THE FAIR AND CARNIVAL.

The Great Attraction Will Be the Midway, a Great Entertainment.

General satisfaction is felt that the Street Fair and Harvest Carnival Association has been able to secure, under absolute contract, that great attraction, the Oriental Midway Company. Visitors returning from Portland assert that the Portland carnival is a great success, and that people are much pleased who visited it, but that the great attraction is the Midway; therefore, the chief interest centered in the Portland will be transferred to the Pendleton fair. This Midway company comprises an aggregation of 80 people, with 25 or 30 animals, all of which will appear in the procession on the opening day. The Midway part in the big parade will show to the public what they have. When the Midway company arrives and spreads its sea of canvas, then it can be judged what a wonderful attraction has been secured. The members of the company are swarthy foreigners from the plains of Arabia, from the land of the Shah of Persia, from the country of the Musselmans, from the home of the "Unspeakeable Turk," as well as dark-skinned natives from the wilds of Africa, and cigarette-smoking performers from Mexico. These people appear exactly as they are now being seen in Portland. It will be the first time that such a combination ever showed in a town the size of Pendleton.

This morning work was rushing along all lines and each day will see substantial progress made. The announcement that Pendleton is to have the same Midway that is playing in Portland has been sent out to all adjacent towns by wire, and will doubtless operate to bring to this place immense numbers of people.

Names are coming into the headquarters of the fair and carnival association of those who have rooms that will be available for guests during the five days, September 18 to 22, inclusive. There is a disposition to make an effort to provide accommodations for the visitors, and it will be necessary for every available room in the city to be placed at the disposal of the fair and carnival association. It is urged upon the people of Pendleton that they take heed and notify the headquarters as soon as possible, giving the name, street address, number of rooms, and the price it is desired to charge. All this will be kept and arrangements made that the visitors during the fair and carnival are secured accommodations.

Local and Personal Mention: A Hall Storm at Weston.

The East Oregonian is indebted to the Weston Leader for the following items:

Alex. Drysdale, of Pendleton, representing Balfour, Guthrie & Co., was in town Monday on business. Mr. Drysdale is also buying wheat for Gerwin & Tyre, grain exporters, of Portland.

Willie Beattie, who was taken with typhoid fever about August 5, is again on the streets. He attributes his rapid recovery to the careful and judicious treatment of Dr. Flenor and the faithful nursing of his mother.

Miss Eva L. Wood left for Pendleton Sunday afternoon, accompanied by Miss Jessie Hartman, who has been her guest at Weston. Miss Wood will attend the state teachers' meeting at Baker City before resuming her work in the Pendleton public school.

George Williams, the contractor and architect, will commence work soon on a \$2500 farm residence for A. J. McIntyre north of town. The plans call for a very handsome and attractive country home, and such substantial improvements indicate the prosperity of the section.

Prof. F. M. Mitchell has been elected principal of the public school at Prineville, Crook county, and within a few days will leave with Mrs. Mitchell for his new field. Prineville is fortunate in securing the services of Prof. Mitchell, whom work at Weston recommends him as an able and experienced man in public school work.

Harland Kirk, Dan K. Kirk's young son, was struck on the head Saturday with a wagon spoke in the hands of another boy, Bert Brassfield, and quite severely hurt. A big lump was raised on his forehead, and the physician who attended him stated that if the blow had been an inch lower, in the region of the temple, it might have proved fatal.

Monday morning the little Linville girl was knocked senseless by a rock thrown by Elmo Brassfield, who, together with his older brother, Bert, is rapidly gaining a reputation as a "bad boy." According to reports, three little girls were playing in George Reynolds' yard on upper Broad street, when the Brassfield hopeful came along and began throwing rocks at them to see them run. Two of them managed to get out of harm's way, but the Linville girl was hit in the forehead and fell to the ground unconscious. Her injury did not prove serious.

There was a hail storm at Weston. The fall of hail was exceptionally heavy, the stones were about as large as an average marble, and came down so thick that the most inhabitants were in open-eyed wonder from the shelter of an awning, and said he had

"never seen anything like it before," which is an expression the O. L., regularly uses when something unusual happens. In five minutes from the start of the storm the ground was thickly covered with large hail-stones, ranging in size from peas to marbles, and as rain accompanied the hail, the roads and streets were soon a sea of mud. The storm was very likely a local one.

SUIT TO RECOVER.

The object of the visit of Constable J. W. Dyke, of Milton, to Pendleton on Thursday has been disclosed. In the suit Ryan vs. Martin the plaintiff obtained judgment and the property of defendant Martin was attached. Among other things, some hay was attached by Sheriff Blakeley to satisfy the judgment. But a Mr. Warner claims that the hay attached was not the property of defendant Martin, but that it belonged to him and that he has been injured and damaged by having it attached. He therefore has commenced suit against Sheriff Blakeley for damages in Justice McQuary's court at Milton. The parties to the former suit live on the mountains eight or nine miles from Milton.
