Harvest Carnival to be held in Pendleton, September 18 to 22 inclusive, the members of the association and the officers desire to say to the public that the headquarters are established in the East Oregonian building, corner of Main and Webb streets. Representatives of the association are there constantly, and a well wrought system of records, together with a set of double entry books, have been opened, in which will be kept carefully all the transactions, receipts, and expenditures, with vouchers for the same. These records will be kept the same as in any other office, and are open for inspection at any time. Indeed it will be pleasing to the management if the people drop in at headquarters occasionally, offer suggestions, get filled with enthusiasm and look over the books, which are the public's property.

There will be absolutely nothing in the transactions that will not be made public, and, at the end of the fair, the books will be closed, and an itemized statement will be printed, probably in pamphlet form, showing the money received and the manner of expenditure of every single dollar and cent. This will be incorporated in a report succinctly drawn, give a brief history of Pendleton's first fair and carnival. As a check upon the headquarters, the finance committee will keep its complete records, so that at any time, and especially at the end of the fair, there will be a comparison made and the one will have to balance the other.

It is desired to announce this and call special attention to it. The association will not be responsible for any bill extracted, or any obligation of any kind whatsoever, which is incurred, except first a requisition shall have been drawn at the office of the superintendent, stating specifically the amount and the purpose for which it is intended. This requisition will authorize the bearer to secure the goods, or services, to be rendered, whatever it may be.

When brought to the office of the superintendent, with a bill agreeing with the requisition, an order on the treasurer for the amount will be given. All money is to be paid out only upon these signed printed orders. Considerable money is to be handled, and it is desired that it be done in a business-like way, hence, the caution exercised as indicated.

The Oregonian of Portland has the following in the Monday issue: "J. E. Lathrop, of Pendleton, East Oregonian, is in Portland on business connected with the Pendleton street fair and harvest carnival, of which he is superintendent. Mr. Lathrop said yesterday: 'The Pendleton people are all taking a great interest in the Portland street fair and carnival, and many of them are coming down to it. In return, they extend a cordial invitation to the Portland people to visit Pendleton during their street fair and harvest carnival, from September 18 to 22, after Portland's big fair is over. It is to be a unique entertainment, with music, frolic, and a complete exhibit of the county's resources.' Regarding the grain situation in the Pendleton district, Mr. Lathrop said that this year's crop had fallen off considerably, but that the quality of the grain yielded was unusually fine, and had suffered no damage by the recent rains."

HANS STRUVE'S LOSS.

One Thousand Sacks of Wheat Destroyed by Fire. A fire on Hans Struve's farm nine miles north of Pendleton on Monday afternoon destroyed 1000 sacks of wheat which had just been threshed. The fire was discovered shortly after 1 o'clock. The engine and separator had pulled away from the setting at 8 o'clock in the morning. Two hours after that one of the threshers went back to get a pair of gloves he had forgotten, and at that time he says, the fire was no fire in sight. The origin of the fire is a matter of pure speculation. The wheat was fully insured.

Mr. Struve is one of the extensive wheat growers of Umatilla county, having 900 acres this year, which, as far as threshed, has yielded 30 bushels to the acre.

WHEAT FIELD NOTES.

Facts About Prominent Farmers and Figures Regarding Yield.

E. Himebaugh, formerly in the lumber business in Pendleton, has gone to California, whether his wife preceded him last spring. Mr. Himebaugh goes to California with confidence that his interests here are all right. He has 800 acres of wheat that is yielding 22 bushels to the acre. Neagle Brothers have 200 acres of wheat adjoining that of Mr. Himebaugh, north of Pendleton, that is likewise yielding 22 bushels to the acre. William Gillette's threshing outfit is temporarily laid up for repairs, putting

some new tubes in the boiler. After threshing Himebaugh and Neagle Brothers' wheat the Gillette machine will "set" on W. J. Furnish's farm. T. K. Beard, of Modesto, Calif., has recently spent several days in Pendleton, and left Monday evening for Yakima, where he will harvest 12,000 sacks of wheat. He owns 2500 acres of land in Umatilla county, 1300 of which is in wheat this year, being farmed by Dave Nelson. Oscar Dahlgren has 100 acres in which is likewise owned by Mr. Beard, the latter getting one-third of the wheat in both cases. J. M. Bentley is acting as agent or Mr. Beard, who will return from Yakima Friday, stay here for a few days, then return to his home in California.

J. M. Ferguson has a half section, or 320 acres, of wheat near Havana station that is going 38 bushels to the acre, and is consequently about as good as any in that region.
