While Mr. H. W. Scott, editor in chief of the Portland Oregonian, is in the east his sub-editors are apparently endeavoring to write themselves into his favor on the subject of "Bryanism" and "its kindred evils" which the vivid imaginations of these editors conjure with. The Oregonian is periodically subject to these fits, and particularly so just at this time, on account of the increasing strength of the democratic candidate and the improved chances of his election. The Portland paper is vigorous in its denunciations, but its shafts are so pointed with bitterness and prejudice that they fly wide of the mark and Bryan receives benefit rather than injury from their aiming. The Oregonian's influence is far below the level of its ability, solely on account of its disposition to be striking and dramatic rather than fair and truthful.

In Trenton, New Jersey, a number of public spirited citizens are raising a fund, by giving "spelling bees," balls and entertainments, with which to provide public baths. They expect to get together by their efforts as much as \$50,000. Right here in Pendleton a similar effort should be made. Pendleton should have a park, baths and a lake to which the people could have free access. This need could be provided within the next year by simply a little effort on the part of a few public spirited people. If it were done, the effort would be very successful and the result so gratifying that the people of Pendleton would be stirred to increased interest and confidence in its future. Those who "own the earth" on which Pendleton is located have a double interest in such undertakings as it would add to the value of their holdings as well as give them increased enjoyment. The East Oregonian has frequently pointed out how a public park, baths and a lake could be secured, at comparatively little expense, so it is not necessary to repeat this part of the story. Who will be first to assist this paper in carrying out the suggestion?

Four years ago the American republic had not inhaled any of the poisons of imperialism and was the greatest world power that swayed and influenced the minds and hearts of men. There was no stain upon its honor, no blood of an alien people upon its hands. We had kept the faith of the fathers. The torch of liberty passed around the world for more than 100 years had been lit at the fires of the American revolution. The spirit of the people was quickened and their pathway made plain by it. No human influence for freedom and progress in all the ages has equalled ours. With and under leadership in liberty and self-government-giving to the individual the maximum of liberty and throwing around him the minimum of restraint—there has marched the most marvellous material progress that the world has witnessed. The question now arises: Shall we return to that ideal while yet there is time, or shall we drift, as we are drifting, to the vortex that has swallowed all the greedy peoples and grasping empires of the past and where all others are fated to follow? The American people have this question to decide for themselves at the ballot box. The responsibility is up to them.

The Pendleton fair and carnival attracted here a large number of people from the Walla Walla valley and the east end of Umatilla county. Some of these people had not visited Pendleton before for years. The improvements made here and the growth of the town since they saw it last was a great surprise to them. The magnitude of the stores and the completeness of the docks were a revelation to them. Pendleton became at once to them more than it ever was before—a reality and an existence—a city of small dimensions—a bustling place of business.

They found that they could supply their needs here to advantage. Many of them, who have been trading in Walla Walla for years, will come to Pendleton to trade hereafter. This is as it should be. The trade rightfully belongs to Pendleton and it has heretofore gone to Walla Walla because it was looked upon as a larger and better place, but it is not true, as far as business advantages are concerned. The fair and carnival have done this much for Pendleton. It has brought the "east end" and the Walla Walla valley closer to Pendleton, their people in touch with us, and this is a good work well done, and Pendleton people must do more of it. Here we can see the good of being a live community, of doing something to show that Pendleton is an important business place, with all the advantages, facilities and resources of a trading center. Do this, and Pendleton will quickly become the second city in Oregon.

"THERE ARE NO TRUSTS," HANNA.

It will not be denied that Mr. Hanna speaks for the republican party. He is manager of the republican campaign, custodian of the republican campaign fund, and, presumably, authorized spokesman of the attempt to keep the republicans in power. We hope that every democrat and republican in the country has read Mr. Hanna's speech, delivered in Chicago on Tuesday.

