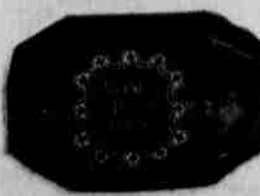

IN NEW YORK
CITY.****DRUG HOUSE EXPLOSION
CAUSES HORROR.**Buildings Torn to Atoms and Burned
to Ruins.

BODIES FLY HIGH IN THE AIR

Devastated District Covers Two Squares
in the Business Part of
the Metropolis.New York, Oct. 29.—Lives to the
number of between 50 and 100, accord-
ing to eye-witnesses and others con-
versant with the facts, were lost at
noon today in a fire and explosion in
Tarrant's drug house, at Greenwich
and Murray streets. The property
loss will be enormous, for, at this
writing, 2 o'clock p. m., the flames are
spreading in either direction. Soon
after the fire started in the drug house,
three explosions followed quickly,
after which the whole front of the
building fell out into the street. Sixty-
five girls and many men were employed
in Tarrant's, which was a seven-story
block.

Bodies Shot High in Air.

Most of the men were out to lunch,
but nearly all the girls had remained
in the place. People in the Franklin
building, one block away, who were
watching the fire, say that they saw a
number of bodies shoot up into the air
when the big explosion occurred.On the right of the Tarrant building
was the Home restaurant, which was
filled with diners. When the first ex-
plosion came, there was a wild rush
from the place, but it is not known
whether all escaped, as the fire licked
up the restaurant in a few minutes.On the other side were the litho-
graphing establishment of Schwartz &
Co., and the Irving bank, which were
soon destroyed, and the fire spread
along Greenwich street.

Some Girls Destroyed.

Twenty girls were at work in the
Schwartz building. It is believed that
some were lost.When the building's wall fell out it
carried with it the structure of the
elevated railway, blocking traffic on
Ninth avenue.It is reported that men of the engine
company, twenty-seven in number,
were in the building when the ex-
plosion occurred, and all were lost.
Three thousand persons gathered soon
after the fire started, and when the ex-
plosion came, many were injured by
the glass and trampled on in the panic.The Hartman building was also soon
destroyed, and the fire switched around
on Warren street.It is now said that ten girls escaped
from Tarrant's. They say many are
dead in the ruins.The force of the explosion sent the
roof two hundred feet into the air.

FURTHER HORRIBLE DETAILS.

People are Missing Everywhere—Two
Blocks are Ruined.New York, Oct. 29.—Twenty-eight
seriously injured people are in the
Hudson street hospital, five of whom
will die. Ten of the eleven missing
firemen are Captain Smith, Connolly,
Jordan, Kennan, Connelly, Wallace,
Kellie, McCall, Mulligan and Stran-
dhan.There is a report that twenty-five
men were at work in the coffee house of
Epstein, Smith & Weidman. They are
missing. The building was opposite
the drug house and the explosion
wrecked it. The men had no chance
for escape, and there is little chance
that any are alive.

Large Area is Devastated.

A report that was received which
says that of the fifteen men of the fire-
truck, ten are missing.At 3:30, two city blocks bounded by
Washington, Greenwich, Chambers and
Warren streets are practically in ruins.When the wall fell which knocked
in the front of the Irving bank, the
teller had eighty thousand dollars in
cash on the table in front of him. He
had no time to transfer the money to a
safe place, so a detail of police now
guard the gold. So far, no cause is
known for the explosion.

SEVERAL BANKERS INJURED.

Cause of Explosion Was Chemicals Ig-
niting on Sixth Floor.New York, Oct. 29.—The first ex-
plosion completely gutted the Irving
National bank just across the street.
Teller Denlap, Adjuster Van Zandt
and Cashier Dennison were badly
hurt. The bank will be open for busi-
ness tomorrow. It is wide open, there
are no windows or doors. The explosion
was of chemicals, ether, gasoline,
benzine and kindred stuff stored on the
sixth floor. The force was terrific.
People two blocks away were knocked
down.The second explosion threw the
elevated station off the structure into
the street, where it soon burned.

Fire Brought Under Control.

The third explosion caused the build-
ing next west on Warren street to go
down like a card house. It was oc-
cupied by small concerns.
Wm. Allen Sons, fruit dealers, oc-
cupied the lower portion. Three of thefive men in the office are accounted for.
The fire swept west to Washington
street and around to the south to
Chambers street, and at 2:50 was under
control. The streets are choked with
debris so that nobody can get near, not
even the firemen. A dozen buildings
were either burned or blown down, and
two whole city blocks are laid waste.New York, Oct. 29.—Merchants
familiar with the burned district
estimate the property loss at \$5,000,000.
The number of dead will not be
known until the debris has been
cleared away. At least one hundred
people are injured.**REVIEWED BY WALES.**CITY OF LONDON VOLUNTEERS GIVEN A
TREMENDOUS OVATION.Business Was Practically Suspended and
Traffic Closed.London, Oct. 29.—Reviewed by the
Prince of Wales and cheered by
thousands of people, the retiring City
of London volunteers today received
the homage intended for Saturday, and
which was postponed, owing to their
late arrival at Southampton. Twenty-
four thousand home troops lined the
route of the parade. Business was
practically closed. Street traffic was
suspended. So great was the throng
that there was an overflow of the east
end to the west end, something
happening once in a decade.The parade started at 2:30, and all
along the line the reception surpassed
for enthusiasm anything that has been
seen here during recent years. St.
Paul's was reached at 3:30, where a
thanksgiving service was held, while
the bells in many churches and towers
pealed.**TRAGEDY IN PRISON.**Keeper Shot by Inmates as They Sawed
the Bars.New York, Oct. 29.—Hugh McGov-
ern, keeper of the prison at the West
Fifty-fourth street police court, was
killed early this morning by three es-
caping burglars, one of whom was
killed, one fatally injured, while the
third managed to escape. McGovern
discovered Joseph Emerson, Arthur
Flanagan and George Wilson sawing
the iron bars of a window in the
second tier of cells on the third floor
of the prison. Seeing they were de-
tected, one of the men shot McGovern
through the heart. Flanagan carried
down a rope improvised from bedding
and got away. Wilson followed, but

Proclamation.**SAYS WE'RE A GREAT WORLD POWER**Therefore, Let the Nation Return Thanks to
the Creator, With One Accord and
Appreciate His Bounty.Washington, D. C., Oct. 29.—The
president today appointed November 29
as Thanksgiving day. The proclama-
tion says in part:"Our country has been blessed with
abundant harvests. Labor and a great
industrial people have prospered be-
yond precedent. Our commerce has
spread over the world. Our power and
influence in the cause of freedom and
enlightenment have extended over dis-
tant seas and lands. The lives of our
official representatives and many of
our people in China have been mar-

erally exempt from pestilence and
other great calamities, and even the
tragic visitation which overwhelmed
Galveston has made evident the senti-
ments of sympathy and Christian
charity by virtue of which we are a
united people. I recommend that the
