## GENERAL NEWS.

A famine is threatened at Tien Tsin,  
China, owing to the flocking there  
so many refugees from all parts  
of China.

The court house and several adjoin-  
ing buildings were destroyed by fire  
here at Kingfisher, Oklahoma, causing  
a loss of \$50,000.

Emperor William met the Prince of  
Wales at Berlin, at the railway station,  
in an automobile, and greeted his  
uncle, the prince, with a kiss full upon  
the lips.

A Moses in the person of a beautiful  
full-blooded Indian woman has ap-  
peared among the Delawares, Chicka-  
saws, Cherokees and Creeks in Kansas  
and is leading them into a new  
promised land in Mexico.

Seven hundred persons attended the  
harvest home festival at Griggstown,  
N. J., to celebrate the gathering of  
the year's crops. Two hours after the  
festival began 50 persons in attendance  
were stricken with serious illness from  
something they had eaten but none of  
them died.

A Chicago packing company has re-  
ceived an order from the Russian gov-  
ernment for 6,000,000 pounds of "beef  
on the hoof," to feed the soldiers of  
the war in China. This is the largest  
order of the kind in the history of the  
Chicago meat trade. It will take 3000  
fatted cattle to fill the order. The  
cattle will be sent from San Francisco  
via Hawaii and Japan.

## PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Five sportsmen of Colfax killed 114  
prairie chickens near La Crosse one  
day last week.

Mrs. Jollette Lake, aged 25 years,  
wife of Harry Lake, a Baker City  
official, died Sunday. She leaves two  
sons besides a husband.

At Roseburg, Saturday night, a  
wagon driven by P. J. Mair, who had  
with him his wife and child, was run  
into by a team and the child was in-  
stantly killed.

The steamship Ohio has arrived at  
Seattle from Nome with 332 passen-  
gers and treasure estimated at \$2,000,  
000. About one-third of the gold came  
from Nome, The Klondike contributed  
the remainder.

EP. Smith, of Seio, before his death,  
asked that \$3000, due from the A. O.  
U. W., be used in buying a home for  
his daughter, Mrs. Mack. His wish  
was respected by his agents, who last  
week purchased an 80-acre farm in  
Marion county for Mrs. Mack and  
stocked it.

Steward Steele, of Walla Walla,  
pierced his left foot with the prong of  
a derrier hay fork about four weeks  
ago. Blood poisoning set in, necessitat-  
ing the lancing of the foot last Mon-  
day. Unless some improvement sets in  
soon amputation of his foot may be-  
come necessary.

Kenneth Harrington Bellair is under  
arrest charged with insanity at Spo-  
kane. His attorneys claim Bellair is a  
nephew of Gladstone, a relative of  
Lord Salisbury, and a former member  
of the London Stock Exchange. He is  
said to receive a large income from an  
estate in England.

Alfred A. Allan, son of Mrs. G. D.  
Steele, of near Carson, and a returned  
volunteer from the Philippines, died of  
a complication of diseases Saturday at  
St. Elizabeth's hospital in Baker City.  
The deceased had not been in good  
health since his return from Manila,  
where he went as a member of Co. D,  
2nd regiment, Oregon volunteers.

## LI HUNG CHANG IS HELD

Will Be Retained on Board Ship Until  
the Opening of Negotiations.

## THE EMPEROR AND EMPRESS ESCAPE

Chaffee Will Furnish an Escort From Peking to  
the Baroness Von Ketteler, Who is  
an American Woman.

Paris, Aug. 28.—Admiral Courville,  
the French commander, has cabled the  
navy department that a council of ad-  
mirals has notified the foreign legation  
at Peking that it has been decided to  
hold Li Hung Chang on board ship  
until the opening of negotiations be-  
tween the powers and China.

London, Aug. 28.—A dispatch from  
Shanghai says the Chinese officials  
there have informed the foreign con-  
suls that the emperor, the dowager em-  
press and Prince Tuan have arrived in  
the neighborhood of Tai Yuan Fu,  
which is 240 miles southwest of Peking.

Hong Kong, Aug. 28.—General Goto  
commands the Japanese forces occupy-  
ing Amoy. Large bodies of troops have  
been landed and Nordenfeldt guns have  
been mounted, commanding the city.  
Many Chinese are leaving. The British  
cruiser Isis sailed from here to-  
day, under sealed orders. It is thought  
she is going to Amoy. Canton is  
quiet.

