GENERAL NEWS.

Brossi, the assassin of King Humbert, has asked for a postponement of his trial until witnesses can arrive from the United States.

The 20th inst. was the 11th day of 100-degree hot weather and hot winds in the corn belt section of Kansas. On the 20th the thermometer reached 115 degrees.

Six men lost their lives at Guthrie, O. T., by the caving in of a well. They were Howard Kille, R. T. Shafroth, H. R. Wales, Jerome Hill, S. S. Stude and John Meade.

Bob Fitzsimmons has been offered, by the New York World, \$100,000 by a Canadian of high financial standing to lose his fight with Sharkey. Fitzsimmons treated the suggestion with contempt.

Maryland has been ravaged by terrific electrical wind and rain storms within the last day or two. Several lives have been lost, five or six persons injured, and the estimated aggregate loss to property is about \$75,000.

According to census figures just made public the population of St. Paul is 163,332, an increase over 1890 of 30,476, or 22.89 per cent. The population of Minneapolis is 202,718, an increase over 1890 of 37,980, or 23.05 per cent.

Women of Victoria, Australia, have started a movement against woman suffrage similar to the American anti-suffrage movement. Fifteen hundred women have signed a petition against the woman suffrage bill.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Mrs. Ella Cook died at her home in Salem Tuesday night of lung trouble, aged 84 years. She came to Oregon from Ohio in 1850. She was widely known.

Miss Griffith, of the Waldo Hills, near Salem, has orders for 100 pairs of live Chinese pheasants for shipment out of the state. She receives \$5 a pair for them.

Mrs. A. Swanson, a victim of the Fourth of July street-car accident, at Tacoma, died Tuesday from the result of her injuries. This makes 44 deaths as the result of the wreck.

Mayor Eastman, of Vancouver, Wash., has vetoed the ordinance to license slot machines, on the ground that the city has no power to license what the state law makes illegal. The veto was sustained.

Within a month the Sumpter Valley railroad will reach Clifford, 16 miles east of Sumpter. The statement is authorized by C. W. Nibley, president of the company. The route is said to be costing from \$12,000 to \$13,000 a mile.

Ellsworth Post, of the Grand Army of the Republic, at Corvallis, has abandoned its organization and surrendered its charter. The abandonment of the organization was on account of depleted membership and limited attendance at the meetings.

N. R. Doty, a pioneer of 1844, and one of the most respected and influential residents of the Willamette valley section, died at his home, near Jefferson Tuesday, from a paralytic stroke. He was in his 90th year, but up to the time of the stroke was as spry as a boy.

Charlie, the 5-year-old son of R. L. Alkin, a carpenter at The Dalles, fell from the second floor of a barn a distance of about 15 feet, and struck on his head. Doctors were sent for, but on examination it was found that he had only suffered from a severe shock.

As a result of the purchase of the Ilwaco railroad by the O. R. & N. Co., Long Beach resorts will be provided with first-class transportation service. The steamer T. J. Potter will make regular daily trips through to Ilwaco, connecting there with trains for the various resorts.

Joseph Howard and wife, with 11 children, William Utlock and wife, with 12 children, and George Everest and wife, with 11 children, have closed a contract to pick the hops on the Berger place, near Portland. In the three families there are forty people, ranging from 3 to 64 years.

Fred Thompson, who is employed as fireman by the O. R. & N. company while in the act of blowing off steam from an engine that was about to leave La Grande, in some manner got his face in front of the steam pipe and received a very severe scalding. He is getting along nicely and will soon recover.

W. J. BRYAN AT TOPEKA

Received With Tumultuous Applause by a Vast Audience.

REPUBLICAN PARTY AND GREENBACKS

The Vital Question to Be Decided is Whether the Government or the Banks Shall Issue the Money.

Topeka, Aug. 23.—W. J. Bryan arrived at Topeka at 11 a. m. today. He received the city's appointment to receive the official notification of his nomination to the presidency at the hands of the national people's party. The Bryan party was met at the depot by carriages and escorted to the National hotel. The march from the depot was an ovation. At the capital grounds the notification was made by Thomas M. Patterson, of Colorado, who made the notification speech. When he concluded Bryan arose promptly and began the delivery of his speech of acceptance. There was a vast audience present and he was received with tumultuous applause.

Bryan's address included remarks on the leading issues in general. He devoted considerable time to the discussion of imperialism, reiterating his views, as frequently expressed in public. In discussing the currency question, Bryan charged the republican party with the intention to retire the greenbacks, and said: "Populists believe in the irredeemable greenback, while democrats believe in greenbacks redeemable in coin, but the vital question, as far as paper money is concerned, is whether the government or the banks shall issue it. There will be time enough to discuss the redeemability of the greenback when the greenback itself is saved from the annihilation which threatens it. The republican party is committed to a currency system which necessitates a perpetual debt, while the populist stands himself in agreement with democrats, who believe in paying off the national debt as soon as possible."

