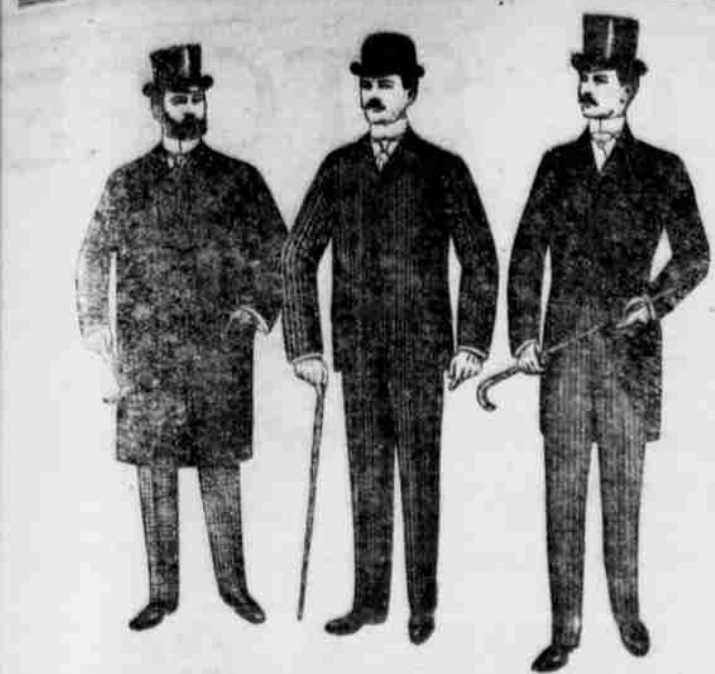

At any drugstore get 5 cents worth of tannic acid, add a teaspoonful of water, mix well and then apply to both palms, rubbing your palms together so as to have moisture penetrate the lines, etc., thoroughly. Then place your hands on the paper, holding it there steadily and with pressure for two minutes. Keep your hand firm on the sheet, then raise hand gently.

Only use a small amount of the acid mixture on your palms, just enough to color the palm. Do not have it in streaks on the palms, because that will make it blur on the impression sheet.

Directions how to remove the stains from the palms: Wash hands in vinegar thoroughly; then use soap as usual.

After impression of hands has been taken return sheet to the East Oregonian office, signed with any name you desire, and same will be read by Professor Sterling and the reading published in the East Oregonian.

H. Gillett has finished threshing a half section of wheat from which he received about 4500 sacks.

Tutuilla academy has opened for the fall term with Miss Carrier of Pendleton as principal.

Mr. and Mrs. James McEwen, former residents of this county, are over from Perry, Union county, visiting friends.

Lo, these many years Combs canyon has been spoken of somewhat slightly as a piece of country which at a pinch might furnish some sheep range or horse pasture, but that was its finish, and now here comes R. E. Groshenring, who lives over there somewhere on an oasis, and carries off about a dozen diplomas for horses, chickens, Belgian hares, and a variety of other stuff which Combs canyon seems able to furnish in cornucopia plentifulness.

W. H. Hunt and Gilson were Tutuilla visitors on Sunday hunting stubble fields for pasture.

M. L. Howe has been operating a steam chop mill around Tutuilla, and has gone down in the Stage Gulch neighborhood.

W. P. York, farmer and stockman, was up from Alkali this week. He is about to dispose of his interests in this county and remove to the north fork of the John Day.

Mrs. D. Loney, a former resident of this county, with a party of friends, were down from Walla Walla on a visit last week.

E. R. Van Atwerp, a Portland spell-binder, who is doing Eastern Oregon in the interests of the Oregonian, was a Tutuilla visitor last week. Mr. Van offers an attractive combination consisting of the weekly Oregonian, a map of the United States and a history of the various political movements in this country all for one dollar.

North Tutuilla has been giving a street fair and harvest carnival, and by no means the least among the many attractions offered by that ambitious suburb last Tuesday was the Chinese parade.

The village night club, which was excused for supping at L. H. Chang and a part of his retinue had by some means got sidetracked on his way to Pekin and landed in Pendleton, and if the witty Oriental looms up as well among his fellow diplomats as his countrymen did in the carnival parade his country will weather the present crisis all right.

There seems to be some difference of opinion as to whether the carnival was a success or a failure. Now, to say nothing about the fair proper, which was of course very interesting, where else could such a variety of entertainments be found in such little space. Here the pious Mohammedan prone upon the earth, facing towards Mecca; there the adventurous traveler on the top of a lofty camel journeying on the streets of Cairo, which were always open; yonder the graceful or graceless call a matter of taste, coaches, besides a variety of other attractions, all for the modest sum of ten cents several times repeated. A traveler who once journeyed to Astoria met there a disreputable sightseer retarding from the Seaside, where he had gone to see the ocean, who said "there's nothing there, boys, but a lot of water rolling up against the sand and rocks. It's all a fake."

A member of the learned profession of law of a somewhat statistical bent affirms that in 1899 there were 14,159 new laws placed on the statute books of the United States. There seems to be some room for the operations of the foolkiller among the lawmakers as well as among the lawbreakers.