The speech was made at the Downtown McKinley club. We quote two statements by Mr. Hanna, says the Chicago American:

First statement: "I would like Mr. Bryan or any other democrat to tell me what a trust is. I believe there isn't a trust in the entire United States."

Second statement: "I am all right, for I talk about things that I know all about and I don't lie, either."

It is doubtful whether two statements more surprising have ever been made by any statesman at one time. We shall devote attention to the first statement only and permit the recording angel and a future state to attend to the second.

Mr. Hanna says that there is not a trust in the entire United States. That, mind you, now becomes the official view of the republican party.

Do you want trusts to be exterminated?

How can they be exterminated, since they do not exist?

The discharged drummer, the small business man ruined, the man who pays more for shoes, and coal, and a thousand necessities talks of trusts. But he is simply dreaming. He is delirious, like a child in fever, seeing monsters that do not exist.

Mr. McKinley may humor the feverish child and say:

"Yes, papa will kill the naughty monster."

Other republicans may talk platitudes about destroying trusts while collecting trust campaign funds. But Hanna, head and brains of the republican party will have no nonsense. He will not humor the feverish drummer who imagines he has been discharged.

He will not tolerate the nonsense of the householder who thinks he is paying more for coal. He says:

"Trusts do not exist. There is not one trust in the entire United States. Shut up and vote for me and McKinley."

Thousands, hundreds of thousands, of sincere republicans must refuse to vote for a party that has become the party of Hanna—when Hanna talks as above.

Can you place reliance in a party which flatly denies the existence of the greatest national evil?

The Standard Oil trust pays dividends of \$80,000,000 a year. No man can sell oil or exploit a well on his land without Rockefeller's permission. Every lamp in the country pays tribute to the great oil trust.

Yet Hanna says "No trust exists."

The gas trust robs Chicago, New York and almost every other great city. Competition is crushed or bought out, legislation is bribed into submission—the people are robbed to pay the bills for bribery and for buying out.

Can any American, whatever his individual wealth, become a sugar refiner without meeting certain bankruptcy at the hands of the sugar trust?

Rubber, leather, all steel and iron products, wire, tubing, all the forms of industry that in the past have built up individual prosperity, are they not the exclusive property of trusts?

Yet Hanna says "No trust exists."

To republicans:

Have you never felt the effects of trust power?

Have your expenses not been made greater by trusts?

Do you not view with anxiety the future of a country ruled by a few?

If knowing the extent of the trust evil, knowing the bold defiance of truth in Hanna's statement, you vote for the party of trusts, remember this: However poor you may be, the trusts will make you poorer. However rich and independent you may think yourself, the trusts will reach you and your wealth, and your independence if you give them time.

In that same speech Mr. Hanna said that Bryan's election would "dwarf the awful storm at Galveston."

Bryan's election would hurt the

trusts, and there is Hanna's confession that the interests of the trusts are more important than human life. The Galveston storm destroyed a city and killed twelve thousand human beings. But Hanna, spokesman for the trust wing of the republican party, considers that horrible disaster as nothing compared with the trusts' interests.

Truly human life, human rights, are as nothing compared with trusts in the eyes of trust owners and of the trust party.

If you vote to encourage and perpetuate trusts you vote for a future condition in which will come a struggle with human life on the one side and consolidated capital on the other.

If you vote for Hanna you vote for dangerous social conditions, for conditions dangerous even to the trust owners themselves, although they are too blind to see it.

The people will not submit to permanent exploitation of the many by a few. That exploitation could now be curbed and gradually brought under control.

Let it go on for another four years and you will see conditions that will demand remedies that Mr. Hanna never dreamed of in his wildest attacks on Bryan.

The people must decide not between McKinley and Bryan, but between conservative remedies and desperate remedies later. And the rich man, even the trust owner, should be most deeply interested in applying conservative remedies before it shall be too late.

"THOU SHALT NOT STEAL."

Recently William J. Bryan made a speech to 1500 students of the Chicago university, in Chicago, during which he said in part:

"Thou shalt not steal" is a command that is directed as much against the trust that plunders by the national highway as against the insignificant robber who plunders by the wayside.

