The Dalles Times-Mountaineer: Five young carrier pigeons belonging to Sam Wilkinson made a good fly from Umatilla here this morning against a strong wind. They were turned loose at Umatilla this morning at 6 o'clock and arrived here at 9:10. The birds are about 13 weeks old.

Mrs. F. B. VanCleave died at the Hotel Eastern at 4:30 Wednesday evening of consumption. She was aged about 25 years and was formerly Miss Nora Gamble, of Echo. Her husband is an engineer with a threshing outfit.

Mrs. Anna Gamble and Elmer Gamble, mother and brother of deceased, arrived from Echo in time to see Mrs. VanCleave alive. The remains were taken to Echo early this morning on the train due here last night, and were accompanied by Mr. VanCleave, Mrs. Anna Gamble, Elmer Gamble and Rev. and Mrs. A. L. Thoroughman. Interment took place in Echo cemetery this morning.

Right-of-Way. The party of O. R. & N. civil engineers and right-of-way men are going right ahead with their work in connection with the cutoff between Nolin and Coyote. Some trouble is being met with regarding right-of-way. Mr. and Mrs. Henry Miller claim their land to be worth \$100 an acre. They have 540 acres which the new line will cut in two, destroying alfalfa, timber, strawberry patch, and a walnut grove. The railroad would take 18 acres for the right-of-way.

Mr. Dupuis, a neighbor of the Miller's, says he will get his price for the land used by the railroad, and his price is quite steep.

John Temple, for the land the railroad company wants.

The valuations placed upon these lands by their owners will afford a basis for the assessor in future, undoubtedly.

ONE YEAR AGO TODAY. Edwin L. Mims Was Taken to Salem This Morning.

Edwin L. Mims was taken to Salem today by Deputy Sheriff Joe Blakely and T. Taylor, to serve a sentence of five years in the penitentiary for the killing of J. Henry Miller between 11 and 12 o'clock on the night of August 23, 1899. The case was fought in circuit court, where Mims was convicted of manslaughter and sentenced to pay \$1000 fine and undergo imprisonment in the state penitentiary for five years. The case was appealed to the supreme court of the state, and was affirmed. A motion was then filed for a rehearing before the supreme court, but that was overruled and now the mandate of that body will have to be carried out.

Mr. Mims will have to serve his term of five years, less rebate for good behavior, notwithstanding the fact that he has been confined in the county jail for the past year.

There is a peculiar feature to this case. In the exact one year today has elapsed between the commission of the crime and the departure of Edwin L. Mims for the penitentiary.

H. J. Bean and J. J. Balleary for the state, and Carter & Raley and James A. Fee, for the defendant, used their best legal talents in the case.

Mr. Mims was arrested and placed in Pendleton jail at 11 o'clock a. m. on August 24, 1899. One year from that time to an hour, he will arrive at Salem and be imprisoned in the state penitentiary.

ALLEN JOHNSON IS INSANE. He Came From Walla Walla and is Now in Jail.

Allen Johnson, who says he came to Pendleton Wednesday afternoon, arriving here at 5 o'clock, is in the county jail charged with insanity. He was taken in charge by Officer Coffman on account of the manner in which he was acting, and placed in the city jail. Officer Coffman got Deputy Sheriff Davis, and the two of them took Johnson to the county jail.

Dr. F. W. Vincent gave Mr. Johnson his attention this morning and came to the conclusion that he is sick and insane. Mr. Johnson showed the officers and Doctor Vincent a scar on the top of the left side of his head, caused by a blow six or seven years ago, which fractured the skull. That has tended to produce insanity.

Dr. Vincent expressed the opinion that the best thing that could be done would be to send Mr. Johnson to the asylum. County Judge Hartman will act upon the case, and he will in all probability be committed to the asylum.

He was laboring under the hallucination Wednesday evening that he was being chased by a number of persons who had designs upon his life. This morning he was despondent and evinced suicidal tendencies.

THROWN FROM A WAGON. A Union County Farmer Seriously Injured Near Elgin.

Andy Hansen, a Dane who resides near Elgin, Union county, was driving near his farm in company with his brother, Chis Hansen, who had lately arrived from the east, when the wagon

in which they were riding struck some obstruction in the road with such violence as to throw Andy out of the wagon, he striking upon the back part of the head and right shoulder with such force as to dislocate and break the shoulder blade and partially paralyze him.

The injured man was placed on the train at La Grande, and taken to the St. Vincent's hospital at Portland. While Chris Hansen went to the plant form to get a package the train pulled out, leaving him behind with the tickets for their fares to Portland, and all their baggage in his possession. The persons in charge of the railroad office at once telegraphed ahead the circumstances of the case, and to have the injured man cared for until the arrival of his brother in Portland, which was done.

WILL NOT PAY.

A Life Insurance Company Refuses to Meet an Obligation.

A big suit has been begun in the Benton county circuit court. It is for the recovery of \$5000 and the plaintiff is Mrs. Mand Geary. The defendant is the Prudential Life Assurance society, of New York. The latter is a life insurance concern in which the late Captain Woodbridge Geary's life was insured for \$5000. The occasion for the suit is the point blank refusal of the insurance people to pay the policy. The premiums were all kept paid up, and proof of death was furnished, but in spite of it all, the company persists in withholding from the bereaved widow that for which the premiums were patiently and promptly paid on the ground that the policy contained a clause prohibiting the insured from engaging in military service without the written consent of the company. This written consent, Mrs. Geary alleges, was obtained, but was destroyed by fire, along with the policy, by the burning of the family residence in Corvallis, where Mrs. Geary lives.

Captain Geary was killed in the Philippines in October of last year.
