GENERAL NEWS.

Shakir Pasha, special envoy of the
Sultan of Turkey, presented to Emperor
William a number of gifts, including
a very valuable necklace for the em-
press.The Duke of Abruzzi has chartered
the Gothenburg, whaler Capella, to pro-
ceed to Franz Josef Land from Stock-
holm in search of the three missing
Arctic exploration expeditions.Dispatches from Manila announce
the determination to submit the pro-
posed new Philippine tariff to the con-
sideration of the war department to be
promulgated and confirmed. The tariff
was prepared by a board of army
officers connected with the customs
service in the Philippines.Tuesday's earthquake destroyed the
town of Guaranas, resulting in the loss
of 25 lives. Nearly the entire popula-
tion of Caracas passed the night in the
streets or squares of the city. Slight
tremors following the severe shocks
have occurred at varying intervals and
still continue.The application of Frank Juarez, a
Porto Rican, for a peremptory writ of
habeas corpus directing the board of
registrars to register him as a voter, on
the ground that he became an American
citizen by virtue of the cession of Porto
Rico by Spain to the United
States, has been denied by Justice
Friedman, in the supreme court of New York.The annual report of Adjutant-Gen-
eral Corbin to the secretary of war for
the year ending June 30, 1900, is a
complete statistical record of the army
of the United States. It shows that
the regular army consists of 253,000
and 99,801 enlisted men, and the vol-
unteer army consists of 154,000 officers
and 91,039 enlisted men—a grand total
of 344,799, not including the hospital
corps, which is not counted as a part
of the effective strength of the army.The civil service commission has
just completed investigations of charges
of violations of the civil service law,
and of political favoritism against
federal officials, whose names are with-
held, in Philadelphia, Louisville,
Cincinnati, Topeka, Kansas City,
Birmingham, Jersey City and in Iowa.
In some of these cases the commission
has recommended to the various execu-
tive departments to which the accused
officials belong the prosecution and dis-
missal of the latter and in other cases
action has not yet been taken.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

Four hours after entering the employ

by the Southern Pacific company's
freight train as it came around a sharp
curve, and knocked off the bridge.
His left leg below the knee was badly
crushed, the bones being broken in
many places. The man cannot or will
not talk coherently.The fourth annual meeting of the
Antelope Fair Association was a big
success, measured by other meetings
of the association, says the Herald,
and yet in point of attendance it was
not up to expectations. This is at-
tributed primarily to the fact that
there has been an "over-production" of
fairs this season in Eastern Oregon.
The paper suggests that next year the
towns intending to have fairs "pool"
the attractions and have one good
transient show.

WAS SOCIETY'S GUEST

An Italian Placed Under Arrest in
Chicago.

A DESCENDANT FROM COLUMBUS

Alberto de Porcia Had Forged Checks—Would
Forge More—Had Letters From Mil-
lionsaires' Daughters.Chicago, Nov. 1.—While preparing
to attend the horse show as a guest of
South Side society women, having
previously been dined by Italian
artists and sculptors of Chicago, Count
Alberto de Porcia was placed under
arrest on charge of having committed
thirty-five forgeries aggregating
\$4000. The arrest is directly due to an
attempt to secure money from the hotel
books for the name of Luigi Del
Orto, a San Francisco banker. Among
his alleged intended victims were Mrs.
Potter Palmer and several banks in
St. Louis and New Orleans. The count
claims to be a lineal descendant from
Columbus. He had in his possession
letters from the admiring daughters of
a number of millionaires, besides a
wardrobe of the most expensive kind.

A MISSIONARY RETURNS.

