ATTEMPTED RAPE. James Welch, a Harvest Arrested Saturday at Adams.

He has been engaged as a harvest hand during the season, and a short while ago sent for his wife, who resided in the valley, and the two located at Athena. Mr. Welch had been to Pendleton and returned to Adams Saturday morning and stopped at the hotel. Constable T. C. Reed made the arrest and took Welch before Justice of the Peace J. W. Kimbark. He waived examination and was bailed over to appear before the grand jury, his bail being fixed at \$1000. He was brought to Pendleton Sunday afternoon and placed in jail.
