New Trial Denied.

Frankfort, Ky., Sept. 20.—The
motion for a new trial in the Howard
case was overruled today.

As the result of a long-standing
family feud, William Lunrutt, a Rus-
sian farmer of Sanvie's island, near
Portland, was shot and killed by his
stepson, A. Kittomeyer. Wednesday
night, three shots were fired, and the
old man died almost instantly.
Kittomeyer gave himself up to the au-
thorities, claiming that he acted in
self-defense. The stories of the three
witnesses, who are also in custody,
differ materially. The matter has
been laid before the grand jury
which is making a searching investiga-
tion of the case. According to one
eyewitness, the crime was a most
dastardly one. Kittomeyer reloading
his gun after he had fired two shots,
and then shooting his victim again.

STORY OF A LOST CHILD.

Wandered for Forty Hours in the Blue
Mountains.

There is a family, name not learned,
living in a tent near the Bonanza
mine, in Baker county. One night
recently, says the Sumpter Miner, be-
tween 7 and 8 o'clock, during the
absence of the father, the mother was
preparing her little three or four-year-
old girl for bed, having taken off the
outer, heavier clothing. Her back was
turned a moment, her attention being
attracted by the other child. When
she again started to care for the little
girl, the latter was gone.

Calling to her and receiving no re-
sponse, the mother stepped outside of
the tent to see if she was there. The
night was very dark, and so the
puzzled mother brought out a lantern
and searched for the little one. Fail-
ing to find it and now thoroughly
frightened, she notified some nearby
campers who joined in the search.

They having failed after a couple of
hours hard work, the story was carried
to Bonanza, where a large number of
miners organized themselves into
parties, systematized the plan of
operation and renewed the search. All
of that night, the next day, the follow-
ing night and half of the next forenoon
did the child hunt continue before the
search was successful.

When found the little girl was
quietly sitting on a log, picking
splinters out of her feet. Having been
so long without food, the men who
found her thought that in all proba-
bilities she would have been starved
and frightened into insanity, and
sought to approach her cautiously. But
she saw them coming and greeted
them with a delighted "howdy do."

When she left the tent she had on her
shoes and stockings. The latter were
worn but not soiled, and the latter
were worn out. Asked what had be-
come of her shoes, she said she had
taken them off when she went to sleep.

The little girl was very talkative and
told of the day before seeing a great
big black dog with two puppies, which
she tried to feed. "The dog and his
puppies were very hungry," she said,
and after her mamma "—undoubtedly
a bear and her cubs. The child was
quite four miles from the tent, at a
point, in order to reach which, a
canyon would have to be crossed that
few men other than experienced
mountain climbers would attempt to
cross.

The mother's experiences, fears,
anxiety, despair, hope and finally
joy, would make another story, but
should not be tampered with by pro-
fane hands.

PENITENTIARY OFFENSE.

Gibson Housebreakers Will Have Their
Hearing Monday.

The arraignment of Sidney Johnson,
Roy Hunter and Andrew Dula took
place this forenoon before Justice of
the Peace Eltz Gerald. They asked
for further time to plead and were
given until next Monday at 10 o'clock.

These are the young men who were
arrested on the O. R. & N. track a short
distance east of Pendleton on Thurs-
day evening by Marshal Heathman
and Deputy Sheriff Joe Haskley and
Till Taylor.

The three men are charged with
larceny from a dwelling at Gibbon.
The property taken was owned by a
Japanese named C. Mabino. Mr.
Swartz, railroad agent at Gibbon took
some of the property from the men.
The crime was committed early Thurs-
day morning after Mr. Makino and his
fellow laborers had gone to work on
the railroad. The property taken in-
cluded \$1.50 in money, two shirts, one
sweater, six cans salmon, a pair of
gloves, and a lot of smoking tobacco.

The men slept in the shed at Gibbon
on Wednesday night, according to Mr.
Swartz' version of the affair.

William Anderson, roadmaster of the
O. R. & N. between Umatilla and La
Grande, is in Pendleton today to see
that the Japanese employees of his road
are not molested.

The penitentiary guards open uninvit-
ingly to these young men. Stealing
seems to be getting to be quite a com-
mon amusement in Umatilla county,
but the habit can be broken off with a
few sentences to imprisonment for
good long terms.

Portland friends at Oregon City, and
she and Mrs. Evans hope to see as
many club women as possible. Mrs.
Wade has just come from a brief visit
to Olympia, where she has been fed-
erated and lined by the hospitable Wash-
ington club women, who have taken
this opportunity of showing their
friendliness to the Oregon Federation.
Sunday she expects to return to Pen-
dleton.

THE CHINESE QUESTION

It is Stated That France, Russia and
Germany Have Agreed.

London, Sept. 20.—Apparently Ger-
many's retreat from an untenable posi-
tion has been virtually accomplished.
The Paris correspondent of the Morn-
ing Post says:

"An agreement on the Chinese
program has been arranged between
France, Germany and Russia. It will
be submitted to the other powers
within a few days. The action recom-
mended will be milder than Ger-
many's original proposal, and it is ex-
pected that all the powers will accept
the program."