John J. Ingalls has recently passed over to the ranks of the great majority and the world is poorer by the loss of a pointed, forceful writer over whose signature something interesting was sure to be found. Strict party partisanship does not seem to be a very strong feature of the present presidential campaign. The Portland Oregonian, a paper whose republicanism nobody questions, says: "We have to choose a president from two imperfect men, we have to select a man whose weaknesses make us at times very tired and sick. But their weaknesses are not so much the issue as the general results their ascendancy will achieve. The New York World, a paper whose democracy is equally unquestionable says: 'No foreign nation cares a tinker's damn when or in what proportion we coin our silver money, the consent of none of them has ever been asked; nor the withholding of their consent dreamed of. The constitution says nothing about the ratio, 32 to 1, would be just as constitutional as 16 to 1, and twice as honest. Jefferson was a man quite as much as the constitution and about money as Mr. Bryan could possibly know, said that the ratio was a commercial question altogether, and suspended silver coinage rather than stamp coins at a false ratio.' The World seems to think that W. J. B. is gunning for big game with some very poor shot."

Some time ago a mass meeting was held in Washington in aid of the Beer cause. Stream of oratory of the Billy Mason, Webster Davis and Sulzer brand were on tap in practically unlimited quantities and 1800 dollars was realized. Something like a contributor of an investigating tour of mind found that after the champagne bills, carriage hire, and other incidental expenses of a patriotic outburst had been paid, eighteen dollars was left to be forwarded to Gomp Paul.

AN ANIMAL TRAINER. Henry Gierlich has had experience in that line.

One of the most attractive features of the Midway during the Pendleton Street Fair and Harvest Carnival was the tent in which the lion-tamer gave exhibitions several times daily. He made the huge brutes perform their tricks as though they were dogs or kittens, and fed them with raw meat from his bare hand. Among those who attended these exhibitions was Henry Gierlich, who got into a discussion with the showman regarding the danger there was in following the example of Daniel and going into the lions' den or cage. Mr. Gierlich made the assertion that he could enter the cage and cause the lions to do their tricks just as they had done for their regular trainer. The showman bet him

\$20 he couldn't do it. Mr. Gierlich was himself somewhat skeptical as to what the result would be, but having said he could, he resolved to do or die. He entered the cage, and the lions he hid and won the bet.

A discussion of this feat has brought out the fact that Mr. Gierlich has trained animals before. Back in Germany years ago he used to handle bears and teach them to do tricks. Eight years ago at Tacoma he also had some experience in that line. He appeared with four bears in a big German masquerade procession. One of the animals became frightened at the brass band music in the parade and climbed up to the top of a telegraph pole and did great damage to the wires and caused annoyance to the telegraph companies.

The bear stood upon its perch for two days and two nights until Mr. Gierlich mustered up courage to climb up and get above the bear and feed it candy, and eventually coaxed it to "come off the perch."

Mr. Gierlich is of the opinion that the bear has a great deal to do with cowering animals and in making them obey. He can have a monopoly of that opinion as far as the writer is concerned.

COUNCIL MEETING. At a meeting of the council held on Wednesday evening the following business was transacted:

Dr. C. J. Smith petitioned to be allowed to ride his bicycle on the sidewalks, except on Court street to Byers' mill and on Main street, during muddy weather, and in night and emergency work. Referred to police committee.

Petition was read from C. Robinson and Arilla Daugherty for the laying of a service pipe on Grange street, between Lewis and Court streets. Referred to water committee.

A petition from the fire department, signed by H. J. Stillman, chief, and W. P. Ed, secretary, petitioned, stated that at a meeting of the department attended by 32 members a motion was unanimously carried that it was the sentiment of the department that none of the bells should be used for any other purpose, and asked that all ordinances empowering the engineering the marshal or his assistants to ring the fire bells for other than fire purposes be repealed; to be effective at once. Referred to fire committee.

A petition from many citizens and taxpayers asking for an extension of the main line from a point on Railroad and Chestnut streets, the present terminus west to the west end of Webb street, thence southerly to the city cemetery. Referred to water committee.

An ordinance for the improvement of a portion of Jackson, Riley, Logan, Lincoln, Jefferson, Madison, Bush, Bluff, Railroad, Tustin, Court and all of Main street, by being graded and graded, was referred to ordinance committee.

Salary list for month of September was presented and allowed, to the amount of \$498.

Warrants for freight bills paid were ordered drawn.

Messrs. Clifton, Johnson and Roosevelt were appointed a special committee to look into the matter in regard to selling certain fractional lots to J. W. Scher.

Hen Killed a Hawk. Mrs. J. R. King, of Weston, says the Leader, is the owner of a courageous and capable old hen of nondescript breed, that she couldn't trade for a whole flock of blooded poultry. It is the only hen in Oregon, perhaps in the United States, that ever fought and killed a hawk. The battle occurred a few days ago, when a chicken hawk swooped down upon a band of baby fowls, of which the old hen was the mother. The hen didn't squawk and run, calling upon her offspring to follow her, but with a fierce and well-directed peck buried her bill beneath the hawk's left wing. It was a solar plexus blow, and a clean knock-out. The hawk seemed surprised and dazed. It feebly arose, flew limply against a clothes line and then dropped into the garden, stone dead.
