DEATH OF ELI STEWART.

Became a Resident of Umatilla County
in 1880.

Eli Stewart died at the home of his
son, Harold Stewart, at the Stewart
stage station between Pendleton and
Ukiah, at 8 o'clock this morning.
Deceased was born in Ohio on August
3, 1813 and came west in the early 30s,
crossing the plains and locating in the
Willamette valley. He removed to
Umatilla county in the spring of 1880,
and settled on Birch creek and has
made his home there ever since. His
two sons, Harold and Richard survive
him, the last named being a resident of
Susanville, Grant county. Mrs. Ste-
wart died in 1884.

Win Stewart, a clerk in Tallman &
Company's drug store, and Carl Ste-
wart, a clerk in T. C. Taylor's hardware
store, are grandsons of the deceased,
and will go out home on the stage Wed-
nesday morning to attend the funeral,
which will be held at Pilot Rock at 4
o'clock in the afternoon of that day.

known and highly respected pioneer
has passed away, leaving behind a
record worthy of emulation.

SUICIDE OR MURDER.

Death of Mr. Crockett at Milton Last
Night.

Milton, Oct. 2.—A man commonly
known as "David" Crockett, who
lived one and one-half miles north of
this place, died shortly after midnight
this morning under suspicious circum-
stances. Coroner W. G. Cole and
Prosecuting Attorney T. G. Halley
arrived at Milton on this morning's
express train and will return this
evening. Mr. Crockett was found dead
in his bed with a bullet wound in his
head. The ball entered above and
back of the right ear. Grasped
awkwardly in Mr. Crockett's right
hand, was a brand new Smith & W-
son revolver, 38 calibre.

Mrs. Crockett was sleeping in an ad-
joining room. She heard no shot fired
but thinks she must have been awak-
ened by the report. One of the boys
was sent to a neighbor's for assis-
tance.

A coroner's jury investigating the
case at Milton, today brought in a ver-
dict to the effect that deceased came to
his death from a gunshot wound, but
whether or not it was self-inflicted was
not known.

Deceased leaves a wife and two sons,
aged 20 and 12 years.

FATE OF CONFEDERATE SEAL.

It Was First Defaced and Then Sunk in
the Savannah River.

"The result of the last confederate
council of war held at Abbeville, S.
C., in May, 1865, was soon known all
over Abbeville, and the generals and
the secretary of war were kept busy for
hours signing honorable discharges for
the tired soldiers, who immediately
applied for them," writes Mrs. Thad-
deus Horton, in the October Ladies'
Home Journal. "During the evening
Mr. Benjamin asked for a hatchet,
and with it he defaced the confederate
seal. About twelve o'clock the same
night the confederate party continued
their retreat in the direction of Wash-
ington, Ga., and while crossing the
Savannah river in the darkness some
one suggested that the seal be thrown
overboard. This idea was at once ap-
proved, and when the boat reached
midstream it was dropped with a dull
splash into the sandy river bed of that
beautiful southern water course, where
to this day its mission all fulfilled, it
serenely rests."

SHE WANTS HUGGING STOPPED

Indignant Woman Sees Too Much of it
in Washington.

A woman has written the District
of Columbia commissioners a letter in
which she says that the habit of young
men and girls hugging on street cars,
in theaters and public parks at the
national capital has grown to such an
extent that it will corrupt the rising
generation.

She declares that it is almost im-
possible to take a car ride to any of
the suburban resorts without observing
some young man trying to see how
close he can hold his girl in his arms
or how near in his lap she can sit.

"Such conduct," she condoned and
tolerated, will cause sorrow to come to
the hearts of many mothers," says the
writer.

In closing her letter the lady begs
the district commissioners to give the
matter earnest consideration and says
that a law prohibiting such conduct on
street cars is far more important than
laws prohibiting expectation in cars.

USES OF THE LEMON.

Cure for Headache Due to Biliousness or
Torpid Liver.

Sick headaches may often be cured
by taking half the juice of one lemon
in a teaspoonful of strong black coffee.
Headaches from biliousness or torpid
liver sometimes yield to the simple
treatment of half a lemon squeezed
into a cup of hot water without sugar,
taken night and morning.

Lemon juice and sugar mixed very
thick furnish a common household
remedy for coughs and colds. Hot
lemonade is also good, but the very
best form in which the lemon can be
used for such cases is the following:
Put a good sized lemon in the oven
and let it remain there until thorough-
ly baked. It will then be soft all
through. Take it out and add enough
sugar or honey—honey is preferable—to
make a thick syrup with the juice.
Keep this warm and take a teaspoon-
ful every few minutes.

When you make a hot lemonade for
a cold remember that glycerine instead
of sugar will make the remedy more
valuable.
