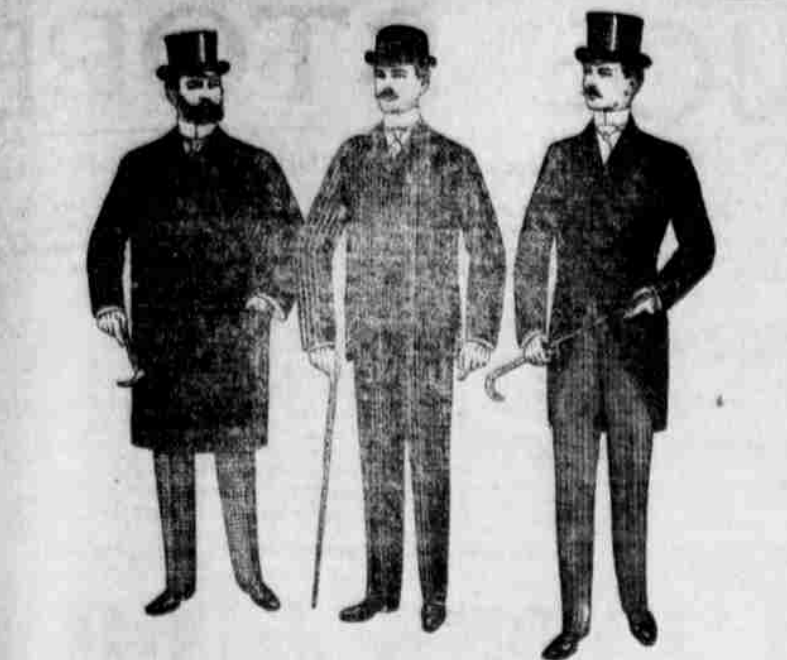

TO THE REFORM SCHOOL.

FINDING OF THE GRAND JURY IN KELLY PATRICK CASE.

Arthur Kelly, Aged 11 Years, Will Not Be Tried for Murder on Account of His Youth.

The case of the state of Oregon vs. Arthur Kelly was before the grand jury yesterday, and this morning the finding was sent in. In accordance therewith Judge Ellis committed the boy to the state reform school shortly after court convened this afternoon. The judge stated that he would have the testimony of the witnesses before the grand jury reduced to writing and forwarded to H. E. Bickers, superintendent of the Oregon state reform school, for his guidance in keeping and controlling Arthur Kelly, the slayer of his father. This commitment could only be made with the consent of Mrs. Kelly, the legal guardian of the boy. He will have to remain in the school until 21 years of age; unless released sooner upon order of the superintendent when satisfied that the best interests of all parties have been subserved. Even if having been released, he is liable to be again taken to the reform school if his conduct prior to his reaching 21 years of age, should not be satisfactory. The charge of murder can never be again brought against him.

Finding of the Grand Jury.

Following is the finding of the grand jury which Judge Ellis made the commitment:

"State of Oregon vs. Arthur Kelly. Arthur Kelly having been accused before the grand jury of the county of Umatilla and state of Oregon of the crime of murder committed as follows: The said Arthur Kelly on the 28th day of August, 1900, in the county of Umatilla and state of Oregon, purposely and of deliberate and premeditated malice, killed Frank Kelly by then and there shooting him in and through the head with a pistol, contrary to the statutes in such cases made and provided, and against the peace and dignity of the state of Oregon; and we, the said grand jury, having heard the evidence of the witnesses whose names are hereto annexed, and that said defendant, Arthur Kelly is a youth under the age of 16 years, namely of the age of 11 years; and that said charge of murder appears to be supported by evidence sufficient to put said accused defendant on trial, and it appears to us that said accused Arthur Kelly is a suitable person to be committed to the care and guardianship of the state reform school of the state of Oregon; we therefore recommend that he be so committed."

Dated at Pendleton, in the county

aforesaid, this 8th day of October, A. D. 1900.

The case of the state vs. Pat Cary,

At 9 o'clock at night a verdict of guilty was rendered, with a plea for the mercy of the court. Mr. Cary will receive his sentence at 9 o'clock Wednesday.

HOMER DAVENPORT'S SPEECH.

The Great Cartoonist Tells of His

Boys' Days in Oregon.

Many persons in Eastern Oregon, particularly in this county, know Homer Davenport, one of the Hearst newspapers of San Francisco, Chicago and New York, who formerly lived in Salem. He made a speech the other day before the Commercial Travelers' Anti-Trust League in New York. It was his maiden effort at a political speech, and he blushed at the ovation he received.

"I used to live in Oregon," he said,

"and once when a boy I went to Silverton. There I saw the first man in my life who had on clean linen, a silk hat and a real diamond. He was a commercial traveler. Afterward, when I worked in a livery stable, it was the happiest day in my life when I got to drive a drummer through the country. I thought he was the biggest man on earth; there was only one man who, in my estimation, could equal him—that was the reporter."

"The commercial traveler is now on his deathbed, and he'll be buried shortly if the trusts continue. The good clothes, clean linen, silk hat and diamond are gone and hollow cheeks and hopeless looks have taken their place."

Mr. Davenport told about his cartoon on the commercial travelers, showing that the trusts were crushing the life out of them.

"I did not appreciate," said Mr. Davenport, "the tragedy of my drawing until I got a letter from a widow living in Dayton, O., whose husband had sickened and died through being thrown out of work through the operations of the trusts. 'Did you draw that picture,' the woman asked, 'to paint our homes?'"

The New Sawmill is Revolutionizing

Things.

George Stocker is in the city from Alba, where he is the proprietor of the general merchandise store. He states that business is good in all lines, and that he will return home Wednesday or Thursday, after transacting some business, including the purchase of goods of which he is short.

Miss Mae Stocker, his eldest daughter, is a student at Pendleton academy.

The new enterprise of J. L. Bisher & Company at Alba is widening the field for sales of lumber of all kinds, and upon that subject Mr. Stocker gave valuable information. They are in the lumbering business and have recently secured the services of a sawyer from Michigan, and are turning out all kinds of lumber at prices that are attracting trade. They have a matcher and a planer, and turn out shiplap, flooring, rustic and rough lumber.

Pendleton contractors are fighting to get their material at Alba. Rough lumber is \$8; shiplap, \$12; flooring, \$16.

Mr. Stocker said the lumber is nice and clear, and that Robert Forster had said of the output of the Alba mills that some of the finest lumber he gets at his yards comes from there.

Mr. Stocker told a contractor here that, if he had his own teams, he could save \$5 or \$4 a thousand on his lumber by buying at Alba. It is a matter of sufficient importance to justify local contractors to look into the matter thoroughly.