Dr. W. Martin Takes No More China in
His.Vancouver, Nov. 1.—Special to the
Times: Dr. W. A. Martin, professor of
the University of Victoria, for forty
years missionary and teacher, was a
passenger on the last Oriental steamer
arriving at this port, on his way to his
native land in the United States. In
a lecture given to the passengers on
board from Vancouver, Dr. Martin said
he had turned his back forever on the
thankless Country of the Dragon. He
had labored for forty years as mis-
sionary and teacher, only to find that
his life work had been in vain; that
the pretensions of the Chinese govern-
ment toward educational institutions
was a hollow sham, and instead of
giving the highly educated youths
positions in the government service
trained men were turned aside for
others in whom the national pig-
headedness, and prejudice predom-
inated, and even those who had been
educated and enlightened were over-
ready to tumble back into the fanatic-
ism and prejudices, the hatred of in-
novation which characterizes the
Chinese as a people.

REBELS IN SOUTHERN CHINA.

Those Against the Dynasty Are Bound
to Succeed.Hong Kong, Nov. 1.—Refugees from
Huichau who have arrived here report
that the anti-dynastic rebels in the
southern provinces are bound to suc-
ceed. They are welcomed by the in-
habitants everywhere they go. They
pay for everything they take and are
treated as guests rather than as
enemies. Ten leaders, with separate
bands, are reported to be moving in
various directions. One of these lead-
ers, who is operating in the Hinkai
land, is a mere stripling, but he has
been successful everywhere, and is re-
ported to have defeated a large im-
perial force under Admiral Ho on
October 15. Fong, Ho, Chan and
Ching are the names of the four
principal leaders.

CANADA'S BRAVE BOYS.

Returning From the Wars They Receive
Ovation in Halifax.Halifax, Nov. 1.—Canada's volun-
teers returning from the Transvaal war
were received with a great ovation,
when they landed from the troopship
Idaho five hundred strong this morn-
ing. The city was elaborately
decorated, and fetes and receptions are
the order of the day. Business is sus-
pended.

COUNT'S DEBTS TO BE PAID.

Castellane Agrees to Trusteeship for
Anna Gould's Estate.Paris, Nov. 1.—It is learned that
Count Castellane has promised the
Gould family that he wouldn't oppose
the application for trusteeship of the
estate of the countess, on the condition
that his debts were paid. It is also
rumored that the Goulds favor a
separation. Count Boni's brother
Ademar is engaged to an American girl
and sails for the United States on
Saturday.

TYPHOON AT TUAN ANAM.

Sixteen Hundred Perish and 4000 Are
Homeless in French Indo-China.
Hong Kong, Nov. 1.—A typhoon at
Tuan Anam has caused a great destruc-
tion. Sixteen hundred persons have
perished and forty-six hundred and
fifty were rendered homeless. Tuan is
a seacoast city near Hue, capital of
the province of Anam, in French Indo-
China and across the China sea from
Manila.

BRYAN IN COOK COUNTY.

Will Travel for Three Days in Illinois's
Big Center of Population.Chicago, Nov. 1.—Great preparations
are being made for the three days
rush of Col. Bryan through Cook
county. The candidate will arrive at
4 o'clock, proceeding immediately to
the lake front where he speaks. Col.
Bryan left Cincinnati this morning
and is stopping at various points in
Indiana for a few talks in that state.

ROOSEVELT'S FINAL CAMPAIGN.

Southern Tier of Countries Today and
Tomorrow.Batavia, N. Y., Nov. 1.—Col. Roose-
velt's final campaign trip began today,
when he left Buffalo homeward-bound
this morning. He will speak in the
southern tier of counties today and to-
morrow, arriving in New York Satur-
day morning in time to review a
monster parade.

President Remains in Canton.

Canton, O., Nov. 1.—President Mc-
Kinley will remain in Canton on elec-
tion night in response to the solicita-
tion of Judge Day and other citizens.
A special wire is being put in the
house connecting with Chicago, New
York and Washington. The McKinley
party will start for Washington on
Wednesday noon.

VOLUNTEERS FROM MANILA.

