GIVEN TO THE JURY.

Toy-Toy's Trial Was Concluded Friday Afternoon.

The sensation of Thursday afternoon produced by the confession of Columbia George, as given in the East Oregonian, today, quelled down during the recess for supper. At 7 o'clock in the morning, Dr. W. G. Cole was called for the prosecution, and, after telling his story under questioning by the district attorney, was cross-examined at length by Colonel Parsons, for the defense. There was no change in his testimony, worthy of note, from that given in the preceding case of Columbia George, who had been tried and convicted for the same offense.

Friday Forenoon.

At 9 o'clock an adjournment was taken to 9 o'clock this morning. Shortly after the assembling of court this morning, without calling another witness, the state rested.

Motion was made by counsel for defense to dismiss. Motion was overruled.

The defense recalled Columbia George for the purpose of cross-examination in regard to a certain conversation which took place in Carter & Raley's office a few weeks ago, the witness, Billy McKay, Charles H. Carter and Colonel Parsons being present. Columbia George denied that he had at that time stated that Toy-Toy had told him he had better not proceed any further in the killing of Annie Edna.

Toy-Toy was placed upon the witness stand in his own behalf. He testified that he never gave Columbia George two bits or any other sum to buy strychnine. His mother was seated at the counsel table at the time, and before the answer was translated by the interpreter her face was illumined by a well-defined smile of satisfaction.

Colonel Parsons took the stand, and testified that Columbia George had stated in Carter & Raley's office that Toy-Toy had told him he had better not proceed any further in the killing of Annie Edna. This was done for the purpose of impeaching Columbia George's testimony, which was very strong toward implicating Toy-Toy with the murder.

John McCourt opened for the state and was followed by R. J. Slater, for the defense, after which adjournment was taken to 1:15 this afternoon.

Colonel Parsons talked to the jury for an hour and fifteen minutes in defense of Toy-Toy, commencing at 1:15. District Attorney Bailey closed the prosecution in a speech lasting half an hour. The charge of the judge was given and the jury took the case and retired.

ELECTRIC LIGHTS FOR WESTON.

Ben F. Brown Proposes to Put in a Plant.

Weston is to have electric lights, says the Weston Leader.

Anybody who thinks that this enlightened city intends to daily along at the tail end of the march of progress

in future, needs to regulate his dome of thought. We intend to be in hearing distance of the brass band or rupture a sumpster.

An enterprising young man, Mr. Ben F. Brown, came along with a proposition to put in an electric lighting system, if sufficient encouragement were offered, and most of our people rose to the occasion with enthusiasm. The Weston Leader is informed by Mr. Brown that he has been guaranteed enough patronage to establish a plant, and that it is just as sure as that Bill will be our next president.

The plant will be a good one, mortifying the adjectives modern and up-to-date, and of the Thompson-Houston pattern, having a capacity of 600 16-candle power incandescent lights. This will be sufficient for the needs of the town for years to come. Mr. Brown has arranged with Manager Blair, of the Weston roller mills, to secure the power necessary. This will come from Mr. Blair's water ditch and turbine wheels during the winter and spring months when Pine creek is on duty, and from his mill engine during the dry season.

Weston Notes.

Miss Emma Beattie and Miss Eva Anderson had an alarming experience last Monday at the crossing of the Walla Walla river above Touchet station. The bridge formerly at this point was gone, but the young ladies were informed by some men that it was safe to ford the river. They accordingly drove in, and to their consternation the buggy was swept down stream a considerable distance. By frantic efforts the horses managed to swim ashore, and the frightened girls escaped with a thorough wetting.

The Adams Real Estate Association was reorganized at a meeting held in Weston on October 19, 1900. All the stock was represented by H. C. Adams, personally, and by power of attorney from the estate of J. F. Adams and Susan F. Adams; and I. E. Salting and H. C. Bryson. H. C. Adams was elected president, succeeding the late J. F. Adams; H. C. Bryson, vice president; and J. H. Kirby, secretary and treasurer.

C. F. Bulfinch has returned from Nome City, Alaska, whither he went with Prof. Kittredge last May in the interests of the Beach Mining Co. He came back on a steamer that was tossed in a gale for five days, and driven so far from her course that she traveled for 12 days without sighting a sail.

Weston is about to lose Miller Hall, one of its best-known citizens, who is preparing to leave soon with his family for Morrow county, below Heppner, where he has rented a hay and fruit farm from Mr. Harvey Martin.
