FRANK WILLS INSANE. Former Pendleton Conductor in Home for Feeble Minded.

Many friends of Frank Wills here in Pendleton and all along the line of the O. R. & N. will read with deep regret the following item from the Spokaneman-Review:

"Word reached Spokane yesterday that Frank Wills, a well known and popular conductor of Spokane, who has had charge of trains out of the Union depot for several years, is considered in a deplorable state of mind weakness at a retreat in Illinois. The brain of Mr. Wills became affected early in the year and he was sent to a home for railroad men at Highland Park, a suburb of Chicago. His expenses have been jointly borne by the Masons, Elks and railroad men of the city.

"The news of his complete collapse and removal from the Highland Park home comes from Mrs. F. H. Watson, secretary and treasurer of the home. She says: 'It was impossible for us to retain Mr. Wills here, as we have no accommodations for those whose minds are affected as badly as his. Mr. Wills is now at a home for feeble minded at Elgin, Ill. He is in so bad a condition as not to be able to speak or dress himself.'

October 29.—The wheat market took a good upturn today, closing 1-8 over Saturday. The main feature was heavy crop damage in the Argentine. These reports have been frequent of late and are now confirmed. Liverpool closed 1-8 higher, 6-11-16. New York opened 1-8 higher, 77-1-8 and sold up to 78-7-8, closing 78-3-8.

The visible supply shows an increase for the week of 1,400,000, making total 50,773,000 and corn a decrease of 770,000.
