GENERAL NEWS.

James Stillman, treasurer of the
committee appointed by the Chamber
of Commerce for the relief of Galves-
ton sufferers, acknowledged the receipt
to date of \$100,890.

The crisis in the German textile
trade is spreading. One manufacturer
after another has stopped production
for an indefinite time, or has dismissed
half his hands and cut down the work-
ing hours of the remainder, says the
Berlin correspondent of the London
Daily Mail.

At the Glenville track Crescents made
a new world's record for trotting
stations by going a mile in 2:04,
which beats his own previous record by
three-quarters of a second. Crescents
covered the mile without a slip, the
time by quarters being: 0:31 1/2,
1:01 1/2, 1:31, 2:04.

The battleship Texas is about to be
passed upon by a board of survey at
Norfolk to determine whether it is
worth while to spend any more money
on this obsolete type of ship. If the
overhauling can be brought within
reasonable limits, it is probable that
it will be authorized.

Steve Flanagan, the ex-champion
bantam-weight pugilist, died in Phila-
delphia at the Hahnemann hospital,
never having regained consciousness
since his collapse in the fifth round of
his fight with Jimmy Devine at Indus-
trial hall Friday night. Several men,
including Devine, who were directly
connected with the contest, were
placed under arrest.

During the last three days, immi-
grants from the Canary Islands and
Barcelona to the number of 8100 have
arrived at Havana and left for the
country districts, where employment is
readily obtained. This continued
influx partially solves the labor ques-
tion, many of the plantations having
been idle owing to lack of labor to
cultivate them.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Binger Hermann, commissioner of
the general land office, delivered an
address at Payette Saturday evening.
The audience was the largest in the
history of the town.

Hon. C. E. S. Wood spoke at Armory
hall, Baker City Saturday night to a
large audience in support of Bryan
for president. Mr. Wood's speech was
in the same strain as other speeches.

E. C. Hayward at Corvallis has
resigned his position as electrician in
the mechanical department at the agri-
cultural college at Corvallis, the resig-
nation to take effect December 1.
Mr. Hayward is to engage in business
at Victoria, B. C.

The government rangers having the
work of constructing a horse trail from
Foley Springs to Hazel Dell have
finished their work. They cut a trail
six feet wide. It is possible to ride
the entire distance with the exception
of a few steep places.

The school superintendent of the
Klickitat county says he has been
unable to obtain a sufficient number of
teachers for his county and is about
half a dozen short. Unemployed
teachers will take notice and should
address Professor Colburn, Golden-
dale.

The large bear which has been caus-
ing the farmers in the vicinity of
Sumner, Wash., much annoyance for
some time has been killed. The ani-
mal had become very bold, making a
raid on some orchard, garden, or
pigpen almost every night. It weighed
430 pounds before it was dressed.

A. B. Payton, a well-to-do rancher
of Malheur county, was fatally in-
jured at Baker City Saturday. He
was taking part in a friendly contest
with several other riders in an effort
to beat each other into town. He had
almost reached the main part of the
city, when the horse Payton was rid-
ing slipped on the wet street and fell,
rolling on top of his rider, crushing
his body.

By a recent reclassification the mail
clerks on the overland train between
Portland and Ashland have lately had
their salaries increased. The head
clerk now receives \$116 per month and
helpers \$100 per month. The salaries
of the clerks on the local trains re-
main at \$83.33 per month, the same
as they have been drawing since they
began running through to Ashland.
The former salaries on the overland
were about \$80 and \$70 per month,
respectively.

ANOTHER CHINESE ARMY

Two Hundred Thousand Soldiers Being
Collected.

THESE FORCES ARE NOT NEEDED

Washington Is Uneasy Lest It Deter the Em-
peror From Turning Over the
Rebels to Justice.

Washington, Oct. 8.—Uneasiness is
felt over the receipt of news that Gen-
eral Esh Siang, who will undoubtedly be
named by the foreign ministers
as one of those principally responsible
for the attacks on foreigners in
Chili and Shantung provinces, is col-
lecting a Chinese army of two hundred
thousand in the neighborhood of
Singan Fu, for the ostensible reason of
the protection of the emperor and em-
press dowager. A large army is not
essential to the protection of the court
which has been guaranteed by the
powers, if they return to Peking. It is
feared the army being collected by the
reactionaries will intimidate the em-
peror and empress and prevent them
from yielding to punishment of Prince
Tuan and the other leaders.

LEFT THEIR HAPPY HOMES.

