#### PROGRESSIVE PENDLETON.

The Opinion of a Recent Visitor to the Towns of Eastern Oregon.

A representative of "The New Age," published in Portland, recently visited Pendleton. He spoke of the town in his paper, as follows:

Pendleton is an ideal city in many respects. Its resources are manifold, the grain fields which surround it, however, being the chief source of revenue. Not much less in extent is its range products—cattle, sheep, horses, hogs and wool. Hundreds of thousands of dollars are being turned into the avenues of business in Pendleton, as the seasons pass, from these resources—and they are now only in the first stage of development.

Pendleton is admirably located as the center of an immense business. It is a pretty place to view and its residences, as well as its business blocks, are modern in style of architecture and about them all is an air of comfort and permanency. In the business houses one always hears the clink of money and sees the hurry necessary in a great diversity of business transactions.

The two leading banks (the Pendleton Savings bank and the First National bank of Pendleton) do a most excellent business. They are firm as the rock of Gibraltar and each is conducted by a corps of officers and assistants second to none on the coast.

Pendleton is probably the first city of Eastern Oregon. The wealth of resources tributary to it and the character of the men developing them make it so.

#### SIGNS FOR STREET CORNERS.

#### Pendleton Becoming a City By Gradual Development.

Pendleton is quite similar to New York, Chicago, Philadelphia and other large cities in that each started into existence on a small scale. Perhaps each of the above cities at one stage of their development consisted of only one house, and a pretty small one at that. Each at one time only had one store, where "flour, nails and hardware" were sold across the same counter, while the prominent business sat around the stove and discussed international problems, some of which they settled permanently, while they wisely left some of the more important ones open for discussion and arbitration at a later date.

One evening when Nero was riding around in the suburbs of Rome in a go-cart without a tailboard, in those days called a chariot, he got lost because there were no numbers or names on the street corners, so he could tell where he was. He issued a manifesto or two, and in this a few days there were signboards on all the street corners. Out in the country they didn't have to use signboards, for all roads led to Rome. From that day to this, there has been more or less trouble over the street signboard proposition, and it is one that is being agitated gently in Pendleton at present. When large crowds gather in this city, as happens at Fourth of July celebrations and on such days, and as will occur during the Street Fair and Harvest Carnival, the absence of corner signs to designate the streets is noticeable.

The labeling of the streets at the different intersections would be of great convenience to merchants who use delivery wagons, as the drivers could be more expeditious, and it would be more pleasant for the purchasers as well; it would be of advantage to strangers in getting to their respective destinations; it would save a great deal of trouble generally. In fact, to make another milestone in Pendleton's history, a thorough and systematic numbering of houses and labeling of streets would be in order.

#### THE CARNIVAL AND STREET FAIR.

#### A Benefit Ball and Public Weddings. Livestock Exhibits.

A benefit ball for the fair and carnival will be given next Saturday evening at the armory. It was decided at a meeting of the fair and carnival last night that the ball should be given and that the hall be decorated for the occasion. A. M. Stringer, the artist and official designer, will attend to this part of the work. He will make the hall most brilliant for the occasion and show his ability in that line of work. James E. Krause, chairman of the committee on entertainment, is arranging the details at this time and everyone is invited to attend. Tickets will be one dollar for dancers, and twenty-five cents for spectators. Everybody will want to see the hall in its gay trappings as arranged by Mr. Stringer.

The Street Fair and Harvest Carnival Association are arranging for five public weddings during the fair here, September 18 to 22. Young people are hereby notified to "file their applications." One couple is wanted from south of Pendleton, one couple from Holts, one couple from Milton, one couple from Athena, and a couple from the reservation has already been secured. These public weddings will be conducted in good taste, and the couples will be presented with some valuable presents. They will receive the gracious blessing of the most august majesty, the queen of the carnival. Notice is given thus early in order that the management may make the necessary arrangements.

