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A REMARKABLE CAMPAIGN.

NEVER BEFORE HAS SUCH A ONE BEEN SEEN IN THIS COUNTRY.

There Will Be No Red Lights, Little Enthusiasm and Only a few Orations to Listen to.

The present national political campaign, in so far as Umatilla county is concerned, is the most remarkable, in its peaceful and apathetic aspects, that has ever been experienced. It is different from any campaign ever waged here. It is not a campaign that there is no interest being shown, but it is being shown in a way different from all other campaigns. Thus far there has been but one public meeting, and that a republican speech in the court house bylinger Herrmann, commissioner of the general land office. One more republican speech is billed for Pendleton, namely, Charles W. Fulton on Saturday evening, October 20.

The democrats have restricted themselves to a meeting last Saturday night, at which a speech was given, and there will be another meeting of the club in the court house this evening.

The McKinley club has given no sign of life in the campaign.

The voters, however, do not need public meetings. They are individually taking an interest in the campaign and a large vote will be polled. The day of election is Tuesday, November 6, and the polls will be open from 8 o'clock a. m. until 6 o'clock p. m.

Two Presidential Electors Here.

It is not improbable that, as Umatilla county goes, so goes the election. Of the four democratic electors in the state of Oregon, one, Walter M. Pierce, is a resident of this county, and of the four republican electors, one also, William J. Furnish is a resident of Umatilla county.

That class of persons who are "willing to take a chance," as the saying is, have plenty of room to guess as to which party will poll the most votes in this county.

There will be little money spent, little literature distributed and little field effort for introduced books of machine politics. The issues have been so thoroughly discussed in the newspapers and the voters have given them such careful study, that their minds have already been made up. All that now remains is to give them the opportunity to retire to the booths, mark their ballots, count the tickets and announce the result.

Tickets in the Field. This year the voter has his choice from among a great many electoral candidates. Probably more national tickets are in the field than most persons could name. County Clerk W. D. Chamberlain, who will soon have the ballots printed, will be compelled to place thereon the names on these electoral tickets.
