At any drugstore get 5 cents worth of tannic acid, add a teaspoonful of water, mix well and then apply to both palms, rubbing your palms together so as to have moisture penetrate the lines, etc., thoroughly. Then place your hands on the paper, holding it steadily and with pressure for two minutes. Keep your hand firm on the sheet, then raise hand gently.

Only use a small amount of the acid mixture on your palms, just enough to stain the palm. Do not have it in stains on the palms, because that will make it blur on the impression sheet.

Directions how to remove the stains from the palms: Wash hands in vinegar thoroughly; then use soap as usual.

After impression of hands has been taken return sheet to the East Oregonian office, signed with any name you desire, and same will be read by Professor Sterling, and the reading published in the East Oregonian.

POINTS FOR PENDLETON.

Need of a Sleeper on W. & C. R. R. From Pendleton to Pasco; Telephone Service; Whitman College and Fruit Fair. Walla Walla, Oct. 1.—A Pendleton visitor in Walla Walla wonders why our people there do not ask the W. & C. R. R. Co. to put into service a sleeper between Pendleton and Pasco. Passengers bound to points on the Northern Pacific from Walla Walla may go to the W. & C. R. R. station here at 8 o'clock in the evening, and by paying 50 cents have a berth in a standard Pullman sleeping car and get a good night's rest before making the connection with the Northern Pacific overland trains. While passenger traffic out from Pendleton on the W. & C. R. R. road may not be so heavy as from Walla Walla on the same line, nevertheless, it might be increased considerably by the putting on of a sleeper. The discomforts of the ride from Pendleton to Pasco being obviated, no one would hold the journey in such horror.

As to the sleeper paying its operating expenses, it was informed by one of the officials of the W. & C. R. R. Co. that, at 50 cents a berth per night, there is "good money" in it for the railroad company. He remarked that he would like to own a line of standard sleepers and have the profits in operating them at 50 cents a night. Not one person in a hundred would hesitate to pay the 50-cent rate for a comfortable night on a sleeper, in preference to riding all night in an ordinary coach.

Pendleton usually gets what she goes after, and should attempt to induce the attention of Pendleton people. It is the telephone service. Walla Walla is given by the Inland Telephone and Telegraph Co., a better service than that accorded patrons in Pendleton. It is of a kind with that used in all cities where modern methods are employed. The phone subscriber merely raises the transmitter from the resting hook, and, by so raising it, calls "central." It is unnecessary to ring. The instrument is automatic. The instruments used in Pendleton are of the old style, and by no means up-to-date. Although during the year the service there has been improved, it has not yet been put upon a modern basis.

There is another matter worthy the attention of Pendleton people. It is the telephone service. Walla Walla is given by the Inland Telephone and Telegraph Co., a better service than that accorded patrons in Pendleton. It is of a kind with that used in all cities where modern methods are employed. The phone subscriber merely raises the transmitter from the resting hook, and, by so raising it, calls "central." Although during the year the service there has been improved, it has not yet been put upon a modern basis.

Here is opportunity for the application of some of Pendleton's faculty in getting things she goes after. It would pay to give it some attention.

An observing person visiting here notices also that Whitman college is of vast benefit to Walla Walla. Whitman college has done more for Walla Walla than has Walla Walla for Whitman college. The presence here of the institution brings large numbers of well-to-do people to educate their children. It gives a tone to local affairs not to be secured by any other means. It is beneficial financially, socially, intellectually; indeed, from any standpoint one may cite. The management is all the time reaching out for students from all parts of the Inland Empire. And, what is rare among managements of collegiate institutions, combines excellent business judgment with high literary standards.

Pendleton could further strengthen Pendleton academy, make it a larger institution, broaden its scope, enable it to bring people from other points to make homes in Pendleton. It would give the town more good than would offset the cost.

The fruit fair is worthy good attendance. It is held in a building 200 by 200 feet, roofed with canvas, which affords excellent light and yet gives ample protection. The displays are attractive, with some designs of special merit. The O. R. & N. and W. & C. R. R. roads have both elegant booths, and a number of other local houses have arranged displays that would attract attention from the visitor in any fair.

