INDIAN WOMEN MURDERED.

"Columbia George" Arrested Charged With the Crime.

Annie Edna, an Indian woman aged about 35 years, was murdered between 7 and 8 o'clock last evening at her home a half mile southwest of the agency buildings, four miles east of this city. District Attorney T. C. Bailey, Coroner W. C. Cole, Dr. F. W. Vincent and Sheriff William Blakely went to the scene this forenoon and the following is the sum of their investigations: Columbia George and Tena-tua, two Indians, were in Pendleton, drinking together and returned to the reservation together. Shortly after 7 o'clock p. m., Anna Edna ran from her cabin and tent across the gulch to the home of H. E. Lamar, and asked Mrs. Lamar to give her grease to drink—that she had been poisoned by drinking from a bottle handed to her by Columbia George. Mrs. Lamar went to the home of E. F. McKelvey close by and got the medicine asked for, which was taken to the Lamar cabin by Mr. Woodard. By that time Annie Edna was in convulsions. During the intervals between the convulsions she explained minutely the manner in which she had been poisoned, and within half an hour was a corpse.

This forenoon upon arrival of the Pendleton jury the following jury was impaneled: Clarence Hamlin, foreman; Reuben Weber, L. B. Gilman, H. E. Lamar, David Hoser and Jacob Lewis. The testimony of six witnesses was introduced, after which the jury brought in a verdict as above outlined. Surgeon Cole and Vincent made an autopsy and preserved such portions of the body for further examination as they thought would be necessary. The evidence was so strong against Columbia George that Sheriff Blakely was close in pursuit of him before the verdict became known. The sheriff had trailed his man back to Pendleton, and while going from the court house down the street in search of his man, met Chief Brisco and Deputy Sheriff. Chief Brisco knew both Columbia George and Tena-tua, and having pointed them out to the deputy sheriff, he quickly took them in. Both the Indians are now in the county jail to await further judicial developments.

THE ASSESSMENT FRAUD.

Each Taxpayer Tries to Beat the County While Each County Tries to Beat the State.

This year's assessment for Umatilla county is \$5,025,172.90, net taxable, about a million and a quarter of dollars less than last year. There is a great depreciation in merchandise and stocks in trade, and the amount of money assessed is only \$2,525—but little more than a single business enterprise, alone requires to carry on its business, says the Weston Leader. It is unreasonable to suppose that Umatilla county property has decreased so much in value, and the presumption is that Assessor Hagan is trying to keep even with Multnomah in "working down" values, so that we will have to pay no more than our share to the

state. Chorus, this assessment business: The individual tries to beat the county assessor and the county tries to beat the state, and we all go merrily down the line, a lot of knaves, liars and perjurers. There seems to be no remedy, unless it is offered by the single tax theories of Henry George and Sam Jackson. A great improvement, morally and financially, would be a state law compelling every county assessor to assess property at its reasonable cash valuation. Just now each assessor is a law unto himself, and the result is an irregular, unequal, slipshod assessment.

Wool Then and Now.

G. W. Rugg, who resides in Pendleton, and whose sheep flock around on the hillsides near Kamela, was interviewed today. He and his brother, A. W. Rugg, constitute the famous firm of Rugg Brothers, and they are the possessors of 10,000 head of sheep at present. Mr. Rugg states that his firm sold all the wool it possessed early last spring at 12 1/2 cents per pound, while at present the price ranges from 10 to 12. Regarding the price of sheep, \$2.25 is the basis for mixed bands of lambs and ewes, but Mr. Rugg said Rugg Brothers' sheep could not be bought for that.

MAKES 82 MILES AN HOUR.

Cigar-Shaped Train Invented by a Chicagoan Breaks All Records.

The cigar-shaped train invented by Fred C. Adams of Chicago smashed all records on the Philadelphia & Baltimore road the other night, when the run was made from Philadelphia to Baltimore in 1 hour and 41 minutes. During part of the trip the train attained a speed of 82 miles an hour. It was exactly 4:30 o'clock when Mr. Adams' creation started. The royal blue had gone out 22 minutes earlier and this start was believed to be sufficient to enable the regular train to reach Baltimore ahead of the cigar-shaped flyer. The latter, however, made such remarkable time that it caught the regular and had to slow down, losing some minutes. The last time made herebefore between the two cities was 1 hour and 53 minutes. The engine, which drew the Adams train weighed only 35 tons, or 25 tons less than the last locomotives.

TOURISTS IN ITALY.

Italian hotel keepers recently met in Rome to devise means to attract visitors to their country. Strangers leave \$1,200,000 every year, most of it to beggars and extortionate hotel men. The hotel men of Italy are following the example of their Swiss brothers in combining. It is a co-op which class contains the largest firms. If Italy is sincere in wishing to attract strangers the government should take a hand in the movement and whip every lazy, dirty beggar from the streets. It should limit the number of guides and license them. It should imprison any hotel man or carriage driver who extorts anything over a lawful price. Let these nuisances be abolished and then traveling in Italy may become a real pleasure.

Nine bricklayers at work on the new wing at the penitentiary at Salem struck because they lost 14 hours per day by reason of being obliged to get to the prison early in order to get inside the steel fence, and could not get out when their day's work was completed. Their claim was found to be just, and the matter settled to their satisfaction.
