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ARTHUR KELLY A PATRICIDE.

TERRIBLE CRIME OF A BOY LESS THAN 12 YEARS OLD.

He Confessed the Crime and Related Details to the Deputy Sheriff, Joe Blakley—in the County Jail.

Arthur Kelly, less than twelve years old, is locked up in the county jail, the self-confessed murderer of his father. The particulars of this crime are startling. The coolness of the boy, after having committed the deed and his coldblooded actions will be a cause for speculation, not only among the legal fraternity, but with all who may hear of or be in any way connected with the case.

Story of the Crime.
Frank Kelly, the murdered man, resided with his wife and two children about ten miles east of Milton, in the county. The children range in age from 1 to 23 years, while the father was less than 45. About the 20th of August Mr. Kelly and his son Arthur started out on a hunting trip to the headwaters of the Walla Walla river, about 40 miles east of Milton. They camped there on the night of Monday, August 27, and on Tuesday morning Mr. Kelly awakened Arthur and told him to get up and get breakfast. The boy started in to do as requested, while the father rolled over in his blankets to continue his sleep. The boy picked up a 40-70 Winchester standing against a tree near by and shot his father in the top of the head, killing him instantly. He then cooked his breakfast and ate it, took the money and pocketknife from his father's clothes, rolled the corpse over in his blankets, packed up and started for home. He had two horses with him, one a saddle-horse ridden by Mr. Kelly, the other a pack animal, which carried the pack, and the boy rode behind the pack.

Said It Was Suicide.
Arthur Kelly on his homeward trip stopped Tuesday night at a deserted sheep camp and arrived home at 5 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. He informed his mother that his father had gone away and left him, but pretty soon the blood was discovered upon the blankets. Then the boy said that his father had committed suicide by shooting himself with a revolver. No steps were taken that day by the family to learn the facts.

Taken in by Joe Blakley.
Deputy Sheriff Joe Blakley left for Milton on Thursday morning's train and upon arrival there was notified by Sheriff Blakley to inquire thoroughly into the case. He started for the Kelly ranch and within probably four miles from Milton met Arthur Kelly coming to town. Mr. Kelly started on toward the boy's home, taking Arthur along with him, and after close questioning, the boy finally gave up and unreservedly told him he had killed his father. They reached the Kelly home, and after consultation with Mrs. Kelly and other relatives Mr. Blakley brought the boy back to Milton and on to Pendleton, arriving here on the train at 5 o'clock Thursday afternoon.

Broke Down While Telling His Story.
After his arrival at the jail Arthur Kelly told his story to Coroner W. G. Cole, Dr. E. W. Vincent, District Attorney L. G. Bailey, and others composing a party at the jail, and broke down completely when he did so. He stated that his father had enfold him and whipped him the day preceding the killing on account of his having forgotten a hatchet at their previous camp; and that his father had repeatedly abused different members of the family and had beaten his wife—the boy's mother. When asked when he made up his mind to kill his father he said he did not know, but that when his father had beaten him the day before he had resolved that he would get even with him. Arthur Kelly can neither read nor write and is consequently free from any dime-novel desire to pose as a desperado.

Where the Crime Was Committed.
The location of the scene of the crime has not been determined. The boy says their camp was 4 or 5 miles east of Milton, which would make it a question whether it was in Union or Umatilla counties, but the impression seems to be that it was not that far away.

Went After the Body.
James Kirkland, of Milton, a deputy sheriff, left early this morning for the scene of the crime, and will bring the corpse back with him if it is in condition to be moved, otherwise he will inter it where found.

The deceased was a nephew of P. J. Kelly, of Milton, an extensive farmer, who has represented Umatilla county in the state legislature.

The Boy's Demerol.
Arthur Kelly conducts himself at the jail in a commonplace manner. He is neither overwhelmed with grief, overcome by fear, sullen and taciturn for effect, nor blippant with an air of braggadocio. He simply answers questions when asked, with no particular show of feeling one way or the other. Practically the only great emotion shown was when he broke down and cried while relating the account of the murder to the officials in the jail on Thursday evening.

THE AFFAIRS OF THE CARNIVAL.
Liberal Support in Money and Work Comes From Portland.
Arrangements made for the handling of booth space in the Street Fair and Harvest Carnival involve one consideration of importance to business men. It is this:
"Resolved, that within the enclosures to be erected nothing shall be sold."
This resolution was adopted by the association unanimously, and is designed to protect all local business men in the pursuit of their regular lines of trade, without competition from outside sources. Naturally, during the fair and carnival, an immense number of people will be attracted to Pendleton, thereby increasing the trade in all lines. By the enforcement of the resolution above quoted, as will be readily seen, every established business will have full and complete protection. It is so provided, that complete police protection will be afforded by a special force provided by the city.

Arrangements are now being made to close with the various attractions for the midway, and announcements of a definite character will be made within a day or two.

Plans are forming for the thanksgiving harvest service, to be held on Sunday, September 16, two days before the opening of the fair and carnival. This will be a union service on the grounds of the fair, at which all local churches, will sing and will take part. A large chorus choir will render national anthems and familiar hymns. All the singers of Pendleton and of Umatilla county and church choirs will be asked to join in furnishing music for the occasion.

Support From Portland.
In addition to the subscriptions

received from Lang & Company, and Luckel, King & Lake Soap company, mentioned yesterday, today additional checks came from Mason & Ehrman, Rothchild Bros., and Blake-McCall Co. The generosity of these houses in subscribing towards the expense of Pendleton's enterprise has been acknowledged by letter, and is thus made public in order that the business people of here may know the names of those houses in Portland, which have adopted so liberal a policy towards Pendleton.

Arrangements were made Thursday whereby Senator G. W. Proebstel, of Weston, will lend material assistance in securing grain for decorating the fruit and grain palace and for exhibit.

Howard Evans, of Milton, has been engaged to collect the fruit and handle it in bringing it here. Mr. Evans is a practical fruit man and will be able to secure the best qualities of fruit, and handle it in the best possible manner.

An important matter to which the attention of all the business men of the city is called is that of applications of local firms for booth space. Applications have been quite general and the prospect is for a splendid success in this line. It is necessary, as all will appreciate, that at the very earliest possible date, the committee on booths, C. E. Kessel, be informed as to just how many additional Pendleton firms desire to make displays. The time for the opening of the fair is approaching, and it will be conceded by all that there cannot be much more delay allowed in ascertaining the wishes of those who desire to use booth space. It has been decided, therefore, that all in Pendleton who wish to make displays inform Mr. Roosevelt on or before September 6, in order that spaces may be assigned, and it be definitely ascertained just how much extra space there is to accommodate those who may apply from the outside.

In this connection, the management suggests that the merchants having taken display booth space should at once make their plans for the manner in which they will decorate their booths, and not leave it until the last two or three days, thereby causing confusion and unnecessary rush and haste.

A. M. Stringer, is ready to give to all who may apply ideas and designs free of charge, so that those who have heretofore given special attention to the matter of booth decoration may have the benefit of his valuable experience and skill.

Floats for the Parade.
The lodges of the town are taking hold of the matter of floats for the parade, and a number of them will be represented. The board of directors has offered \$50 for the best float, and there should be keen rivalry for the honor. It is designed to make the grand parade on the opening day, Tuesday, September 18, a special feature, permitting the carnival queen to receive the honors due her and the home of her improvised court in all the splendid and decorative manner. The lodges can contribute materially towards this end, and they also will be given suggestions and designs by the chairman of the entertainment committee, Mr. Krause, in any manner calculated to facilitate the formation of plans.
