### GENERAL NEWS.

Failures for last week were 204 in the United States against 157 last year, and 18 in Canada against 21 last year.

In Galveston, Texas, 3000 men are still employed clearing the streets. So far 2311 bodies of those who perished in the storm have been recovered.

Colonel D. Freeman Ellsworth, an old-time democrat, once candidate for governor of Iowa, is dead at Eldorado, aged 90 years. He held many positions of trust and was a delegate to several national conventions.

Samuel Foster Cary, who was the greenback candidate for vice president with Peter Cooper, in 1875, died in Cincinnati Saturday night, aged 87 years. He was elected to congress in 1887 on the labor ticket.

John Lee, a deputy sheriff, shot and killed Charles Thompson, a saloon man, over a game of cards, in Congress, Arizona, Friday night. Thompson objected, drawing a pistol, to Lee leaving the game with his winnings.

A receiver has been appointed for the Montgomery Trust & Savings bank, of Montgomery, W. V., on the application of President Champ, who alleged that Cashier McCormick had misappropriated funds making the bank insolvent.

Lord Wolsey is quoted in an interview as saying that China, "through love of nature and art must one day develop into a great nation." The end of all things in Lord Wolsey's opinion will be China fighting the United States for the supremacy of the world.

Great Britain has sent a note to the Dutch government, which contains a warning that if Kruger is allowed to carry on his state of anarchy on board a Dutch warship, which is to bring him to Europe it will be regarded as a breach of neutrality on the part of the Netherlands.

Thomas G. Shearman, the famous lawyer and single tax advocate, died at his home last night in Brooklyn. Death followed a surgical operation. Mr. Shearman was author of several law books and works on economics and the attorney of Henry Ward Beecher in the famous Titton-Beecher trial. He was also a zealous advocate of the single tax, being the originator of the phrase.

Owing to the advance in the price of silver, Director of the Mint Robert L. Johnson has increased the price to be paid by the government for silver purchased, from 55 to 57 cents per standard ounce. The government at present purchases only such silver as is contained in gold deposits from Klondike and other gold producing sections. Silver has gradually stiffened in price since 1898 when it was quoted at 45 cents.

### PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The \$50,000 worth of outstanding warrants of the city of Cheney have been declared void and worthless.

Gus Dangoise has been sentenced at Albany to pay a fine of \$100 and to serve 7 1/2 days in the county jail for killing robins and meadow larks.

G. J. Cooke, a teamster, was found unconscious on a load of sand in Astoria, and was taken to the hospital, where he died during the night of an apoplectic stroke. His age was 65 years.

Tuesday A. Smythe & Son purchased of William Smith, of Hay Creek, 1200 head of ewes at \$3 per head. Messrs. Smythe will take the ewes to their Klickitat ranch and breed them with the noted Lincoln bucks recently purchased.

The first national bank, of Colfax, Wash., has made Whitman county a proposition to allow 4 per cent interest on the average daily balance of funds in the hands of the county treasurer, provided that the institution be designated the sole depository for such moneys.

William R. Manney died at the home of his brother, Perry Manney, in Salem Friday, aged 62 years. Deceased was born in West Virginia. He came West in 1853, settling first at Vancouver, Wash., and later at Corvallis. In 1864 he removed to Walla Walla, and in 1871 came to Salem.

Prosecuting Attorney Inman has been found guilty by Judge McDonald, at Colfax, of contempt of court. Inman filed an affidavit charging the court with having private reasons for releasing Boyle on habeas corpus, who was arrested for assisting prisoners to escape from the county jail.

### THE GREAT COAL STRIKE

Settlement No Nearer Than It Was a Week Ago.

### OPERATORS HOLD A CONFERENCE

This is Considered a Practical Acknowledgment of Defeat—The Marching Miners Are Peaceful But Determined.

Hazleton, Oct. 1.—President Mitchell this morning stated positively that the strike question will be held here this afternoon. Both the railroad and individual operators of all three districts will be represented. The entire ground will be gone over. A calling of the conference is practically a decision by the operators that they are beaten and they must try to make terms of settlement. It is the most significant move since the beginning of the strike. If the companies agree to the plan of arbitration a convention of miners will be called at Scranton in the next few days.

### Good Work by Strikers.

Hazleton, Pa., Oct. 1.—The marchers today were orderly. The miners are making desperate effort to stop the stamps to the mines. Five thousand miners gathered at Lattimer and marched to town. They were met by Sheriff Harvey and a hundred deputies and commanded to stop. The miners demanded the right of the highway, shouting they were unarmed, and with raised hands marched through the line of officers to the town, calling upon the miners not to go to work. Three times this move was repeated and then the line started for Jeddo. The Lattimer mine was opened, but only a few men went to work. The marchers then visited Jeddo, Cranberry, Coalbrook, Pothook Creek, Laurel Hill and a half dozen other places. The marchers effectively offset the ten per cent advance notices and all the collieries remain idle.