An Escort for the Baroness.  
Washington, Aug. 28.—The war de-  
partment has received the following  
dispatch from General Chaffee: "I  
have offered assistance to Baroness Von  
Ketteler. Will furnish her transportation  
and escort her to Tien Tsin within  
a few days."

The Baroness Von Ketteler is the  
widow of the murdered German minis-  
ter to China and is an American, she  
being a Detroit, Mich., girl.

No Siege Battery Needed.  
Washington, Aug. 28.—The following  
dispatch was received from General  
Chaffee: "Taku.—The siege battery is  
not needed."

This is in reply to an inquiry sent to  
Chaffee relative to a shipboard battery,  
which was taken from Manila to  
Nagasaki, to be sent to China, of  
need.

## American Soldiers Killed.

Washington, Aug. 28.—The casualty  
list of the fight outside of Tien Tsin,  
August 19, is as follows: The wounded:  
Troop A, trumpeter, Fred Corrigan;  
privates, Hilo, Samuel Harsfield,  
John Vauvickie; Troop C, trumpeter,  
Edward E. Lyon; Troop D, McAllister.

Troops Advancing Northward.  
Vienna, Aug. 28.—The commander of  
the Austrian cruiser Kaiserin Maria  
Theresa, in a dispatch from Cho Foo,  
not dated, reports the Russian and  
Japanese troops are advancing north-  
ward from Peking.

McKinley's Cabinet Meets.  
Washington, Aug. 8.—The cabinet  
today devoted most of its session to  
considerations of the difficulties ex-  
perienced in communicating with Gen-  
eral Chaffee and other American com-  
manders. The evidence was found in  
late dispatches from them that some  
person or persons have been purposely  
delaying messages from Peking and  
Tien Tsin to Washington. It was de-  
termined to reopen direct communica-  
tion by means of a war vessel. Either  
the New Orleans or the Princeton will  
be sent to Cho Foo, where the military  
cable system begins, free from Chinese  
interference.

The sufficiency of Li Hung Chang's  
credentials as plenipotentiary to con-  
clude a settlement with the powers on  
behalf of China is now a subject for  
active telegraphic negotiations among  
the powers. Some of the powers have  
taken ground that Li no longer repre-  
sents anything tangible, but none of  
them, so far as learned upon inquiry  
here, has finally decided this impor-  
tant question beyond recall. The  
attitude of the United States is that  
Earl Li's credentials appear authentic.

Americans Arrive at Tien Tsin.  
Washington, Aug. 28.—The following  
dispatch received:  
Tien Tsin, Aug. 25.—Fifty Ameri-  
cans, including the Misses Condit,  
Smith, Woodward and Paine, have ar-  
rived here from Peking, which city they  
left five days ago.

Rumor Chinese Retaken Peking Untrue.  
Washington, Aug. 28.—No confirma-  
tion comes from any quarter of the  
report from Russian sources that the  
Chinese had retaken Peking and the  
war department officials here discredit  
the story.

Not Needed in China.  
Washington, Aug. 28.—An order was  
sent this morning to Kobe, Japan, to  
divert the First United States cavalry  
and animals from that port to Manila,  
instead of allowing them to proceed to  
Taku.

West Wins Over Walcott.  
New York, Aug. 28.—Tommy West  
won from Joe Walcott in the twelfth  
night. The bout had gone 11 rounds  
very much in Walcott's favor. When  
the bell rang for the twelfth round to  
the surprise of everybody Walcott re-  
fused to go on, claiming that he had  
injured his left arm. Referee Charley  
White suspecting crookedness insisted  
on Walcott continuing, but the negro  
refused to do so, which left White no  
alternative other than to declare West  
the winner.

Fitzsimmons Retires.  
New York, Aug. 28.—Robert Fitz-  
simmons announces his retirement  
from the pugilistic ring. He made an  
ineffectual attempt today to get a  
match for the heavy-weight champion-  
ship with James J. Jeffries, to take  
place before the Horton law expires at  
midnight next Friday.

Population of San Francisco.  
Washington, Aug. 28.—The popula-  
tion of San Francisco, according to the  
official count of the twelfth census, is  
342,782, an increase of 14.64 per cent.