One finds a surprising absence of "knockers" among the people here. Walla Walla has experimented with fruit fairs for four years, and has proven that they pay. They bring more money to the town than they cost. They advertise the resources of a region that needs more advertising. Of course, the best fruits come from that portion of the Walla Walla valley which is within Umatilla county, Oregon. But then the fruit fair management is not to be blamed for getting the best fruits obtainable in the Walla Walla valley, even although they come from the Oregon side of the state line.

Then, too, Col. O. R. Ballou, of Milton, Umatilla county, Oregon, is at the head of the fruit department, and vice-president of the fair association. So that an Oregon man handles the fruit exhibits, as well as Oregon furnishes the best fruits.

But, they get the fruits, and they get the men, and they make it a success, and the fair deserves patronage and it gets it.

PENDLETON DAY AT FRUIT FAIR.

Umatilla Indians Will Dance and Parade at Walla Walla Thursday.

Umatilla Indians to the number of a score or more will swoop down upon Walla Walla on Thursday of this week and give them a real exhibition of war dancing and parading. Two war dances will be given, one in the afternoon and one in the evening. The big parade will also occur in the afternoon. The Indians will be togged out in aboriginal splendor, with feathers, paint, bear claws, blankets, and all the accessories of a dressed up Indian on his way to Sunday school. Lee Moorhead and Chief of Indian Police brigade will accompany the party and see that the Indians sustain their representations as fancy dressers and trippers of the light fantastic toe.

Thursday will be Pendleton day at the Walla Walla fruit fair and this city will be largely represented.

HOME FROM YAKIMA.

Chris Simpson and Jim Irving's Horses Won Several Purse.

Chris Simpson and Jim Irving got back home last night from Yakima, where they had been attending the races at the state fair last week. Their horses were fairly successful and won several first and second prizes.

Tuesday, September 25, Simpson's Santa Ann won second premium in the 2:40 pace; Freak, of Baker City, first.

Wednesday, September 26, Simpson's two horses, Spot and Mack Mack, were respectively first and second for three consecutive heats in the 2:40 trot. Best time was 2:20 1/2. Spot getting a second at that mark.

Two Fastest Heats.

Thursday saw the great race between the two pacers Kittitas Ranger, owned in Seattle, and Alta Norte, owned by Chris Simpson. The race did not fill, so the management offered a special purse in order to see the horses race. The spectators were very anxious for the event, also, but they did not realize what they were going to

see. The judges announced that the winner would receive \$100, and an additional \$100 if the track record of 2:15 was lowered. They started it off in 2:11 and 2:12 1/2, and the judge in announcing the result stated that these were the fastest two consecutive heats ever paced or trotted in a race in Oregon, Washington, Idaho or British Columbia.

In the 2:25 pace Arab of Spokane was first, best time 2:20; Chris Simpson's Santa Ann second; Freak third. Jim Irving's Edison took first premium in a pacing race on Wednesday.

On Thursday Mr. Irving's Ovita took first in the 2:30 trot. Mr. Simpson stated this morning that he and Mr. Irving would take their horses to the Lewiston races, which commence on the 15th inst. In the meantime the horses will be given a rest, and exercised on the local track.

AT THE DALLIES.

Marin and Turner are Stars in Their Baseball Club.

Gernie Hays and Ed Culp left today for The Dallis in response to a telegram from the street fair management of that city, presumably instigated by A. M. Stringer, to assist them during the rush. These two young gentlemen assisted Mr. Stringer in work of construction and in "splicing" for the different attractions, and are onto their respective jobs.

Just a number of young men from Pendleton have gone to The Dallis during the past few months, including Frank Murphy, Elmer Turner; Heiman Peters, Jake Welch, Will Dupuis and Jake Marin. The Dallis fair will attract a good attendance from Pendleton.

Jake Marin and Elmer Turner are star members of The Dallis baseball team and are reported to be drawing down a fat stipend for their acrobatic and gymnastic work on the diamond.
