Two and one-half ownces of pure alcohol was mixed with water or coffee and given in six small doses, three with meals and three at regular intervals between meals, to avoid any effect upon the nerves. A bottle of claret or three glasses of whisky contains about the same quantity of alcohol. When no muscular work was connected with the experiment the alcohol furnished one-fifth of the total energy of the diet. In experiments with severe exercise it furnished one-seventh. With three men in thirteen experiments alcohol was used, results showing that 98 per cent of the alcohol was hurned up in the body and transformed into energy.

"Is the energy of alcohol used for warmth and work?" Many have replied that it is wasteld and not used. Alcohol acting on the nerves control-ling the blood vessels brings blood to the surface of the body, thus radiating more heat and proving that the drinker loses more heat than is gained from the alcohol. Experiments showed that this was not true, only a fraction of the heat yielded by the alcohol be-ing radiated. While alcohol does yield heat to the bedy and probably imparts energy for muscular work as well, it is difficult to prove the latter. 


