## ELEVEN TO NOTHING.

### PENDLETON WON FOOTBALL GAME FROM THE INDIANS SUNDAY.

#### Some Cheap Guys Skated in and Paid No Money.

The game of football on the lower Alta street grounds Sunday afternoon between a team of Indians and the Pendleton boys was won by the latter by a score of eleven to nothing. The losing team outwitted the victors quite noticeably, but that was not enough to overcome the superior team work and signals of "our boys."

In the first half, Larcne made a touchdown and Linn kicked the goal. In the second half, "Red" was forced across the line for a touchdown, counting five more for Pendleton.

The line backing of Bann and Cronin, and the end runs of Lewis and Turner, were noticeable, but all the rest of the team should come in for favorable mention for meritorious work.

The best work for the Indians was done by Alexander, Motanic, "Honest John" Willotsoi and James Grangrav. The punt of Alexander in the first half was one of the prettiest ever seen in Pendleton. It is a dangerous play to attempt, for unless well executed, results disastrously. But the Indian got away with this one, and made a big gain. "Honest John" must have secured title to his name before he commenced playing football. Some of his work yesterday was not the correct thing, according to football ethics. It is scarcely necessary to refer to this however, except as a warning to the members of teams that the spectators like to see a game won according to rules, or not at all.

The crowd in attendance numbered something like 300 all told. The receipts of the game were amply sufficient to pay all expenses, but not as much as they should have been, owing to the fact that a number of "cheap guys" "skated in" before the gatekeepers were at their stations, and eluded the assessors.

The grounds were in good condition and the weather all right for the players but rough for spectators. It has been suggested that the grounds be heated by steam on such occasions.

### A REPUBLICAN SPEECH.

John C. Leasure Entertained a Large Audience Saturday Evening.

A good big audience was present in the court house Saturday evening to listen to John C. Leasure discuss the political situation from a republican standpoint. The audience was heartily in sympathy with the speaker and he has in the best of humor and voice, the result being a good feeling all around. Mr. Leasure's strong point was as to the legality of the acquisition of the Philippines. His remarks on trusts were explanatory rather than condemnatory, and he stated that they had grown up like weeds in a wheat field—because everything had grown under republican rule—the good and the bad.

Mr. Leasure referred briefly to the tariff question, contrasted the good times of the present with the hard times of Cleveland's last administration, and recited his poem on the "Tin Dinner Pail."

It was in his discussion of the policy of the McKinley administration in regard to the Philippines, however, that Mr. Leasure was at his best. He told how the United States had grown from the 13 original states, and the manner in which territory had been acquired. The Louisiana purchase under Jefferson, the purchase of Florida, acquisition of Texas, cession from Mexico, the Gadsden purchase, purchase of Alaska from Russia, were recited in whirling style; the aurora borealis was snatched from the northern sky and wrapped around the form of Liberty; with the American eagle in one hand and the stars and stripes in the other, he defended the policy of the administration and kept his audience cheering and laughing by turns. Among other tributes paid was to W. J. Farnish for leaving his party and now holding aloft the banner of the republican party.

From a republican standpoint the speech was satisfactory. John S. Gardane presided and introduced the speaker.

### SOME RAILROAD NEWS.

O. R. & N. to Take Charge of O. S. L. & U. P. Business in Portland.  
It is said that the offices of the Union Pacific and Oregon Short Line at Portland are to be abolished within 30 days, the change being in line with the economic plan inaugurated soon after the amalgamation of the Union Pacific system took place, says the Salt Lake Herald. The plan is to have the business of the two roads looked after by the agency of the Oregon Railway & Navigation company, there being slight advantage in maintaining three agencies, all of which are working to the same end, namely, converting business to the Short Line and Union Pacific.

New Northern Pacific Railway.  
Under the new time schedule of the Northern Pacific, which goes into

effect today, trains Nos. 3 and 4 will no longer have a St. Paul connection. In other words, these trains will be abandoned out of St. Paul, but will run through from St. Louis to Portland via Billings and the Burlington. Under the old schedule these trains carried three Burlington cars from Billings to Portland, but under the new arrangement the train will run from St. Louis to the coast. This arrangement has been decided upon to meet the heavy business which is constantly increasing between St. Louis and lower Missouri river points and Montana, the Inland Empire and the Pacific coast country. The recent completion and opening of the Alliance-Denver line of the Burlington has added very materially to the value of this Billings connection to the Northern Pacific, as it constitutes the short line between Denver, Helena, Spokane and other western points.

**The New Los Angeles Road.**  
In western railway circles there is a firm conviction that the Southern Pacific is back of the enterprise which is going to build a line of railway from Los Angeles to Salt Lake city, says the Chicago Times-Herald. Ostensibly former Senator William A. Clark, of Montana, is at the head of the Los Angeles & Salt Lake railway, which is an outgrowth of the Los Angeles terminal railway company, but it is confidently asserted that Mr. Clark is acting as the representative of the Southern Pacific interests.

**How'dys Like to Be the Owner?**  
The biggest nugget of gold ever received at the assay office in Wall street, according to Superintendent Mason, arrived in New York on Thursday from a mining company in British Columbia. It was consigned to the New York agents of the bank of Montreal. The nugget contained a fraction of 75 pounds of the solid yellow metal, and is valued at \$154,000. It came in a solid cone, and stood about two feet high. This cone was wrapped in canvas and fitted with an oblong box made of two-inch planks and heavily bound with iron. The gold was firmly held in the box by two wooden wedges driven in from the top. Two heavy iron rings were set in the sides of the rough box, and through these were fitted wooden bars by which the box was lifted. It required four men to remove it from the truck in the assay office to the scales.

## BLUES'EN GOES EAST.

### Cereal Food Firm Buys in the Lewiston Valley—Cost in Chicago 79 Cents.

An item of news that will interest every farmer in the Inland Empire is the announcement that Joseph Alexander, of Lewiston, Idaho, sold 25,000 bushels of bluestem wheat to a cereal food firm in Chicago. The sale of choice lots of wheat to go from the coast to the cities in the Middle West in which cereal food factories are located is not new, by any means. Each year a certain quantity of wheat has gone from the Inland Empire for that purpose, but has always heretofore cost far in excess of the price of No. 1 hard in the Chicago market.

In this instance the Chicago firm paid in excess of the coast price for bluestem, although it is not known exactly what was paid. But, taking the coast quotation for bluestem on that day, 43 cents free on board cars at Lewiston, and add 30 cents a bushel for freight to Chicago, (at the rate of 60 cents a hundred the prevailing rate in that direction) and the wheat laid down in Chicago cost 79 cents. That day wheat closed at 73 3/8 in Chicago. Here is 5 5/8 cents more than Chicago wheat, even if the flat coast price had been paid. But it is known that more than the local market was paid at Lewiston, hence the premium cost at Chicago over the nominal price of wheat that day was even more than 5 5/8 cents.

It seems to offer no particular hope for a Chicago market for coast wheat, when the freight rate prevails at now.