Population of Boston.  
Washington, Aug. 28.—The popula-  
tion of Boston, as announced by the  
census bureau, is 560,992, an increase of  
5.67 per cent.

## WALLA WALLA NEWS.

August Herman Made a Bank of His Old  
Shoe and Lost His Savings.

Walla Walla, Aug. 28.—August Her-  
man, who lives on the Yellow Hawk  
toward the cemetery, was robbed by  
unknown parties yesterday of \$220.  
The money had been hidden in Her-  
man's bedroom in an old shoe and was  
evidently taken by someone acquainted  
with the premises. No clue to the  
thief has as yet been obtained.

## Arrest of Pat Carey.

Pat Carey, who is wanted in Weston,  
Or., for the robbery of James Richie,  
was arrested by Sheriff Kees and  
Special Deputy John Lambert in this  
city yesterday afternoon. He will be  
taken to Weston today.

The crime for which Carey was ar-  
rested was committed about a month  
ago and consisted in the robbery of the  
Richie residence. Carey had been em-  
ployed on the Richie farm for sev-  
eral weeks and was discharged on  
Saturday. The next day while the  
Richies were away from home he re-  
turned and entered the house, stealing  
some clothing and other articles of  
value. The story of the crime, to-  
gether with a description of the thief,  
were telegraphed to this city and the  
local officers have since that time been  
on the lookout for him.

It appears that Carey has been work-  
ing with a harvest crew near Prescott  
and came to town yesterday for the  
first time. There will likely be a  
charge of burglary entered against him.

## Caught Planting Dope.

Five shots from the neighborhood of  
the penitentiary rang out in the clear  
air last night, and startled the resi-  
dents of that vicinity. No one was in-  
jured but two of the penitentiary  
guards caught two desperate ex-con-  
victs in the act of "planting dope"  
for the prisoners. Later last evening  
a third man was arrested and all three  
are securely locked up in the city  
jail. These three men are James E.  
Stevens, "Scotty" Sharp and a man  
named Zarwish.

## Jailed for Assault.

Frank Williams was brought before  
Justice Glasford charged with the  
crime of assault with a deadly weapon  
upon the person of W. J. Winters in  
the Shamrock saloon. The prisoner  
was held to await the action of the  
superior court, his bond being fixed at  
\$500. He went to jail.

## AN OLD SETTLER.

A Turtle Discovered in Connecticut  
With "P. T. B.—1830" on Its Back.

Danbury, Conn., Aug. 28.—Bethel,  
the home of the late P. T. Barnum,  
has many relics of that noted show-  
man, but a new one was added to the  
collection in the last day or so.

Nathan I. Bennett, a New York  
diamond broker, who has a summer  
home in Bethel, recently purchased  
some swamp land which at one time  
belonged to P. T. Barnum's father.

Mr. Bennett while superintending  
some work on the newly acquired land  
found an immense snapping turtle  
weighing at least a hundred pounds.  
He noticed a curious formation on its  
back which was covered with a growth  
of moss. Part of the moss was scraped  
away and the inscription "P. T. B.,  
1830" discovered.

Phineas Taylor Barnum was born in  
1810, consequently he was twenty years  
old when he carved his initials on the  
turtle's back.

## GRAND ARMY IN CHICAGO.

A Parade With 35,000 Veterans in  
Line.

Chicago, Aug. 28.—Along the streets,  
filled with a cheering multitude, 35,  
000 of the life guard of the nation,  
the grand army of the republic,  
marched today. It was their greatest  
parade since that day in 1865, when  
with ranks fresh from the triumphs of  
war, they marched down Pennsylvania  
avenue in Washington. The parade to-  
day is probably the last of great  
parades upon which the members of  
the grand army will march on this  
earth. The average age of the veterans  
is close upon the average span of hu-  
man life.

## Changes of the Earth's Surface.

Islands go and come so constantly  
that none but the admiralty keep  
count of them. Submarine volcanoes  
are responsible for most of these dis-  
appearances, but others are harder to

sign of volcanic action about it. It  
was charted in 1830, its highest point  
being 150 feet. Last year it had gone—  
vanished utterly without leaving a  
trace. On the site of another small  
guano island off the coast of southern  
California recent soundings showed 50  
fathoms of water.

## ANTI-REPUBLICAN FORCES

C. S. Voorhees Will Head the Ticket  
in Washington.

## ROGERS WILL NOT BE RENOMINATED

Populist National Committee in Chicago En-  
dorses Stevenson for Vice-President  
in Place of Towne.

