GET READY TO VOTE.

ONE MAY VOTE, IF NOT ALREADY REGISTERED.

Question Has Arisen Upon a Certain Point Which Will Require a Test Case to Settle.

Question has arisen which will require a test case in the courts to settle, a voter cast his ballot, on November 1, in one precinct, while at the same time registered in another? But it is a question which will affect the casting of very few votes. If at the time according to section 5 of the 1898, lowit, between January 1, 1898, and the 15th day of June, he is not necessarily disqualified. There is still a remedy for

persons who are not registered and desire to vote at the presidential election, should lose no time in preparing the means for so doing. Registration blanks to be witnessed by six holders can be obtained at the city clerk's office, and these may be taken to any notary public or judge of the peace. Young men who become 21 years old since June 1, who were deprived of registration, must fill out registration blanks, and be sworn to do so immediately. Persons who have full citizenship papers are not registered and who are otherwise qualified, should also have their names filled out at once, if they do not want to be deprived of their vote.

If the Voter Has Moved.

A man registered before the June election and has since moved into another precinct from the one where he voted, he must subscribe an affidavit three times, and produce six holders who will swear, in connection with his own affidavit, that they personally acquainted with him at his residence, and that they know his statements for the election to be true. He must also have six freholder witnesses before the election board at the time he presents his ballot, and the judges must take the affidavits without the intervention of the justice of the peace or a notary public. But this causes delay in voting, and it may not be easy to get the statement for the election to be true. The voter can obtain a copy of the affidavit law, and notice section 15 of the constitution, which covers the case presented, and will procure a blank affidavit from the county clerk, he will be able to state his case clearly.

## OBSERVED PENDLETON'S SOLIDITY.

PROMINENT U. P. OFFICIAL VISITS THE BUNCHGRASS METROPOLIS.

He Talks About the Prosperity Here to Be Seen.

"A town in the east where I live, which had business houses such as Pendleton has, would have also a population of 20,000 people," was the remark of Alexander Miller, secretary of the Union Pacific railway company, who has come out from New York to see the inland empire. Mr. Miller was seated at breakfast with Ben Campbell, traffic manager of the O. R. & N. Co., in the private car of the latter this morning ready to leave for a day's ride to Spokane. Mr. Miller and Mr. Campbell had come from Portland, arriving Tuesday evening and had spent the night here. During the evening Mr. Miller was shown about the town by F. F. Wamsley, local agent for the O. R. & N., the Union Pacific and the Short Line.

Regarding what he had seen and thought of the city and country surrounding it, he said:

Remarkable Commercial Strength.

"I have been connected with the Union Pacific company for 28 years, and yet have never before seen this country. Of course, from the maps I have studied the location of towns and knew what were the products. But I was not prepared to find a town of the size of Pendleton, no larger and yet with such solid business houses and such apparently extensive trade. Were I to come here and see what I have seen with no one to tell me that you have a country tributary for 150 miles to the south; that you have a county of which Pendleton is the center and principal town and which produces annually 5,000,000 bushels of wheat and vast quantities of other cereals and fruits and livestock and wool, even then I would know that from somewhere comes a tremendous trade."

Eastern People Don't Know.

"Eastern people do not know what such things mean. There they have towns every few miles supplying the people with their needs. You people of Pendleton cannot fully appreciate what advantages you possess."

Mr. Miller will proceed east from Spokane via the northern route. Mr. Campbell returning in a day or two to Portland.

WORK OF HISTORICAL SOCIETY.

J. H. Himes Tells About the Material Which Has Been Collected.

J. H. Himes, assistant secretary of the Oregon Historical Society, now at the Hotel Pendleton, was asked by the East Oregonian to tell something about the work of the society. He said: "Among the recent acquisitions to the collection of the Oregon Historical Society, fourth floor of city hall, Portland, the following may be mentioned: 'The Gospel of Matthew and a number of hymns translated into the Nez Perce language, also a primer in the Nez Perce. The book was printed on the mission press at Lapwai in 1842, and the other two publications in 1845."

A pair of andirons which were made by Rev. J. L. Parrish at Salem in 1841.

A canvas digger, calendar stone, iron tomahawk, amulet, and a bone implement used in making arrow heads.

Divisions of the Departments.

The collection of the society is divided into five departments, viz., documents, pamphlets, newspapers, relics, pioneer relics, archaeological relics. On November, 1899, there had been collected since January 9, preceding, for the first department, 194 articles; second, 32; third, 22; fourth, 82; fifth, 46. Since November 30, 1899, the number of articles in each department has been more than doubled. The membership of the society is now 500, and it is distributed in twenty-three counties of the state. The rooms were first opened on December 16, 1899, and since that date more than 900 persons have visited them and registered their names. In this number, almost every town in Oregon is represented, besides many cities throughout the eastern states and in all parts of Europe."

It may safely be said that no single agency in Oregon is doing more than this society in making the state known to the world, to say nothing of assisting every part of the state to become better acquainted with every other part.

CAMPAIGN OF '55 AND '56.

Major N. A. Cornoyer First Came Here at That Time.

Major and Mrs. N. A. Cornoyer, of Thorn Hollow, are guests of E. E. Emmerville. The major first visited the inland empire in the fall of 1855, at the time of the Indian uprising. He related some of his experiences of that eventful period to George H. Himes and others. The title of major is not an empty honor borne by Mr. Cornoyer. He was major of the regiment organized at Champeong, not far from Salem, in response to the call of Governor Curry for volunteers in September, 1855. Major Cornoyer and his company captured the famous old Peuplex-mox-mox on the Touchet during that campaign. The major was about to kill the chief, when the volunteer at his side, who recognized the old Indian, spoke quickly not to kill him, that it was Peuplex-mox-mox. He escaped death at that time, but was killed the following day while a captive.

In starting out upon the campaign from Champeong, the first detachment of about 40 cavalrymen reached Oregon City on the evening of the first day, under command of Major Cornoyer. The ladies of that city made a handsome large flag and presented it to them the next day. That flag was carried through the campaign and in May, 1856, upon return home, was left with Major Cornoyer for safekeeping. It had seven bullet holes through it and bore other evidences of having been to the war. It was destroyed by the fire which burned the major's farm house not far from Salem several years afterward.
