TWO NEW ROADS.

Petitions Granted and Viewers Appointed by County Court.

At the regular meeting of the county court Wednesday two petitions were received signed by T. Myers, R. E. Stewart and others for roads and they were granted. The first is as follows: "Commencing at the southwest corner of section 24 in township 5 north, range 34 east, thence east on the section line on the south side of said section 24, one-fourth of a mile, more or less, to the southeast corner of the southwest quarter of the southwest quarter of said section 24, thence north three-fourths of a mile, more or less, to the center of the northwest quarter of said section 24, thence running in a northeasterly direction and along the east side of the gulch known as the Geer spring gulch, passing by the center of section 13 in said township 5 north, range 34 east, to the southeast corner of the northeast quarter of section 12 in said township and range, thence running north and on the east line of said section 12 about 800 yards, more or less, to the north bank of Pine creek; thence running in a northeasterly direction and along the north bank of said Pine creek to its point of intersection with the county

road known as the Geer spring road, which point is near the center of section 1 in said township and range; said road to be 40 feet wide."

Cass Cameron, James Zerba and Wm. Piper were appointed viewers, who with County Surveyor McComber are to survey and view the road at some date in October.

The second road was as follows: "Commencing at the southwest corner of section 24, township 5 north, range 34 east, thence running east along the section line on the south side of said section 24, one and one-half miles, more or less, to the southeast corner of the southwest quarter of section 19, in township 5 north, range 35 east."

James Zerba, Cass Cameron and Wm. Piper were appointed viewers, who with C. E. McComber, county surveyor, are to meet at initial point on a day in October yet to be decided to view and survey said road, which is to be 40 feet wide.

J. H. Koontz petitioned to have blocks 10 to 20 in township 5 north, range 34 east, and the petition was granted. A number of other important matters are to come before the court.

Today is being devoted principally to auditing bills.

COUNCIL MEETING.

A New Fire Company Organized and Admitted to Department.

Mayor Vincent presided and Councilmen Clifton, Hartman, Switzer, Johnson and Wells were present at council meeting last night. A petition signed by H. E. Cook, L. O. Shook and 22 others was admitted to the fire department from district No. 3, and agreeing to adopt a constitution and by-laws and in all respects to conform to the rules and regulations of the fire department, was allowed and placed on file.

A petition from the paper carriers of Pendleton for use of sidewalks upon which to ride their bicycles as under old ordinance while delivering their papers, was laid upon the table.

An ordinance vacating certain streets was passed.

Reports of recorder and treasurer were referred to a committee.

Councilmen Clifton, Switzer and Johnson were appointed a committee to confer with county court in regard to taxes of First National bank.

JOURNEYING TO PORTLAND.

Forty Passenger Coaches Went Through Pendleton Wednesday.

The morning train Wednesday for Portland had 10 passenger coaches, the excursion train in the middle of the day left with 17, and last night's delayed train pulled out with 13, making a total of 40 passenger coaches on the three trains that passed through, together with those picked up here.

The night train took aboard here about 150 passengers from Milton, Weston, Athena, Adams, Pendleton and other nearby towns. More than 300 people from Hamilton county are at present attending the Portland street fair and carnival.

The three trains passing through Pendleton on Wednesday would arrive in Portland with close to 2500 people aboard. This immense crowd was handled by the O. R. & N. company with ease. How the excursionists will get out of Portland next Saturday night is a matter of speculation. Excursion tickets expire on that evening, and there is sure to be a rush.

This certainly breaks all records as far as carrying passengers from and through Pendleton in any one day and night, is concerned.

The palmistry readings will begin on Tuesday, September 11, and will always be found in the same place in this paper. For further particulars watch the East Oregonian.

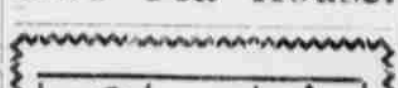