### Speech of a Miner.

Stephen McDonald, at Scranton, Pa., made the following speech a few days ago, which is a story of the few conditions in the anthracite mining districts:

"Men, you all know me around here. You know the truth of what I say. I repeat it to you to remind you of our common lot of misery and suffering which has made us combine to cry out for a better order of things."

"When I was six years and four months old I went to work in the breakers of the Pancoast Coal company. I have worked nineteen years, every day that I could get. I have never been on an excursion in my life. I have never been to a theater, but twice in my life. I have not drunk a drop of beer or liquor for five years, and for two years I have not smoked. I have practiced the closest economy in food, but I have never been able to accumulate \$100 in my life."

"Men, I have lived in the hamlet of Throop all my life. You saw it when it was always been a company store town. We know in our hearts what that means, whatever the operators may say."

"Eleven years I worked for the Pancoast coal company, and during those years I swear before the Omnipotent I have never handled one cent of earnings in money."

"I also have due bills of other members of our family to show they handled no money, either, in all that period."

### SECRETARY HAY BACK.

His Condition is Much Improved and He Goes to Work.

Washington, Oct. 1.—Secretary Hay returned to his desk this morning very much improved in health. He gave out telegrams from Congress concerning the appointment of viceroys to negotiate peace and the degradation of Tuan and other officials responsible for the bloodshed in China.

### English Elections.

London, Oct. 1.—Balloting for the English general elections for members of parliament began today and will continue for fifteen days. The government stands upon the issue of the Boer war and an aggressive imperial policy. The campaign will consist to a large extent of personal abuse of Joseph Chamberlain whose triumph is already conceded.

### Chicago Quotations.

Milwaukee, Oct. 1.—Judge Sedgwick, in the state court today, denied the application of the Chicago board of trade for injunction to restrain the Milwaukee bucket shops receiving the Chicago quotations. The court held that after the quotations were posted they were public property.

### British Killed.

Komatiport, Oct. 1.—While the Boers' ammunition was being destroyed here by the British troops a quantity of it exploded, killing twenty Gordon Highlanders. During the review of troops a train ran into a bunch of cattle and many of the passengers were injured.

### Population of Los Angeles.

Washington, Oct. 1.—The census estimate of Los Angeles' population is 102,479. In 1890 it was 60,395, an increase of 32,084, or 103.35 per cent. From 1880 to 1890 the increase was 39,215, or 350.64 per cent.

### Report Unfounded.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 1.—An official messenger, states that the reports of annexation of Manchuria by Russia are unfounded.

### INTERVIEW WITH THE POPE.

He is Pleased With the United States for Restoring Church Property.

London, Oct. 1.—Archbishop Ireland, in describing an audience with the Pope, quoted his holiness as saying: "I am well pleased with the return by the American government of property to the church, both in Cuba and the Philippines. The United States has given proof of its good will and thus exhibits a spirit of justice and respect for the liberties and rights of the church. You will thank in my name the American president for what he has done." Archbishop Ireland said Rampolla told him that three petitions had been received by the Vatican from the Philippines, asking that direct relations be resumed by the Pope with the United States, but he had always refused them out of consideration for the American government.

### MCKINLEY ABANDONS PLAN.

UNITED STATES WILL BE ONLY PASSIVE SPECULATOR IN CHINA.

Does Not Propose to Assume Task in View of Discord Among Powers.

Washington, Oct. 1.—This government has abandoned the plan to conciliate the allies at Peking through Minister Conger. An official denial was issued by the state department to the repeated statements that Minister Conger will endeavor to bring the Chinese envoys and the representatives of the powers at Peking together. The United States does not propose to assume this task in view of the fact that the "European concert" is a synonym for discord.

Henceforth this government will be a passive spectator to future events in Peking. Although active negotiations will be undertaken to protect American interests and arrive at a thorough settlement of all questions involved with Prince Ching and Earl Li. But the advances which this government has made in good faith toward China will likewise be subjected to modification because of the belligerent attitude of the dowager empress and the increasing peril of uprisings in the southern and eastern portions of China, where the anti-foreign resentment still runs high.

### Cable From Chaffee.

Washington, Oct. 1.—General Chaffee cables from Taku under date of the 28th ult. that the health of his command is good and he has accepted the invitation of the hospital ship Maine to transfer the convalescents to the hospital ship Relief, now repairing at Nagasaki.

### Supplies for China.

San Francisco, Oct. 1.—Steamer Algon called at noon today with thirteen thousand tons of army supplies for China.

### The Legion Guard.

Washington, Oct. 1.—General Chaffee cables from Tien Tsin via Taku that the Ninth infantry and the third squadron of the Sixth cavalry and a light battery will constitute the legion guard at Peking.

### HIWAI NEWS.

Big Fund Raised in Honolulu for the Galveston Sufferers.