President McKinley May Not Go. Washington, Aug. 23.—Secretary Cortelyou has just advised M. H. Harper, executive director of the National Encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic that the condition of the public business is of such immediate importance it will delay the president's departure from Washington and may possibly prevent him from visiting Chicago at this time.

CASHIER ROBBED.

Attacked on a Pullman Car and \$70,000 Taken From Him.

Omaha, Aug. 23.—Edward E. Balch, the assistant cashier of the Omaha National bank, was assaulted in his berth on the Northwestern road, near Boone, Iowa, this morning and robbed of \$70,000. His injuries are not dangerous. Mr. and Mrs. Amoretti, of this city, was also victimized by the robbers to the extent of a small sum. The affair is mysterious. Everyone in the car was asleep at the time and there is no clue to the perpetrators of the robbery.

Railroad people say that Balch lost only \$130.

Robbery on Illinois Central. Omaha, Aug. 23.—W. A. Paxton, a leading capitalist of this city, was robbed during the night while sleeping in a berth on the Illinois Central railroad. The thief secured \$150 and some valuable papers.

DAMAGE BY FOREST FIRES.

The Loss Will Be \$10,000,000 in Wyoming and Colorado.

Denver, Aug. 23.—C. E. Wantland, general land agent for the Union Pacific railroad, estimates the damage, present and prospective, caused by the forest fires now burning in Colorado and Wyoming, at \$10,000,000. The loss of timber burned, according to Mr. Wantland, is only a comparatively small item of the total damage. "In many places," he said, "fires are spreading over almost bare country, land where there is nothing but young growth, which might have made forests 10 and 20 years hence if it had not been for these fires."

Arctic Explorer Dead.

New York, Aug. 23.—Capt. John Wall Wilson, who was one of the two survivors of the second Grinnell Arctic expedition, is dead at John's hospital in Brooklyn from an operation for appendicitis, performed eight months ago. The operation was believed to have been successful and Capt. Wilson appeared to be recovering until three days ago when a relapse came resulting in his death. Capt. Wilson was 69 years old. He won fame as the navigator of Dr. Kane's expedition into the far north.

It Is Senator Dolliver Now.

Des Moines, Ia., Aug. 23.—Gov. Shaw tonight announced the appointment of Congressman J. P. Dolliver to be United States senator to fill the vacancy caused by the death of John H. Gear. The appointment runs to March 4, 1901. The legislature does not meet in regular session till 1902 and Dolliver's appointment is likely to be renewed to run until his successor is elected.

Thieves Go Free.

Havana, Aug. 23.—All persons accused of complicity in the Havana customs house frauds were acquitted today. The president of the court has inserted in the decision a clause to the effect that he thinks four of the accused are guilty and they may be taken before the supreme court.

F. A. Falkenberg Re-Elected Head Consul.

Salt Lake, Aug. 23.—The Woodmen of the World elected officers here as follows: Head Consul F. A. Falkenberg, Denver; Head Auditor Bertsch, Denver; Head Clerk Book, Oakland; Head Adviser Bartholomew, San Diego, Calif.; and Head Banker Cooper, Portland, were re-elected.

The other officers elected were: Head managers, W. C. Hawley, Salem, Ore.; C. A. Koopli, Seattle and C. V. Benson, Lovel, Colo.; head escort, W. A. Wyman, Cheyenne; head watchman, N. O. Baldwin, Pomroy, Wash.; sentry, Dr. B. L. Stevens, Idaho; editor and publisher Pacific Woodman, A. B. Keith, Helena.

THE CHINESE SITUATION.

CHINESE TROOPS HAVE CUT OFF COMMUNICATION WITH PEKIN.

Consuls of Foreign Governments at Shanghai Have Had No News Since the 17th Inst.

London, Aug. 23.—The foreign consuls at Shanghai, not having received anything from Peking later than August 17, fear the Chinese troops are operating along the rear of the allies, cutting off all communication.

The attempted uprising at Hankow is causing uneasiness. Twenty-seven warships have assembled at Shanghai and Woo Song, their crews numbering 7000 men.

Soldiers Go to Manila.

Washington, Aug. 23.—Orders have been issued by the war department directing that the troops on the transport Meade, intended for China, be sent to Manila. The government is satisfied there are now sufficient soldiers in China for present purposes. Orders also have been issued diverting all other transports now en route for China to Manila.

William Me, and Emperor Will, Agree.

Washington, Aug. 23.—Official dispatches received this morning state that the German government had taken action substantially similar to that of the United States in rejecting China's peace proposals.

Crisis Approaching in China.

Washington, Aug. 23.—President McKinley fully realizes that a crisis is rapidly approaching in China and the questions which may involve the life or death of the empire may, at any time, be presented for solution. The president deems it his duty to remain at the seat of government until the crisis, for the present at least, has passed.
