GENERAL NEWS.

Rev. A. M. Hough, who it is under-
stood was a brother-in-law of Jay
Gould, is dead, at the age of 70 years,
from paralysis.

R. G. Dun, of Dun agency fame,
is on his death bed at his home at
Dunsmore, Rhode Island. He has
been a sufferer for several years.

The society of the Daughters of
Liberty met Tuesday in Charlotte, N.
C., with 115 delegates in attendance.
The society has now a membership of
48,352.

The general land office has with-
drawn four townships in the Shoshone
Falls, Blue lakes and Snake river
region in Southern Idaho for a
national park.

The London Daily Mail claims to
have the highest authority for the as-
sertion that Lord Roberts has already
succeeded Lord Wolseley as com-
mander-in-chief of the British army.

On her trial trip the Alabama, the
latest vessel to be added to the Amer-
ican navy, made an average speed of
17 knots an hour for four hours. The
contract called for a speed of 10 knots
an hour.

The new military post to be built at
the mouth of the Nome river, Alaska,
has been named Fort Davis in honor of
the late Jefferson Columbus Davis,
colonel of the Twenty-third infantry.
He commanded the first troops ever
stationed in Alaska.

Judge Lochren, of the United States
court, sitting at Winona, Minn., has
rendered a decision that under the
bankruptcy law no creditor can have
his claim allowed until he surrenders to
the trustees any money or property
he may have received from the bank-
rupt within four months prior to bank-
ruptcy, without regard to the creditor's
knowledge or ignorance of the fact
that his debtor is in danger of bank-
ruptcy.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Mrs. Amelia Luehlin died at the
hospital in Baker City Tuesday after a
long illness.

Mrs. Elizabeth Blount, aged 85, died
at the asylum at Salem of old age.
Her remains were taken to her home at
Canyon for burial.

Victor, aged 2 years, son of Mrs.
Louis Leander, of Hood river, was
found drowned in an irrigating ditch
into which he had fallen.

C. W. Tracy, ex-manager of the
Pacific Coast Electric company, died
suddenly at his home in Portland
Tuesday, from heart disease.

Fred Bohrer, a ranchman near
Stevenson, Washington, became insane
and the sheriff went to take him into
custody, but he drove the officer away
at the muzzle of a Winchester.

William Donaldson's bicycle broke
recently at Prairie City, Grant county.
In the consequent fall, one eye was
injured, his forehead was contused,
and his lower lip torn nearly off.

J. D. McCulley shipped from
Wallawa county to Chicago fifteen car-
loads of sheep a few days ago. The
sheep went by rail from Elgin over
the O. R. & N. and Short Line.

The population of Idaho, according
to the census just taken, is 150,-
000 and of the state's leading towns
as follows: Boise, 8000; Pocatello,
4000; Moscow, 3300; Lewiston, 3100.

A representative of Page & Son, of
Portland, is ten days, purchased in
the vicinity of the Dalles, fifteen car-
loads of prunes, paying for them
\$5817.67. The fruit was shipped east.

As a result of the investigation of
Seattle's census enumeration by
Special Agent Olmstead, who was sent
out from Washington, a part of the
city will be recounted, beginning at
once.

The United States army transport
Lewton arrived at Seattle Tuesday
night from Nome with 220 passengers,
two-thirds of whom are destitute
miners, who have been returned at the
expense of the government.

A Chinese boy, 12 years old, was
arrested at Port Townsend for setting
fire to an engine-house. He was com-
mitted to the reform school, but the
judge suspended the sentence for 30
days. The boy seemed to be unable
to grasp the idea that incendiarism is
wrong.

R. McIlroy, of Enterprise, tried to
remove a wart from his left hand by
the use of concentrated lye. He got rid
of the wart, but the flesh in some
places was burned to the bone and he
was compelled to call a physician to
save the hand.

Peter G. Stewart died of old age at
Tacoma on Tuesday. In 1843 Stewart
came across the plains and settled in
Oregon and was one of the executive
committee of the provisional govern-
ment and afterwards the first judge of
Clatskanie county.

Mrs. Myra E. Murphy has tendered
her resignation as matron of the Ore-
gon Soldiers' Home, and Miss Emma
Everitt, of Portland, has been ap-
pointed to fill the vacancy. Miss
Everitt is a graduate of the Woman's
hospital in Pennsylvania, and has had
general experience as a nurse.

RUSSIA AND UNITED STATES

The Czar Writes a Polite Note to Our
Uncle Samuel.