People desiring to bring livestock, fruits or grains for competition should report their entries not later than September 10. It is imperative that the management of the street fair and carnival know what, and how many, will be the entries in order that arrangements may be made for placing them. Report entries at once, if possible, for live stock to Joseph Hoek, chairman of the live stock department, and of the grains and fruits at the office of the superintendent. The entries of livestock must show pedigree and register.

#### LEHMAN SPRINGS.

#### Game is Plentiful and the Season is Coming to a Close.

Lehman Springs, Aug. 20.—Mrs. Sheridan and daughters, Misses Leo, Gertrude and Maudie, the Shiner boys from Pendleton and "Doc" Matlock, of Heppner, went on a hunting and fishing excursion to Fly valley. They are expected to return to the springs today.

Lee Drake, of Pendleton, was the victim of an accident the other day in the bathing pool. Having taken a dive his head was just coming to the surface of the water when his capmate, Warren Gibbs, also of Pendleton, made a leap from the spring-board and alighted squarely upon it. Mr. Drake was rendered unconscious by the rude shock, but suffered only temporarily.

County Judge G. A. Hartman, Recorder J. W. Maloney, John T. Lawlith, and Jack Beckwith have arrived in state and captured the springs. They are enjoying life as she is and ought to be enjoyed.

Herbert Thomson and Oscar Rust have been absent on a deer hunt. John Endicott and Mr. Thomson went out several days ago and killed one deer within five miles of the springs.

Game is plentiful and signs of deer are numerous, although not a great many have been killed. Hunters generally use shotguns or small rifles, 22-caliber frequently, when they start out exploring, consequently the big game goes free.

#### SHOT WHILE AT WORK.

#### Gus Zitzman, a Malheur County Rancher, Assassinated.

Gus Zitzman was shot and killed by some person unknown while working in his hay field on the little Malheur river, near Westfall, Malheur county, last Friday morning. Zitzman was a rancher and an old settler. The facts, as near as they can be learned, are to the effect that Zitzman was mowing when a bullet struck him in the neck, killing him instantly. Zitzman had some trouble with a neighbor a day or so previously and it is supposed by some that the assassination was the result of the quarrel.

Gus Zitzman has been a familiar figure in his neighborhood for a long time in the past. He was unmarried and given to fits of anger, during which he sometimes shot his own work horses or other animals about his farm and made threats of bodily harm. He was old in his ways but respected for his honest traits. He was a German by birth and about 45 years of age. The coroner is conducting an investigation.

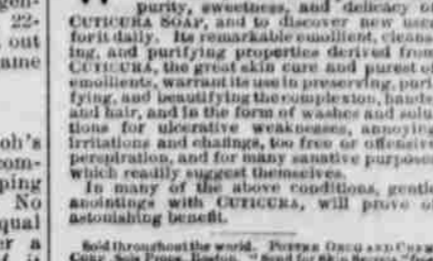
I feel that the American citizen should approach the ballot box on national election day of 1900 with patriotic awe akin to the spirit of earnestness which characterized the patriots of '76. He should vote in no spirit of partisanship, or selfishness, or carelessness, but in the spirit of patriotic worthiness of a true American. I feel that the ethical standard of the ballots on that day will give victory and permanence to the doctrine of popular government, or it will herald the coming of the emperor, the military and the autocracy.

I am, therefore, impressed that my duty as a patriot and a Christian leads me to unite my voice and my vote with those who stand for the old but tried and true principles of the Declaration of Independence, as against those who (purposely or unwittingly) would mar the fabric of freedom by the renewal of the scarlet thread of constitutional liberty.

The former, I believe, are the friends and supporters of William Jennings Bryan and Adlai Ewing Stevenson; the latter are the coadjutors and partisans of William McKinley and Theodore Roosevelt. I cannot more fittingly close this letter than by quoting a few words from the last message received from my beloved father, a republican from Portland, Ore., under date of July 30, he says:

"It seems to me that if it was ever the duty of a citizen who lifts his eyes toward heaven for guidance to work in politics that time is now. Heaven grant that the one hundredth anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence may witness the inauguration of William J. Bryan as our president. And I believe the administration of the latter will be just as good and great a blessing to our country as was that of the former."
