Guy Wade Possesses Many Blooded Antinians and Bins.

The Looney Hill rabbits, of this city, is an institution owned by Guy Wade, and is of growing importance. The pens are nicely fitted up and more than 100 rabbits of different sizes, ages and values are in sight. They are principally descendants of Sir Styles, Nonpareil, and Earl of Kent. A notable animal of the rabbits is Prince Bob, a new brick from California, pronounced by experts, one of the best in Oregon. All of these animals are perfectly marked and ticked, and are of royal ancestry, and registered stock.

When Grant Was President.

A United States patent was filed in the recorder's office yesterday that had a tendency to recall old times. It was issued to Charles E. Lewis for the northeast quarter of section 28, township 6 north, range 35 east, Willamette meridian. It was issued by authority of the act of congress of July 2, 1862, being "an act donating public lands to the several states and territories which may provide colleges for the benefit of agricultural and mechanic arts." This particular piece of scrip was issued to Virginia and assigned to Charles E. Lewis. The date of the patent was May 13, 1874, and it bore the name of Ulysses S. Grant as president.

PULL UP A WEED TONIGHT.

AND FIND THE SIZE OF YOUR FUTURE HUSBAND OR WIFE.

Hallowe'en or All Saint's Night, and its Prophetic Possibilities.

Hallowe'en again, with all its infinity for sportive spirits and its license for innocent prank! And with its boundless possibilities of prophecy for all young people!

The old-time customs of old England, have, so we all know been succeeded by practices which are out of keeping with the real spirit of the occasion; for, to the young person of ye olden time Hallowe'en was longed for and enjoyed because it enabled them to draw aside the veil of futurity and peer into the coming days.

The curiosity always ran in the direction of sentimental things and girls looked out by various devices how kindly Fate would deal with them in the selection of a husband.

Bobby Burns thus tells of a simple manner of putting it to the test: "The first ceremony of Hallowe'en is pulling each a stick or plant of kail. They must go out, hand in hand, and, eyes shut, and pull the first they meet with. Its being big or little, straight or crooked, is prophetic of the size and shape of the grand object of all their spels, the husband or wife. If any yird, or earth, stick to the roots, that is tocher, or fortune; and the taste of the custoe, that is the heart of the steem, is indicative of the natural temper and disposition. Lastly the stems, or to give them their ordinary appellation, the runts, are placed somewhere above the head of the door; and the Christian names of the people whom chance brings into the house are, according to the priority of placing the runts, the names in question."

But, you may use nuts and a cracking fire in a grate, with fully as certain results of prophetic pointings. They name the lad and lass to each particular nut as they lay them in the grate, and, accordingly as they burn quietly together, or start from beside one another, the course and issue of the courtship will be. It is a custom in Ireland, when the young women would know if their lovers are faithful, to put three nuts upon the bars of the grate, naming the nuts after the lovers. If a nut cracks or jumps, the lover will prove unfaithful; if it begins to blaze or burn, he has a regard for the person making the trial. If the nuts named after the girl and her lover burn together, they will be married.

On this night, young people in the North of England dive for apples, or catch them when stuck upon one end of a kind of hanging beam, at the other extremity of which is fixed a lighted candle. This they do with their hands being tied behind their backs. From the custom of flinging nuts into the fire, or cracking them with their teeth, it has obtained the name of nut-crack night.

CROP CONDITIONS.

Careful Statement by a Pleasant View Farmer.

Pleasant View, Or., Oct. 31.—Perhaps if the oldest inhabitant were interviewed in regard to the matter he would say that he "never saw the like of the rain at this time of year we are having this fall." And more than likeli would be right. The rains which fell about the 10th and 12th put the soil in excellent shape and from the 12th to about the 15th no better time for seeding could be asked for.

The fall weeds were coming up and, as the weather was warm and the ground fairly dry on top, it was a good time to kill them. Since then, however, the rains have been so frequent and copious that grain sowing has been carried on intermittently, a great deal of time being lost on account of excess of moisture. While there is no wheat as far advanced as some fields were last year, a crop here and there can be seen showing up green, but they are only low.

The same overgrowth of early sown grain attained last year has caused farmers to be a little shy of seeding quite so early this year, even had the conditions been so favorable to early planting, which they were not. And then again the later grain yielded so much better as a general thing last harvest that a great many waited in consequence two or three weeks after the ground was in good order before beginning. This, in connection with the fact that the wheat is so much weathered, has thrown the majority of fall seeding on summerfall later than would otherwise have been the case. It is seldom that Umatilla county soil gets in better working shape than it was a couple of weeks ago, and grain seeded then, the weather being warm, came up quickly and is making vigorous growth, and in fact there is no room for complaint of planted grain not doing well as germination has been almost perfect up to the present time.

But what the wheat grower seems to be most concerned about is the weed problem. As it rains so often and the ground keeps so wet it is feared by many that it will be almost impossible to kill the different varieties of mustard, tarweed and wild lettuce that practically all farmers of this county are more or less infested with. It was admitted on all sides in the winter of '98-'99 that had it not been necessary to reseed a goodly proportion of grain frozen out during the winter and in the process of drilling and harrowing, killing the young weed plants, a great many fields would have almost been taken by the weeds. But the seeding season is radically different from that of the fall of '98. Then there was no rain till in November, and a great deal of seeding was done in the dust. Even that put in after the November rains was no better off for as weeds are so concerned that that sowed before; all was weedy alike. Where weeds get in their work is where they come up simultaneously with the wheat. Where grain gets a couple of weeks start of weeds there is but little danger of damage from the latter.

There are different methods of seeding in vogue, but as to which is the better depends to a degree on the season. Some, if their land is entirely free from trash, as soon as the rains have started the weeds, put their drills to work without harrowing before or after the drill; others harrow before and not after the drill and others harrow both immediately before and after the drill. The latter is invariably, perhaps, the better, on this year, on account of the wet, warm weather there is more likelihood of a second installment of weeds coming on. Examination of different fields shows that a new crop of weeds is coming up on ground sown prior to the 18th. Perhaps as good a way as any is to harrow the ground a few days before the wheat comes up. If the weeds can be killed then the grain will be all right, though it is difficult to tell what is the proper thing to do.

Someone Come and Get a Watch.