THE NOTE HAS THE DESIRED EFFECT

The Admirals Took an Action That the Re-
spective Governments Do Not Approve
and They Are So Instructed.

Washington, Aug. 30.—Official com-
munications between Russia and the
United States, concerning Li Hung
Chang, are made public today. The
Russian representative in Washington
sent to the state department a note
reciting that a resolution of the ad-
mirals of the allied fleets in China in-
tercepted Li Hung Chang from all
communication with Chinese authori-
ties in the event of his arrival at
Taku. The Russian government dis-
sented from this and stated it would
be desirable that the interested gov-
ernments should give orders counter-
manding such a decision.

Assistant Secretary Adams' reply
says in part: "We take the same view
expressed in the Russian note. Li
Hung Chang is prima facie authorized
by an imperial decree to negotiate and
is the only representative of responsible
authority in China, as far as we are
advised. We have instructed our re-
presentative in China as to the spirit of
the Russian note."

News From Congress.
Washington, Aug. 30.—The follow-
ing dispatch from Minister Conger was re-
ceived this morning through the
United States consul at Chefoo: "More
Russian, French, German and Italian
troops are arriving here. The imperial
palace will be entered August 28, when
a military promenade of all the
nations will be made through it. After-
wards it will be closed and guarded.
Prince Ching is expected here in a
few days."

Japanese Will Withdraw.
Washington, Aug. 30.—A telegram
received at the Japanese legation is to
the effect that having been assured by
the Chinese authorities of readiness to
afford full protection to the foreign
residents and property at Amoy, the
Japanese government has already or-
dered the withdrawal of the marines
as soon as they are satisfied that
peace and order is assured.

Talks About the Chinese Situation.
Minneapolis, Aug. 30.—Edwin Grif-
fith, who was in Peking at the time of
the siege, and, with others, escaped by
underground passage under the city
walls, speaking of the situation, said:
"I think it will be long time before
substantial peace negotiations can be
arrived at. The lack of co-operation
on the part of the powers in China is
the greatest barrier to peace. The
American soldiers are making a fine
showing in the Orient. They are re-
spected to a greater extent and are
more feared by the Boxers than all the
others combined."

ROGERS WINS OUT
His Forces Control the Union Con-
vention and He Heads the Ticket.
Seattle, Aug. 30.—The Rogers men
are in complete control of the union
convention this morning and their slate
is going through with a rush. The
following are this morning's nomina-
tions: Lieutenant governor, W. E. Mc-
Crook; congressmen, J. T. Ronald and
E. C. Robertson; supreme judges,
E. C. Milburn and Richard Winsor;
auditor, L. J. Silvertown; treasurer,
W. E. Runner; attorney general,
Thomas M. Vance; land commissioner,
O. R. Holcomb; superintendent of
schools, Frank J. Brown; presidential
electors, Geo. F. Cotterill, M. G.
Blalock, F. J. Brown and J. G. Hein.

The Rogers men picked up courage
last night and finally nominated their
man for governor on the eighth ballot.
It was a day of excitement and of ex-
cellent political management on the
part of Senator Turner, who complete-
ly out-generalized his opponent. Rogers
was really nominated on the seventh
ballot, but it was believed by all the
newspaper men who were keeping
record that Bridges deliberately
counted him out. It had been in-
tended to present the name of Voorhes
for governor until Ronald showed the
weakness of that element of the party.
Rogers was nominated at 12:40 a. m.
and had a margin of only two votes.

The most of the nominations were
made by acclamation.

BRESCI GETS LIFE SENTENCE.
The Penalty is Most Severe Under the
Law of Italy.

Milan, Aug. 30.—Bresci, the anar-
chist who shot and killed King Hum-
bert of Italy, July 29, was convicted
and sentenced to life imprisonment.
The penalty is the most severe
which can be imposed under the law
of Italy for murder, as which the
anarchist was tried. It was at first
believed Bresci would be tried on the
charge of treason, in which case the
penalty would have been death.

ELECTED COMMANDER IN CHIEF.
Judge Lee Kassler, of St. Louis, is
Given the Honor.

Chicago, Aug. 30.—Judge Lee Kas-
sler, of St. Louis, was elected by
acclamation commander-in-chief of
the Grand Army of the Republic.
There was no opposition. D. C.
Milkien, of Maine, senior vice com-
mander; Frank Neumann, Tennessee,
junior vice commander; John A.
Wilkins, of Ohio, surgeon general; Rev.
A. Dahms, of San Quentin, Calif.,
chaplain-in-chief.

