CARNIVAL MEETING.

Street Fair and Harvest Carnival Ordinance Passed.

At the regular meeting of the city council Wednesday evening Mayor Vincent presided.

J. P. Medernach, August Stangier, M. C. Allen and Henry Gierlich were granted liquor licenses.

F. H. Kearney and 11 others petitioned that the water main be extended on lower Alta street. Referred to water committee.

Ordinance No. 395 was passed granting use of certain streets to the street fair and harvest carnival.

An ordinance was read the second time in relation to the vacating of certain streets and deeding certain lots and blocks to W. S. Byers.

The action of Recorder Beam and Mayor Vincent in issuing a warrant to Robert Forster for \$250 was ratified, and another warrant for \$500 was ordered to be issued to him, both warrants to apply on payment of lumber furnished by Mr. Forster for Main street bridge.

The payroll for August salaries and rents, amounting to \$498, was approved and warrants ordered to be issued for same on September 1.

W. S. Byers was granted permission to make bridge across millrace on Franklin street. Mr. Byers is changing his millrace there so it will be on the south side of the O. R. & N. railroad, and this is simply to allow Mr. Byers to place the bridge over the millrace in its new channel.

Mayor Vincent called attention of the councilmen present to propriety of straining the street to the cemetery and opening new streets.
