#### ESSENCE OF SELFISHNESS.

### POLITICAL POINTS.

Dr. Hiram W. Thomas, pastor of the People's church in Chicago says: "Whether we shall continue to have a 'syndicate' president and a 'syndicate' government or a government of the people—that is the issue of this campaign. I hold that we should end 'syndicate' rule and so I shall vote for Mr. Bryan!"

A. Augustus Healy, of Brooklyn, who was a prominent gold democrat four years ago, has decided to support Bryan for president on the extraordinary issue of anti-imperialism. Mr. Healy is president of the Brooklyn Institute. He was an internal revenue collector under President Cleveland.

McKinley will not come within a million votes of the support of 1896, was the optimistic opinion expressed by National Committeeman D. C. Hamilton, upon his return from Chicago to Salt Lake city.

A poll of the New York Herald composing room on the presidency, and printed, showed 105 votes for Bryan, 17 for McKinley, 8 doubtful, 2 silent and one prohibitionist.

Referring to the trusts, Mr. Bryan said there could be no good monopoly in private hands. He referred to Senator Hanna's declaration that if the trusts should prove dangerous, the republican party would take care of them. "What a consolation," he exclaimed, "to know that Mr. Hanna has his arms around you and will protect you from the trusts!"

Senator P. H. McCarran of New York charges a "corruption fund" of between \$20,000,000 and \$30,000,000 is being raised by Senator Hanna to buy votes in New York state above the Harlem river and in Indiana and Illinois. McCarran says he can name the corporations supplying the money.

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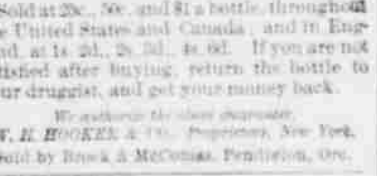