THREE PERSONS BURNED TO DEATH.
Husband, Wife and Child Perish at
Vancouver.

Vancouver, B. C., Aug. 30.—A
Rosa, wife and child were burned to
death this morning. Their house was
discovered on fire about 3 o'clock, and
soon as the flames were partly ex-
tinguished the firemen found the
charred remains of the family.

An Old Stager Dead.
Santa Cruz, Calif., Aug. 30.—Theodore
M. Matthews died here last night.
Previous to coming here he was the
manager of the Northwestern State
company, in Idaho.

TOOK AMERICANS FOR ENGLISH.

Christian Endeavors in Spain Were
Threatened by a Mob.

London, Aug. 30.—Dr. Francis E.
Clark, president of the World's Chris-
tian Endeavor Society, has arrived in
London from Saragossa, Spain, where
he has been conducting a Spanish
Christian Endeavor conference. To a
correspondent he said:

"We had a rather exciting time and
encountered much opposition in Spain.
"We came near being mobbed at one
time, and one of our American girls
was stoned in the street. But luckily
peaceful counsels prevailed, and there
was no general outbreak although the
newspapers were very hostile.

"And why do you suppose they as-
sailed us? It was not because we are of
the Americans, who destroyed their
fleet and defeated them in war. No,
all that animosity has passed and the
Spaniards now are friendly toward the
Americans.

"The secret of the whole hostility,
aside from Catholic religious opposi-
tion, was that they thought we were
Englishmen."

"The newspapers declared that the
Christian Endeavors were English mis-
sionaries, coming as an entering
wedge to seize Spain, as England had
taken South Africa. The governor
issued an order forbidding our meet-
ings, but when he found that we were
Americans he modified it so that
meetings might be held."

Dr. Clark returns to America next
week.

CORBETT AND M'COY.

The Last Fight in New York Under the
Horton Law.

New York, Aug. 30.—What is likely
to prove one of the most scientific box-
ing contests ever seen, and the last
fight in New York under the Horton
law, will take place tonight. The
contestants will be James J. Corbett
and "Kid" McCoy. Few wagers have
been recorded. Corbett is the favorite
at the rate of 10 to 7.

Ran Into the Trestle.

Astoria, Aug. 30.—The steamship
Thyra this morning ran into the rail-
road trestle at Tongue point, damaging
the structure to the extent of about
\$10,000. Passengers on the train for
Astoria were transferred by boat.

The Riot Costs Money.
New York, Aug. 30.—Claims filed
against the city for injuries received
by the colored persons in the recent
riots in this city, now aggregate \$200,-
000.

Bubonic Plague Spreading.
Glasgow, Aug. 30.—Eleven persons
are now suffering from the bubonic
plague here and five others have sym-
ptoms of the plague.

Strikers Return to Work.
Winnipeg, Aug. 30.—The Canadian
Pacific railway strikers returned to
work this afternoon.

PACIFIC EXPRESS HELD UP

Robbery Occurred Last Night at Table
Rock, Wyoming.

THE EXPRESS CAR BLOWN TO PIECES

Reported From Denver That a United States
Marshal and Posse Made a Capture
of the Highwaymen.

Ogden, Utah, Aug. 30.—The Pacific
express, which was held up at Table-
rock, Wyo., last night reached here
this morning.

The robbers confined their work to
the express car, which was totally
wrecked.

The mail clerk and express messen-
ger state that the man concealed him-
self on the tender at Tipton and when
the train was two miles west of that
place he compelled the engineer to
stop the train. The first man was
then joined by three others. The ex-
press and mail cars were run about a
mile down the road where the safe
was blown open and rifled.

Capture of Robbers.

Denver, Aug. 30.—An unconfirmed
report has reached Denver that the
Wyoming train robbers were captured
this morning by United States
Marshal Haddell and posse ten miles
from the scene of the robbery. It is
said one deputy and one robber was
wounded in the battle between the
desperados and the officers.

DOWN FROM NOME.

Recent Storms at Nome Cost Many
Lives.

Seattle, Aug. 30.—The steamship
Senator arrived this morning from
Nome, bringing 250 passengers and
about \$50,000 in treasure. Recent
storms at Nome caused a terrible loss
of life. The death list included thirty-
eight persons at latest accounts.

British Prisoners Released.
Lorenzo Marques, Aug. 30.—British
prisoners at Moset Godbach have been
released by the Boers and are march-
ing to join Lord Roberts' forces at
Waterlooven, President Kruger and
his chief officials are at Helapruit,
sixty miles from the Portuguese border.