First Contingent to Arrive in November.
Regulars Will Do Their Work.Washington, Nov. 1.—Officials of the
war department say that while consid-
eration has been given to the subject
of bringing home the volunteer troops
before the expiration of their term of service
next July, no plans have been made.
It is declared, however, that the first
homeward movement of the volunteer
troops will begin about the middle of
November. It will be necessary, with
the present limited transport equip-
ment, to begin the return of the volun-
teers early in order that the thirty-
three regiments may all be back here
by July next, when their terms of
service expire by law.If the insurrection does not take on
more alarming proportions than is now
indicated, it will be possible for the
regular troops in the island to protect
the interests of the United States and
the living and property of the philip-
pines without the aid of the volun-
teers, before the spring season sets in.
Many of the regular troops now in
China are to be returned at once to the
Philippines, and the present quarters
of volunteers at different stations
throughout the islands will be taken
by smaller detachments of regulars. It
will probably require four months to
complete the transfer of the volunteers
back to their homes after the work has
been inaugurated.

RATHER BLOODY RETRIBUTION.

Seventy-four Chinese Rayonneted by the
German Soldiers to Save Cartridges.Berlin, Nov. 1.—The papers pub-
lish a letter from a German soldier in
China in which he says: "We cap-
tured on Sunday seventy-four Chinese
who had killed the German patrol. They
were sentenced to death, and in
order to save cartridges, we were ordered
to stab them with bayonets. It is im-
possible to describe the fearful
slaughter."

He Arraigned Bryan.

Fort Wayne, Ind., Nov. 1.—Senator
Hanna spoke to two large audiences
yesterday. His arraignment of Bryan
was severe and followed his declaration
that he had been the butt of Bryan's
ridicule and sarcasm for years and
now, before Bryan's retirement to
private life, he proposed to give him a
few parting shots.

Captured and Then Released.

Cape Town, Nov. 1.—A telegram
from Kronstadt in the Orange River
Colony, says the Boers captured and
later released a British outpost of
ninety men there. Afterwards they
looted and burned the mail train.

SIGNOR FOLI'S MONEY.

The Heirs of the Famous Singer Are in
the Courts.Tomorrow is the day upon which
Miss Lillian Hargrave is to appear
in the superior court before Judge
Carroll to answer the complaint of
Mrs. Bessie Walker, administratrix of
the estate of her brother, Signor Foli,
which alleges Miss Hargrave was given
in 1894 many valuable stocks, bonds
and other securities to hold in trust for
her uncle, Signor Foli, says the Ta-
coma News.By his will Foli left 100 guineas to
each of two English friends who were
named as executors, and \$2000 to his
former wife, Rhoda Foley, in Eng-
land, from whom he had separated.
The remainder of his estate was left to
his two sisters, Mrs. Bessie Walker
and Mrs. Hargrave, of Tacoma, and
William Foley of Connecticut.Mrs. Bessie Walker has lately been
appointed administratrix, and has
brought suit for an accounting. The
estate is valued at upwards of \$50,000.
Her attorneys are J. A. Shackelford
and A. R. Titlow. The Misses Har-
grave have General James M. Ashton for
their counsel.Referring to the case today General
Ashton said in Miss Hargrave's answer
to be filed tomorrow, she denies having
in her possession, or taken, or con-
coated, or in any way disposed of any
of Signor Foli's estate.Signor Foli had acted as a father to
ward her and her sister since the
death of their father in 1886, and
everything which they ever received
from Signor Foli were absolute gifts,
intended for their use and main-
tenance and that of their mother during
Signor Foli's lifetime and he in
giving them also expressly provided
that in case of his death or any injury
or accident to him, the things he had
given them were at all times to stand
as their absolute property. They are
free from the power and control of any
person.

A FAITHFUL SPANIEL.