San Francisco, Oct. 1.—Advices from Honolulu say: The news of the Galveston horror revived here. A subscription fund was started and already reaches six figures.

Politics are warming up. The conventions will probably nominate, republicans, Col. Sam Parker, democrats, Prince David. The natives will not nominate until other tickets are in the field. There is no doubt that the natives will sweep everything before them, ousting the present incumbents of the offices.

### A Murder at Prosser.

North Yakima, Wash., Oct. 1.—W. W. Scott, of Klona, was shot and killed this morning at Prosser by an unknown man, supposed to be a robber who held up a traveler on a freight train a few hours earlier. The murderer escaped.

### HOLDUP AT ECHO.

Tough Characters are Bringing the Town Into Undue Prominence.

The usually quiet and peaceable town of Echo is being brought into undue prominence by several cases of lawlessness during the recent past. The most startling crime recently committed there occurred last Saturday evening, September 29, at about 8 o'clock. Alex. Malcolm came up from Echo Sunday morning and returned home in the evening. He told of the affair as follows: One man, a stranger, held up two men, the names of both to Mr. Malcolm unknown, near the depot. The highwayman used a large revolver to enforce his demands, and struck one of his victims a blow on the forehead with his weapon, cutting a serious gash. He was scared away before his victim had time to give up their possessions, so obtained nothing for his trouble.

Mr. Spike and another gentleman were sitting on the depot platform at the time and overheard the conversation, but the affair transpired so quickly, and all were so startled, that they allowed the hold robber to get away. The freight train from the west passed through shortly afterward and it was thought the criminal might have got aboard and come on to Pendleton. The officers here were on the lookout when the train arrived, but could find no suspicious person to nab.

### Club Shoot.

The boys had another fine Sunday afternoon's sport shooting. There were 12 participants in addition to the spectators, and their several names and percentages were as follows: H. J. ### Baker and Boise Races.

Gus Lafontaine will leave in the morning for Baker City to attend the races, which commence there on Wednesday. His three horses Gus L., Pauline and Kid, will be shipped to night. From Baker City Mr. Lafontaine will go to Boise, Idaho, with his horses to participate in the races commencing on Monday, October 8.

### MARK HANNA IS CONFIDENT

He Reaches Chicago From the East and May Tour the West.

### BRYAN'S RECEPTION IN MINNESOTA

Roosevelt's Tour is a Success in Nebraska, Where He Will Make Forty-two Speeches in All.

Chicago, Oct. 1.—Mark Hanna arrived here this morning from the east. At the republican headquarters he was immediately besieged by a stream of callers. He held a conference with Secretary Heath, of the national committee, on the subject of finances. He received invitations to stump Nebraska and South Dakota. It is believed he will accept the latter, and may extend his tour into other western states traveling on a special train, but accompanied by no reporters. He reiterated his statement regarding the alliance of Bryan and Croker and declared he knew whereof he spoke, despite the denials of these gentlemen. He expressed great satisfaction at the political situation in the east from the republican standpoint.

### BRYAN IN MINNESOTA.

Lincoln, Minn., Oct. 1.—From the balcony of the hotel at West Superior Bryan at 7:30 o'clock this morning addressed a great crowd of people. Then boarding a yacht he came over to Duluth and talked to several thousand people in the arena. Some local friction arose because the board of public works refused to decorate the city in Bryan's honor on Sunday, but the matter was amicably adjusted and the town is decorated today. Bryan's audience here was not as large as was anticipated.

Lincoln, Minn., Oct. 1.—Bryan made the fusion ticket, predicts McKinley will carry Minnesota by fifteen thousand votes, but feels certain of his own election. The fusion leaders are certain of gaining one congressman even if they do lose the state for president.

### A Point Well Taken.

In his speech here Bryan made a local flourish by closing the local flour mills as an illustration of the beneficial effects of these combines. "Whenever a mill is closed under the democratic administration," said Bryan, "the republicans said it was due to a low tariff and appealed to the people to put the tariff fence higher, but when a trust closes five or six mills in one town there is not a republican with enough courage to denounce the trust that does it."

### ROOSEVELT MAKES CLAIMS.

In His Tour of Nebraska He Will Make 42 Speeches.

Beatrice, Neb., Oct. 1.—Roosevelt entered Bryan's state today, and was given a cordial reception. At Falls City he said to a large crowd: "Four years ago Bryan said there would be no prosperity without silver. We had no silver and we had some prosperity. Bryan said that farm products would go down if McKinley was elected. Farm products have gone up."

At Auburn rain fell in torrents, but the opera house was packed. Three thousand people heard Roosevelt in the court house yard at Tecumseh where he paid a glowing tribute to Col. Stansbury of the First Nebraska regiment, killed in the Philippines. Roosevelt today claimed the republican party would carry Wyoming, Washington, and other western states. He makes forty-two speeches in Nebraska on his present tour.
