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Some effort should be made to have Main street free from building debris during the street fair and carnival. There are only two weeks more before that event.

James J. Hill, the railroad magnate, is one of Mark Hanna's advisory committees, a genteel name for the body of men who will go out and hold up the "business interests" of the country. Mr. Hill's fitness for the position cannot be questioned. He is no "dead head" in any enterprise.

The United States will send 70,000 tons of coal to Newcastle, England. And this in face of the fact that the Dingley-McKinley tariff law puts a duty of 67 cents a ton on coal to "protect" us from coal being shipped from England to the United States. If England should be fined for selling us coal we should be fined for selling her coal.

In twenty years Denver grew from a population of 35,020 to 133,850, the latter being the figures of the census of 1900 and the former those of 1880. One of the factors of this remarkable growth is that the people of Denver have encouraged every movement promising to make that city a better place to live in. The streets have been improved, better buildings erected, parks provided and hundreds of other things done to add to the general enjoyment of life in Denver.

It will be recalled that early in the Chinese troubles Emperor William, in one of his imperial moments of rashness, offered to pay "1000 taels to any one accomplishing the deliverance of any foreigner of any nationality who is now shut up in Peking, who shall be handed over alive to a German or other foreign minister." If William is to be taken seriously by the rescuers of the foreigners in Peking there will be a bill presented to the emperor calling for something like a million taels. That "grand stand play" of his could be made quite expensive to him.

Mark Hanna has more trouble on his hands, and this time he can't blame Roosevelt. In his famous Ashbury Park speech the Ohio boss let slip an expression to the effect that the republican party proposed to make McKinley's administration "perpetual." Mark has been trying to spare himself ever since, but his explanation doesn't explain. The fact is, he spoke from the heart, and told the truth for once. And everybody knows it. It is no use to plead a "slip of the tongue." It is no secret that Hanna's chief aim and ambition is to perpetuate his own reign in the person of McKinley—that is the essence of imperialism.

The New York World is of the opinion that it is natural the republicans should suffer from the democratic anti-trust campaign in Indiana. That paper's dispatches have shown that "the glass trust, pottery trust, iron and steel trust, wire-nail trust and bicycle trust have thrown out of employment 35,000 men, who, through no fault of their own and in defiance of the demand for the products of their labor, have been compelled to cease work and suffer for the necessities of life." It is apparent that everyone of these monopolies is a beneficiary of the Dingley tariff. The glass trust is protected by a duty of 60 per cent; the pottery trust, 55; the iron and steel trust, 45; the wire-nail trust the same, and the bicycle trust by practically a prohibitive duty. They close mills and raise prices at will. Many of the trusts sell their products cheaper abroad than at home. In a recent speech Mr. Bryan declared "there were more trusts organized under the republican administration during the last three and a half years than were

Mr. McKinley was acquainted with the desire of the senate. He completely ignored the resolution. After giving the president sufficient time, called the attention of the senate to his negligence and a second request was made. No answer was furnished and, in my opinion, none ever will be.

"This is the first time in the history of the country that a president has refused to furnish information to the senate; it is evidently shown that the administration does not care to have the subject ventilated. The cost of the commissions, as published, will not begin to cover the amounts expended by those useless institutions.

"I know it to be a fact that the personal expenses of many of the commissioners were paid for out of the treasury. These amounts, which were large, have never been accounted for, and were covered up under the head of emergency expenditures.

"No other administration, from Washington down to the present time, has been so reckless in spending the public funds."

POLITICAL POINTS.

The Rev. Thomas P. Hednett, pastor of St. Malachy's church, Chicago, formerly a prominent republican, has decided to support Bryan in the coming campaign on the ground that he is opposed to trusts and any alliance with foreign powers.

Gen. John Beatty, of Columbus, Ohio, a republican of excellent ability and reputation, says he will support Bryan for president.

Judge M. J. McCann, in New York city, has written to the democratic national committee, saying he intends to work for Bryan during this campaign.

Col. Oliver C. Sabin, formerly secretary of the silver knights of America, who was an active supporter of Mr. Bryan in 1896, has announced that he will advocate the re-election of President McKinley.

Sherman Steele, of Indiana, a young lawyer, has abandoned the republican party, on the issue of imperialism, and declared for Bryan. Mr. Steele is a nephew of John Sherman and of the late Gen. W. T. Sherman.

A leading Pennsylvania paper, the Philadelphia North American, having made a careful political canvass in Delaware, writes a note of warning. It declares that if the strife between the republican factions continues, the republicans will lose the electoral votes of Delaware to Bryan.

J. B. Gehr has tendered his resignation as auditor of the state penitentiary at Walla Walla, and will withdraw his support from the Rogers ticket. Mr. Gehr has been connected with the populist party since that organization came into existence. In this state, and his recent action came as a considerable surprise.

Quite recently, the Des Moines Globe, which supports McKinley, under the title of "A Time for a Change," printed a lengthy, painstaking editorial advocating a monarchy for this country. The article was on the same line, similar to an editorial which recently appeared in the Army and Navy Journal.