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 28.—The as-  
sembling of the three anti-republican  
state conventions here this morning  
saw the passing of Governor Rogers'  
chances of re-nomination. It seems  
certain that Charles S. Voorhees, of  
Spokane, will get the nomination for  
governor. All three conventions have  
appointed conference committees. The  
populists will insist that the name of  
the people's party shall go at the head  
of the state ticket when fusion occurs.  
The democrats may consent to run un-  
der populist colors, though there are  
many expressions of adverse opinion.  
In case the democrats shall refuse  
there will undoubtedly be a split, the  
populists putting up a full state ticket  
and the democrats and silver men  
fusing and doing likewise.

## STEVENSON ENDORSED.

The Vote in His Favor Was Almost Unan-  
imous.

Chicago, Aug. 28.—At the meeting of  
the people's party national committee  
last night the nomination of Charles  
A. Towne, as the vice presidential  
nominee for the party was accepted and  
the name of Adlai E. Stevenson was  
put in his place. This result was ob-  
tained after long debate. But one test  
vote was taken.

A motion was made to endorse  
Stevenson. For this motion Washburn  
of Massachusetts moved as a substitute  
that a populist be placed upon the  
ticket. The substitute was lost by a  
vote of 24 ayes to 71 nays. The original  
motion was then adopted by a viva  
voce vote. There were 124 members of  
the committee present or represented  
by proxy.

## TOWNE REPLIES TO ROOSEVELT.

A Large Crowd Listens to Him at Du-  
luth.

Duluth, Aug. 28.—The largest  
gathering to listen to a political speech  
that ever assembled in Duluth oc-  
curred last night at the armory when  
Hon. Charles A. Towne opened the  
campaign in a lengthy address in  
which he replied to the recent speech  
of Gov. Roosevelt delivered at St. Paul  
on the occasion of the national conven-  
tion to the league of republican clubs,  
and he also arraigned the administra-  
tion policy in the Philippines.

The speech, which will be used as a  
campaign document, is considered as  
Towne's greatest political effort.  
Towne will leave today or Wednesday  
for Idaho and other western points to  
enter actively into the work of the  
campaign.

Bryan Declines Invitation.  
Chicago, Aug. 28.—W. J. Bryan has  
followed the example of President Mc-  
Kinley and declined the invitation to  
the national encampment of the Grand  
Army of the Republic. He this after-  
noon sent a message to the executive  
committee in charge of the encamp-  
ment, saying:

"Since President McKinley is de-  
tained by public business I believe  
that the proprieties of the occasion de-  
mand that I also decline and relieve  
the reunion of any appearance of  
partisanship."

IGNORANT OF THE LAW.  
Commissioner Peck, of the Paris Expo-  
sition, is Troubled.

Paris, Aug. 28.—Ferdinand W. Peck,  
United States commissioner general to  
the exposition, like all the other  
foreign commissioners except the Brit-  
ish, was decorated with the Legion  
of Honor recently.

Mr. Peck is startled by receiving a  
short, sharp cablegram from the state  
department, asking:

"Did you accept that decoration?"  
The commissioner's woes were ag-  
gravated by a Washington dispatch to  
the Paris papers, announcing that Mr.  
Peck's conduct was the subject of  
official censure and condemnation, and  
declaring that he would either have  
to return the decoration or resign, ac-  
cording to clause 8, section 8, article  
1 of the constitution, only congress can  
authorize an official to accept honors  
from foreign governments.

## BRITISH DEFEAT BOERS.

Heavy Fighting at Machedodorp and  
Boers Less Heavily.

Lorenzo Marques, Aug. 28.—Heavy  
fighting is reported at Machedodorp.  
The Boers are said to have been de-  
feated with a great loss, leaving guns  
and ammunition in the hands of the  
British.

## Twenty-Four Horses Burned.

Blackfoot, Idaho, Aug. 28.—A fire  
this morning destroyed the livery  
stable of Dolph Johnson and about one  
half-block of buildings. Twenty-four  
horses in the stable perished.

## Steamship Tacoma Ashore.

Seattle, Aug. 28.—The steamship  
Tacoma ran ashore this morning, half  
mile south of Alki Point. Tugs have  
gone to her assistance.