Watched an Old Pair of Rubbers of His
Master's.The faithfulness of a dumb brute was
never better illustrated than by an in-
cident observed by many people Sun-
day, says an Olympian paper. Early
that morning a man went into
Bettman's store, taking off his
rubbers bought a new pair. The old
ones he threw down near the front
door of the store and wore the new
ones away. He was accompanied by a
handsome water spaniel that remained
at all times near his master. Shortly
after the dog and the man left the
store the dog came back, having evi-
dently lost his master. Spying the
rubbers on the floor the dog stretched
himself beside them. When it came
time to cross the store the dog could
not be coaxed away from the rubbers,
and it was necessary to put them out-
side the door to get the spaniel out.
This was about noon, and from that
time until 7 o'clock yesterday morning
the faithful animal lay alongside the
rubbers, the cold rain beating upon
him. The clerks in the store en-
deavored to coax the dog away to feed
him, but it was useless, he would not
leave what he supposed his owner would
return for. It is thought when he did
leave, it was only when his master
came for him.

CONFESION AND SUICIDE

Valet Jones' Plan to Ease His Gaily
Conscience.

ATTEMPT WAS HALF WAY SUCCESSFUL

Told Story of Connection With Rice's Death,
Implicating Patrick, Then Cut His
Throat, But Lived.New York, Nov. 1.—Charles F.
Jones, valet of the late millionaire
Rice, was found in his cell this morn-
ing with his throat cut from ear to ear
with a penknife. It was not fatal. It
is alleged that Jones last night con-
fessed to his part in the forgery of
checks of the dead man presented at
the banks before information of the
millionaire's death had been made
public.New York, Nov. 1.—This afternoon
Assistant District Attorney Osborne
gave out a statement regarding the
confession of the valet Jones to this
effect: "Jones says that Albert
Patrick, the lawyer, gave Rice some
tablets of a grayish color which the
millionaire took daily for more than
a week previous to his death." The
alleged confession details the in-
cidents preceding the death of Rice in
which it is asserted that Jones saw
Patrick holding a towel twisted con-
cealed over the face of Rice, who soon
died. Although the confession does
not say so, it is supposed that chloro-
form was administered. The alleged
confession goes on to tell how Patrick
signed the fraudulent will and also the
bogus checks for \$350,000. Attorneys
for the defense claim that Jones
was swayed much by the promises in
the days of the inquisition, and vir-
tually charge the authorities with mur-
der if Jones dies from his suicidal
attempt. They discount the alleged
confession.

DISEASE IN WALLA WALLA.

Scarlet Fever, 25 Cases—Had a Start
before Known.Walla Walla, Nov. 1.—There are 25
cases of scarlet fever in the city, and
one case of diphtheria has been re-
ported within the last week. The
disease had gained considerable head-
way before the discovery was made
that it was in the city and as it was a
very mild form, it was hard to check.
Health Officer Russell reported yester-
day that the epidemic had been per-
manently checked and that there
was no further fear of it gaining a
foothold.When seen by a reporter for The
Union Dr. Russell said:
"There are nearly 25 cases of scarlet
fever reported at present, but I do not
think there is any danger of its spread-
ing further. The most stringent
measures have been adopted to prevent
the disease becoming epidemic and I
think the work in this direction has
been successful. The reason that there
were so many taken down before the
fact became known that there was such
a disease in the city is that the cases
are of the mildest and there is almost
no danger to the patient. This caused
people to refrain from sending for a
physician and therefore no one was
forbidden to see the patient and many
were exposed unnecessarily."

BIG COUNTERFEITING.

Stole Russian Notes From Paris Exposi-
tion for Models.Hamburg, Nov. 1.—The Russian
secret police have discovered a stupen-
dous counterfeiting plant among Polish
and Russian refugees here. The
scheme was engineered by an expert
lithographer, who was supplied with
models by Russian treasury notes
stolen from the art section of the Paris
exposition. Ninety-six thousand roubles
of paper money were seized here
yesterday, but sixty thousand roubles
worth were smuggled into Russia,
while many millions of the bogus
money is floating in Europe.

Guest of Levi Ankeny.

Walla Walla, Nov. 1.—George H.
Himes, of Portland, assistant secretary
of the Oregon Historical society, is the
guest of the Hon. Levi and Mrs.
Ankeny. Mr. Himes was commissioned
January 9, 1899, to go into the field
and secure data, relics, etc., for the
society and he has met with great suc-
cess in his work.