Imperial Mongolians Went to Singan Fu
Because They Were Short of Provi-
sions.

Washington, Oct. 8.—In a message
handed to Secretary Hay by Minister
Wu from Viceroy Li and Chang, who
were recently appointed to assist Prince
Chang and Earl Li as peace negotia-
tors, it is stated that the departure of
their imperial majesties for Singan Fu
was caused by a scarcity of provisions
in Tai Yuen Fu on account of the
drouth, and the fact that Singan Fu
has better communications with
Shanghai.

Confirms the Report.

Washington, Oct. 8.—Chinese Minis-
ter Wu this morning informed the
state department that the empress
dowager and her court left Tai Yuen
Fu on October 4 for Singan Fu, the
ancient capital, with which commu-
nication is said to be good. Wu says the
peace negotiations advance rapidly.

MEETINGS IN WALLA WALLA.

Both Parties Have Speakers to Discuss
Current Issues.

Walla Walla, Wash., Oct. 8.—Chas.
Voorhees spoke here Saturday night
in the opera house. Discussing the
foreign policy of the administration, he
said:

"We are engaged in the delectable
business of shooting down our allies,"
cried Voorhees, "or, if not that, then
we are tearing down our constitution." Then,
following that thought, he
quoted from many statesmen—always
quoting Aguinaldo first—opinions re-
garding our inability to maintain
colonies under the constitution. In
order to make his position strong he
quoted from the republican campaign
text book extracts printed therein from
a publication of the treasury depart-
ment, a report showing the income to
the different nations from their
colonies, and the methods of govern-
ment, and said: What is the pur-
pose of the party—to maintain colonies; it
is the confession of Mark Hanna; it is
the unmasking of republican inten-
tions."

Chairman Y. C. Black of the republi-
can county committee, last night
received a telegram from Congressman
W. C. Jones, dated Goldendale, in
which he says he will be here today
and that he is accompanied by S. S.
Nichols of Snohomish, candidate for
secretary of state. Both men will
probably speak at the opera house.

La Grande, Oct. 8.—A meeting of
the La Grande republican club was
held pursuant to a call of Mr. J. W.
Scriber, president of the club. There
was quite a large attendance and the
principal business was that of making
arrangements for the public speaking
at the opera house tonight, wherein
Hon. Binger Hermann, commissioner
of the general land office, will make the
principal address.

Killed in Luzon.

Washington, Oct. 8.—MacArthur
cables: "Killed near San Quentin,
Luzon, October 4; Paul Jenkins, of
company A, Thirty-third infantry; and
wounded, L. Harris, of company B,
Thirty-third, infantry; wounded and
captured, Eugene Todd of company A,
Thirty-third infantry."

To Rescue Capt. Shields.

Manila, Oct. 8.—General Hare, with
two battalions of the First Infantry,
has started for Marinduque island to
rescue Captain Shields and his fifty-
two men of the Twenty-ninth infantry.
It is believed that they are at Mindoro.

Supreme Court Convenes.

Washington, Oct. 8.—The supreme
court met at noon. No business was
transacted, excepting swearing in sev-
eral new members of the bar. Regular
call of the docket occurs tomorrow.

Railroad Traffic Man Dead.

New York, Oct. 8.—Geo. B. Blanche-
ard, former commissioner of the Joint
Traffic Association, died this morning
from complication of diseases.

Chicago, Oct. 8.—The third man
warrant in connection with the alleged
swindling of insurance companies and
against all whom insinuations of
murder are made, is F. W. Brown,
assistant manager of the Mooney and
Boland Delivery Agency. He was
arrested this morning. Brown laughs
at the charges, and says he can prove
his innocence from indisputable evi-
dence by Dr. Unger, and Frank H.
Smiley. Brown was arraigned this
morning and held in fifteen thousand
dollar bonds. Unger, when "swayed,"
refused to say anything further, except
that he was sorry he had become
mixed in the affair.

THEY MUST BE SINCERE.

BRYAN THINKS SALEM, ILLINOIS,
PEOPLE HONESTLY SCARED.Republican Pictures Made Prominent
on Bryan's Visit to His Native Home.

Salem, Ill., Oct. 8.—By 7 o'clock
this morning, the streets and bridges
of the native town of W. J. Bryan were
filled with crowds and brass bands.
The candidates spoke from a stand at
the court house to four thousand people.
He solemnly referred to the graves of
his parents and his love for the people.
A number of McKinley and Roosevelt
pictures were shown in the windows
of business houses, and Mr. Bryan
showed feeling over the fact, saying
that he believed these people must be
honest in the thought that his election
would be dangerous to the country, to
do such a thing while he was visiting
his birthplace.