The Cologne Gazette in a semi-
official statement apparently intended
for consumption in the United States
and England points out the serious
position resulting from Prince Tuan's
ascendancy. "The continued massing
of missionaries and converts," says
the Gazette, "indicates that the anti-
foreign movement is directed from an
influential center."

It thinks that the situation thus
created "must appear intolerable
even to those powers favoring the policy
of indulgence and forbearance." The
Tien Tsin correspondent of the Stand-
ard says:

"I learn that Li Hung Chang has de-
clared that Vice Admiral Alexoff has
gone to Port Arthur to avoid meeting
Commodore von Waldersee, who is to hold a
conference with him, Vice Admiral
Seymour and Sir Alfred Gaselee."

MASSACRE OF FOREIGNERS.

Minister Conger Sends a List of Names of
Victims.

Washington, Sept. 20.—The follow-
ing dispatch was posted by the state
department this morning: "The dis-
patch of state has received a dis-
patch from the consul general at
Shanghai, dated September 1, in
which it is stated that confirmation
has been received of the massacre of
the following foreigners, at Ku Chai,
Che Kiang province, on July 21: Mr.
and Mrs. W. H. Thompson and child; Mr.
and Mrs. D. B. Thompson and child; Miss
Thurgood, Miss Sherman, Miss
Manchester and Miss Desmond. Miss
Manchester arrived in China in Sep-
tember last year and Miss Desmond in
January, 1899. The consul general is
unable to learn further particulars."

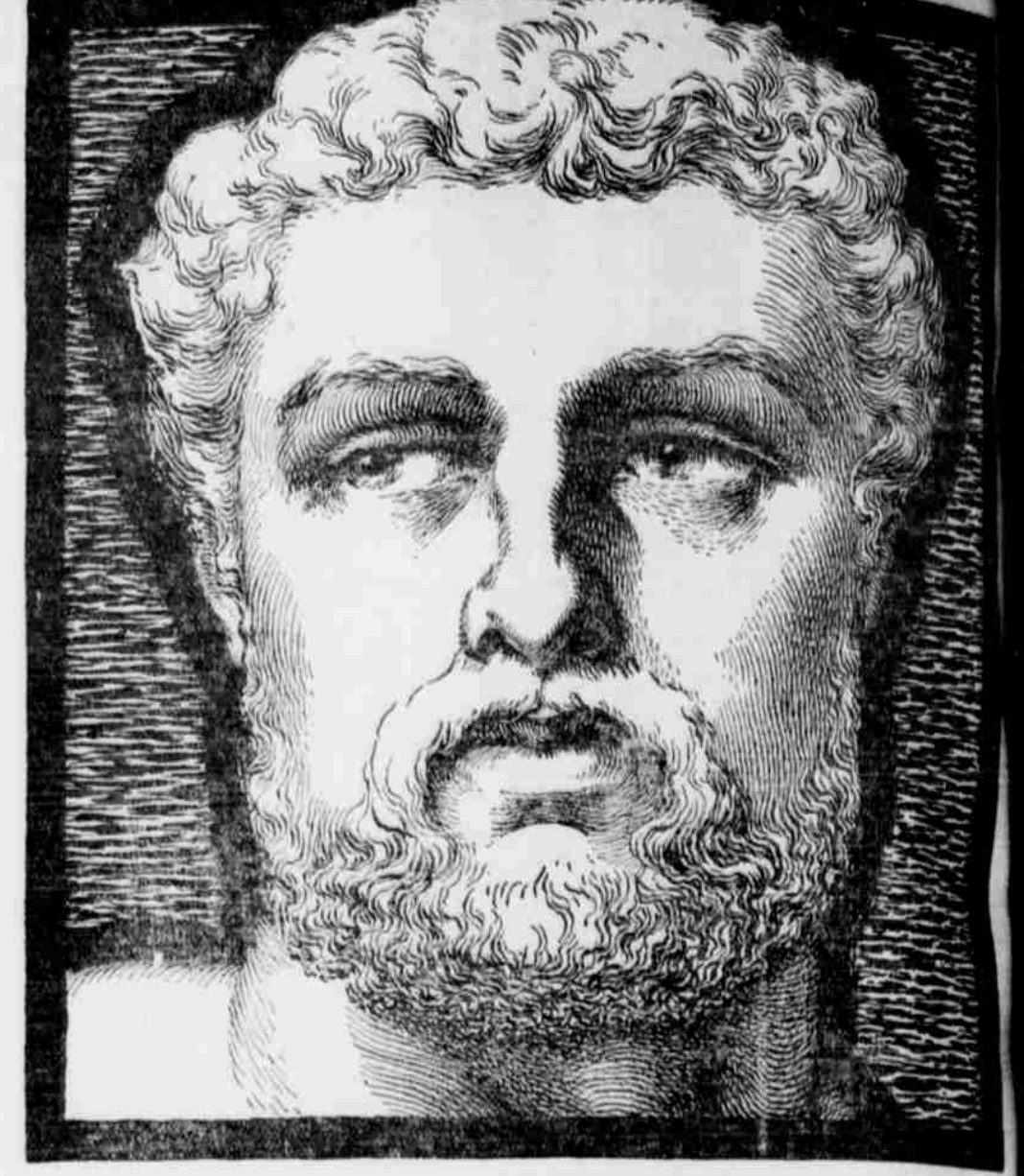
