RATE IS SEVEN PER CENT.
Mis-Statement as to Current Interest
Charges by Booming Agencies.

An item clipped from an exchange
was recently printed in the East Ore-
gonian, in which was made a state-
ment to the effect that "money was
loaning in this county at 4 1/2 per cent
on farm property." Noticing it, a local
agent of a mortgage company called at
this office and said that it was inaccu-
rate.

"Money," said he, "is not and has
not been loaning at any point in this
county at 4 1/2 per cent. The commer-
cial rate is 7 per cent, the interest rate
on the school funds of the state being
six. The statement that 4 1/2 is accepted
by anyone loaning money in Unatilla
county," has somewhat embarrassed the
representatives of loaning concerns,
who are compelled to make many ex-
planations to people, who, reading it,
call and ask about the discrepancy be-
tween the supposed rate and the real
one."

DODSON ON THE TANANA.
He Writes That He Has Claims and Will
Work Them.

John R. Dodson writes to his rela-
tives in Pendleton from Circle City,
Alaska, conveying the information that
he is well and will devote the winter
to working his placer claim on the
Tanana river. He intended to leave
Circle City soon to begin preparations
for the winter's staking and drifting.
The Tanana river flows into the Yukon
river several hundred miles above the
Yukon's mouth, and in a district com-
paratively recently brought to public
notice. It heads far to the south, ap-
proximating the south coast and is
navigable for several hundred miles
up.

Mr. Dodson has been in the Klondike
and Alaska since the summer of
1897, and has been in almost every
camp from the source to the mouth of
the Yukon, including the principal tri-
butaries.

against 718 last year.

Mine Carpenter an Heir.
Harry Barnett, a carpenter employed
at the Bonanza mine, has received
word from Boston that he is one of 63
heirs to an estate consisting of 10 acres
in the heart of the city of Boston. The
estate is valued at \$15,000,000, an
average of \$250,000 for each heir. The
property has been under a 90-year
lease, which expired 5 years ago. The
heirs are descendants of General Israel
Putnam, of Revolutionary fame.

Football in Walla Walla.
Walla Walla, Oct. 24.—The uni-
versity of Washington football team
arrived in this city yesterday morning
on the Washington & Columbia river
railway and its members were escorted
to the Hotel Duane where they were
given accommodations at the expense
of Whitman college, the team from
which place they will play this after-
noon. The players from Seattle are a
bunch of young fellows and have the
appearance of knowing what it is
to be in the game and how to stay
there. They are accompanied by their
coach, J. Sayer Dodge of the university
of Indiana, to whose personal effort is
due the splendid condition of the team.

THIRD HOMICIDE CASE.
TOY TOY IS ACCUSED OF MURDERING
ANNIE EDNA.

Was Jointly Indicted With Columbia
George, The Latter Convicted.

The case of the state vs. Toy-Toy,
jointly indicted with Columbia George
for the murder of Annie Edna, was
called in circuit court this morning
after the rendition of the verdict by
the jury in the Columbia George case.

Judge and counsel are the same as in
the case just closed. The panel of
jurors having been exhausted, and only
two having been secured for this case,
the judge instructed the clerk at a few
minutes before 11 o'clock to issue a
special venire for 20 jurymen. A recess
was taken to 1:30 p. m. At that hour,
the jury box was again filled and the
trial proceeded with. The full jury of
12 had not been secured at the latest
report possible for this issue of this
paper.

The Mrs. Crockett Case.
Col. J. H. Raley filed a motion in
the case of the state vs. Mrs. Minnie
Crockett, that the verdict be set aside
and a new trial granted. The date for
argument of the motion has not yet
been set by Judge Ellis.

RAILROAD NOTES.
U. P. Said to Contemplate Line to Los
Angeles.

It is said that the Union Pacific is
again considering the feasibility of
building a line from Salt Lake to Los
Angeles. The friendly feeling which
has been exhibited for the Southern
Pacific in the past has kept the matter
in abeyance. Railroad men believe
that such a line would materially in-
crease the earnings of the Union
Pacific. The country through which it
would run is rich in minerals of vari-
ous kinds and they give evidence of be-
ing in large quantities and permanent.

The rebuilding of Galveston is due
solely to the railroad. If the big
systems had selected some other place
on the Gulf coast for a city the de-
stroyed city would have been entirely
abandoned. The engineers of the rail-
ways however saw that there was a
chance to build a great sea wall and
prevent another such a disaster
happening and to have whatever in-
terests the railroads might have left
they concluded to rebuild.

The Big Four and the Chesapeake
and Ohio railroads will soon try the
experiment of sanitary cars. The
officials of those lines are a little doubt-
ful about the result as they are fearful
the American people are not educated
up to the sanitary standard. They
think that the average traveler will be
loath to dispense with plush, carpets
and ornamental work.

The London and Northwestern rail-
road is experimenting with oil. It is
used in connection with coal and is
pronounced to have its advantages.
The plan is to build a fire of coal and
then when it becomes red it is sprayed
with oil. This adds to the life of the
coal, makes the stoking much easier
and makes the engine practically
smokeless.

E. B. Pope, western passenger agent
of the Chesapeake and Ohio at St.
Louis is the latest aspirant for fame in
his efforts to prevent rear end
collisions. He has invented a head-
light which he calls a "hindlight" and
which is part of the electric headlight
with which all first class passenger
engines are now equipped. This hind-
light is to be placed on the cab and is
to point towards the rear end of the
train. It is raised some five or six
feet above the cab and is so arranged
that it can be swung into almost any
position. It is claimed that this
searchlight will warn trains at least
one mile in the rear.

POPULATION OF CALIFORNIA.
It Is More Than Sixteen Times as Large
as in 1850.

Washington, Oct. 24.—The census
bureau this afternoon announced the
population of California for 1900 as
1,485,853, an increase of 274,325 over
1,211,528 of 1890. The population in
1880 was 864,694, an increase of
343,431, or 39.7 per cent from 1880 to
1890. The population in 1900 is more
than sixteen times as large as that in
1850, when the first census of the
population of the state was taken. The
total land surface in California is
155,980 square miles.

The average number of persons to
the square mile in 1890 was 7.7 per-
sons, and in 1900 it is 9.5. There are
57 counties in the state, all but eleven
of which have increased the population
during the decade. Los Angeles
county shows the largest increase, but
more than three-quarters of this is due
to increase in the city of Los Angeles.
Counties showing decrease are Alpine,
Butte, Colusa, Del Norte, Eldorado,
Lake, Plumas Sierra, Stanislaus, Tuolumne
and Yuba. The population of Alameda
16,464; Berkeley, 13,214; Fresno, 12,479;
San Diego, 15,700; San Jose, 11,500;
Stockton, 17,506.

Volunteers to Come Home.
San Francisco, Oct. 24.—At military
headquarters here it is stated the first
installment of the volunteer army in
the Philippines will leave Manila Novem-
ber 1. The transports will bring home
about 25,000 men at the rate of
5000 a month. The sick will, if possi-
ble, be shipped on earlier transports,
that they may travel without crowd-
ing.

The various regiments will be must-
ered out and paid as soon as possible
after their arrival here. By this ar-
rangement the camps now established at
the Presidio will be sufficient to ac-
commodate the entire army.