Benton, Ill., Oct. 8.—Forty-five
hundred welcomed Bryan here at the
home of the late John A. Logan. The
weather was cold, but the audience was
demonstrative. Bryan assailed the
trusts.

TEDDY RAISES A QUESTION.

Seems to Doubt Democratic Sincerity in
Trust Opposition.

Peoria, Ill., Oct. 8.—Roosevelt left
Chicago at 7 this morning for the
second and last days campaigning in
Illinois. At Joliet, a thousand people
in the public square listened to Teddy,
who was introduced by President
Lambert, of the American Steel Wire
company. He spoke of trust legisla-
tion, saying the democrats in congress
voted against the trust amendments
submitted by the republicans. Upon
his arrival here, the candidate found
a crowd greater than in any Illinois
town so far. After a parade, Roosevelt
spoke from the platform of the court
house square along lines similar to the
Joliet speech.

Collision in Hoeriland.

London, Oct. 8.—Lord Roberts re-
ports a collision on Saturday night at
Karlshof, on the Durban railway in
which several were killed and many
injured. Edwards, chief of the Boer
scouts has surrendered.

CIRCUIT COURT.

Large Number of Both Civil and Crimi-
nal Cases on the Docket.

Judge W. R. Ellis arrived in Pen-
dleton on Sunday from Heppner and is
presiding over the session of the circuit
court now in progress. A great deal of
business will come before the court,
and the session promises to be a long
one. Many civil cases were disposed of
today, and the trial of one criminal
case commenced. There are a number

LIKELIHOOD THE STRIKE WILL END

Miners Continued Their Marching in Spite
of Sheriff Harvey and His
Deputies.

Hazleton, Pa., Oct. 8.—The national
officers are unanimous in their decla-
ration for a settlement, and will exercise
their influence among the delegates to
accept the offer of the companies. At
this time, the men are divided on the
proposition as to whether it is a
victory or not.

MINERS WILL CONVENE FRIDAY.

President Mitchell Calls a Meeting of
Delegates—Perhaps the Strike Will
End.

Hazleton, Pa., Oct. 8.—President
Mitchell today issued a call of a dele-
gate convention of miners to be held
at Scranton on Friday, October 13.
It is believed that inasmuch as the
call has been issued, that the offer of
ten per centum has been unanimously
made by the railroads and the inde-
pendent operators, and it is generally
expected that work will be resumed
in all the mines on Monday next.

THIS MORNING IT WAS QUIET.

However, Striking Miners Marched and
"Missionaries" Among Non-Union
Men.

Hazleton, Pa., Oct. 8.—Despite
Sheriff Harvey's warning the marching
of the striking miners did not cease
this morning. Along the roads leading
to the mines they did active mis-
sionary work among the non-union men,
and further crippled the mines in
operation. The region, however, is
comparatively quiet.

SUFFERED ON A DESERT TRIP.

A Relative of Mark Hanna and Two
Others Have Terrible Experience.

Phoenix, Ariz., Oct. 8.—I. B.
Hanna, superintendent of forest
reserves, a relative of Mark Hanna;
A. F. Herman and W. H. Pierce, a
guide, almost perished from hunger
and thirst on a desert trip from
Canyon to the Utah line. Their
horses escaped and they were com-
pelled to tramp sixty miles without
food and water. Hanna was exhausted
five miles from the spring. His com-
panions continued the search for wa-
ter, and almost abandoned hope, when
at last water was found. They returned
to Hanna, who was unconscious and al-
most dead. The three made their way
to Lee's ferry, where they were cared
for by a party of river men.

Mrs. Craven Granted Time.

San Francisco, Oct. 8.—Mrs. Craven
this morning was granted three weeks
time, before appearing in court again,
on her physician's testimony.

Work on the Weiser Road.

Manager P. P. Shelby returned to
Weiser, Idaho, Wednesday evening
from a trip to Denver, to which place
he accompanied President Lewis A.
Hall, where they made the purchase
of steel for the extension of the of the
P. L. N. between Cambridge and
Council.

Manager Shelby informed the Record
editor that work was progressing very
satisfactorily on the extension of the
road, the grading and the bridge and
culvert work being pushed as rapidly
as possible.

There are about 40 men at work at
the present time. The steel will arrive
here about the 15th of October and
will be laid as rapidly as possible.
The contracts for the steel were made
at a much lower figure than could have
been obtained a few weeks ago.
