David E. Cargill Talks of Crops and

Blood Stock.

David E. Cargill, whose farm is in

Middle Creek Spring, 12 miles north-

west of Pendleton, talked of his

horses and blood stock last evening.

First, in regard to his horses. He has

some good ones, which he will have on

exhibition during the street fair and

harvest carnival. One, a yearling,

sired by Bonner, N. B., is pronounced

by horsemen to be "one of the finest,"

and Mr. Cargill says he will back it

for points against any registered year-

ling that may appear in competition

with it. Mr. Cargill has some Poland

China hogs which he will also have at

the fair for inspection.

Mr. Cargill has been experimenting

with Sonora wheat for the past few

years and raised a few more than 1000

sacks this year. Farmers of Umatilla

county and the entire Inland Empire

may profit from his labor along this

line. Late last March he planted his

Sonora wheat and it has yielded 32

bushels to the acre. Other spring

wheat, planted at the same time prac-

tically, only went 18 bushels to the

acre. This Sonora wheat is the

harvest that has ever come to the

notice of this writer, as it tested 64

pounds to the bushel. It commands

considerably more than the market

price, as it is anxiously sought for

seed. It is certainly considerable talk

not only at home, but abroad. One

dealer from Portland wanted to buy at

advanced figures all Mr. Cargill had to

sell. He has already sold some of it at

50 cents per bushel, but can get more

than that for what he has left.

The death of E. R. Johns, the sten-

was educated. He attended Y. M. C.

at a law school. He entered the em-

ploy of the Balfour-Guthrie company

six or seven years ago, and has held a

trusted position with that firm ever

since. He came to Pendleton for the

company in August, 1898, and was

transferred to a California field for a

brief period, returning to Pendleton a

year ago last spring, and has been

here since. He went to Portland for

his health in June last, and since then

has been unable to be at his regular

employment. His company informed

him that he would be given a vacation

until he was in better health, gener-

ously allowing him his usual salary.

He was a bright and companionable

young man and all his acquaintances

are his fast friends. He possessed

many admirable business and social

qualities and was highly esteemed.

Mrs. Sarah C. Johns, mother of de-

ceased, will accompany the remains to

Portland tonight. Interment will be

had in Lone Fir cemetery there Thurs-

day. A brother of deceased resides at

Portland.

FELL FROM A TRAIN.

Harry Walker Met Instant Death Mon-

day Afternoon.

O. R. & N. Physician E. W. Vincent

and Coroner W. G. Cole returned

Tuesday night from Haron, whither

they had gone on the early morning

train in response to information ob-

tained that a man had met his death

there. An inquest was held Tuesday,

and the testimony of Drs. Allen, Joe

Allen, Fred Bouzies and H. Wiggers

brought out the following facts:

The name of deceased was Harry

Walker and he met his death at bridge

No. 131 on the O. R. & N. railway by

falling from the train and lighting on

the rocks in the gulch below. He was

found about 6 o'clock Monday evening

and had then apparently been dead

several hours. Near were the broken

pieces of a whisky bottle and other

pieces of the same bottle were found in

his coat pocket. Upon his person was

found a trainman's working card, No.

538, one bluff, Ark. He had been

recently employed upon repairs to

bridge No. 14, and upon quitting

there had informed H. Wiggers that

he intended to go to La Grande and

again go to breaking. His home during

the recent past is supposed to have

been at La Grande.

The verdict of the coroner's jury,

signed by Dr. McGregor, J. A. Rich-

ardson, Henry Allen, George Sumners,

Emil Beck and Henry Howard, is sub-

stantially as follows:

"That in his opinion Harry Walker

came to his death sometime Monday

afternoon, September 3, 1900, by fall-

ing from some train and striking his

head on rocks below bridge No. 131,

on the line of the O. R. & N. railway.
