LARGE CLAIMS FILED.

Money Value Set Upon Lives Lost By the Sinking of a Ship.

In the United States district court in New York city the hearing of the claims against the French line whose steamship, La Bourgoyne, sank on July 4, 1898, off Sable Island, with great loss of life, occurred Wednesday. It was on this steamer that John Taitonger and his two little boys, residents of this county, lost their lives. Mr. Taitonger was on his way to visit his old home in France.

There are sixty-two claimants against the company, and the amount of them is about \$1,500,000. A petition of the French line prays for a limitation of its liabilities for loss caused by collision which resulted in the foundering of the French liner. The limitation,

according to the federal statute upon the petition is made, is the value of the ship and the freight pending. Inasmuch as all that was left of the ship was a boat and a life raft and the freight sunk with the ship, the liabilities of the company is practically limited to nothing. Therefore all of these claims may be cut off without a cent.

Football Prospects.

A. C. Hanes says the prospects for football for the coming season are bright and that the indications are that Pendleton will be represented by a strong team. An invitation has already been received from the Heppner team for a series of games, and it is presumed that La Grande and Union will also desire to try their skill against Pendleton. It is intended to secure the services of Drew Griffin, of Hansford's hardware store, as coach. Mr. Griffin has had considerable experience in such matters and formerly played with the university team of Eugene. Good, strong, tough, seasoned timber is available, and the best will be utilized.

The convention was called to order by

State Chairman George W. Peck. A

huge picture of William J. Bryan,

draped in the national colors, was

placed in the front of the stage.

Chairman Peck introduced Clark L.

Hood of La Crosse, as temporary

chairman, who spoke briefly on the

issues of the campaign.

The populist state convention, com-

prising about 50 delegates, was in

session at the same time. A. A. Wesley

of Racine, the permanent chairman,

declared that if the democrats wanted

to fuse with the populists the first

advance must be made by the other

fellows. The advance was made and

the populists endorsed the democratic

presidential electors and decided not

to name a state ticket.

Drouth in Kansas.

Two-thirds of Kansas, west of the three easternmost tiers of counties, is experiencing one of the most severe drouths in the history of the state, and the general opinion is that the Kansas corn crop will be the smallest in proportion to its requirements for feeding that has been raised in many years. In 1899 there was 225,000,000 bushels. Secretary Coburn's report of conditions in August indicated a yield this year of about 145,000,000 bushels. Since then there have been two weeks of hot, dry weather, which has further materially reduced conditions, and the most liberal estimates of well-informed men on 'change do not exceed 100,000,000 bushels, while many place the crop at not over 75,000,000 bushels. The plowing for winter wheat is delayed by the dry condition of the soil. Pastures are dry and stock water in many districts is scarce.

An Exception to the Law of Nature.

A civil engineer who is in Alaska has written home to Chicago that the rails on the Chilkoot Pass railway expand with the cold instead of contracting, as they would be supposed to do, save the Chicago Chronicle. A temperature ranging from 12 to 40 degrees below zero Fahrenheit would not apparently affect the length of rails, but severer cold than that would be attended with expansion. This is certainly an exception to a law of nature, although water shrinks as it cools, until 39 degrees Fahrenheit is reached, when it begins to expand.

Gift to Cronje From Russia.

The piece of plate subscribed for by 20,000 Russians to be given to General Cronje is surmounted by a picturesque group representing a mounted lion vied with, with rifle on thigh, standing on the lookout on the summit of a steep crag made of a block of porphyry. The base of this block is hollowed out and shows a woman kneeling behind cover and firing a rifle. A young boy half hides behind the woman. The stand is oval in form, measuring 28 inches, and is of solid silver, richly enameled. The whole piece is three feet in height.

COME TO AN AGREEMENT.

Great Northern and Northern Pacific Will Divide Territory.

It is said in New York railroad circles that some kind of deal or traffic agreement will be arrived at between the Great Northern and the Northern Pacific for a strict maintenance of rates, and that the agreement will also provide that each road shall have undisputed sway in its own territory. There will be no more canvassing for business by the Great Northern in territory of the Northern Pacific or by the Northern Pacific in the territory of the Great Northern. Limits of territory of the roads will be mutually agreed upon, and should these conditions be brought about it would redound to the profits of the roads not only in absolute maintenance of rates, but also in a less expense involved in securing business. It is said that the Union Pacific and O. R. & N. may also be parties to the compact. The agreement will, it is estimated, apply not only to land lines, but to the trans-Pacific lines of the companies.

Just how much truth there is in these rumors is at present hard to discover, but it can be said, on very excellent authority that the relations between the Northern Pacific and the Great Northern are at present very harmonious.

An increase in Northern Pacific earnings for the second week of August to \$44,757 is partially explained by the fact that the St. Paul & Duluth is included. St. Paul & Duluth earnings have not been reported separately since July 1. Since the Northern Pacific earnings increased \$208,284.