"Thou shalt not steal" is a command that is as binding upon those who rob by making the people tributaries and collecting from them such tolls as they, the monopolists, please—that command comes to them as well as to those who are guilty of petty larceny.

"Why do we need a large army in this country? Let this nation be what it has been, let this government derive its just powers from the consent of the governed; let our government be servant and not master of the people, and every citizen will die if need be to preserve that government. But base your government upon force, and you will have to have force present all the time."

"It may be that we have run our race, it may be that we have reached a turning point in our career. It may be that destiny—destiny that is never known until it is past—it may be that destiny has determined that this nation, like so many other nations in the past, is to prove again the old truth that the wages of sin is death."

"It may be that it is destiny for this nation to show once more that when the dollar becomes greater than the man the government must decline. It may be that the love of money has so taken possession of the American people that they are willing to sell their birthright for a mess of pottage. That may be destiny. No one has authority to declare what destiny is. That may be destiny; but what is our duty? Lincoln says that it is our duty to do right."

"The moral character of an act is not determined by the number of people engaged in it; the moral character of an act is not determined by the method by which it is done. The moral character of an act is found in the intention of one man to take what belongs to another man. Whether he takes it on the highway or from the house, whether he takes it in the day time or in the night time, whether he takes it in violation of human laws or under the guise of legislation, it makes no difference. If I can leave upon the mind of every student here today that idea I will not have talked in vain."

"And as I have studied the public

question, I have become amazed at the amount of stealing that is done indirectly, and I state it as my solemn conviction that the amount of stealing done by law is infinitely greater in this country than all the stealing done in violation of the law; that the stealing done by those who are not in the penitentiary is infinitely greater than the stealing done by those who are in the penitentiary."

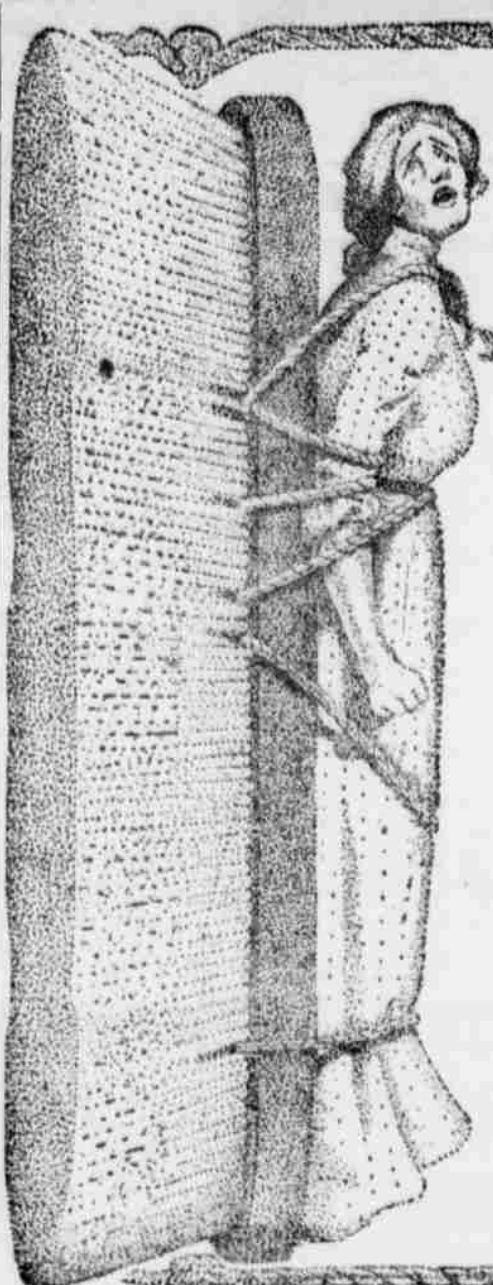
