THE JOINT DEBATE.

C. E. S. WOOD FOR DEMOCRATS, TILMAN FOR REPUBLICANS.

Court House Packed With 600 People or All Parties.

One of the most successful and pleasant political meetings ever held in Pendleton was that of Friday evening, at which C. E. S. Wood, of Portland, for the democracy, and Tilman Ford, of Salem, for the republicans, met in debate.

It is estimated that 600 persons were present, and well were they repaid although many stood during the entire time of debate, for almost three hours. Colonel Ford introduced Mr. Wood, who played at once into the debate and entered upon the discussion of the questions that he considered of great and momentous importance. First, plutocracy, and gave the estimate of an eminent statistician that one-eighth of the people of this nation own seven-eighths of the property of the country; John Hopkins' assertion that the downfall of money was largely responsible, and the statement that all have gone down from the aggregation of wealth in the hands of a few. Canada's advice in 1896 for her to abandon her colonies; Ireland and Spain were quoted, and "Bryan's" statement that the colonies are hanging as millstones about her neck; the United States is greater now than Rome; Jim Keene, of Wall Street, quoted as saying that the coming election is more important than any since Lincoln's second election, that money is in the saddle, and that apparently the people haven't time to attend to elections.

The content of the government and a big standing army don't go together; the question should be not how a few can make more money, but how can all be benefited; 12,000,000 Malay labor is threatening; the constitution is being threatened; the United States is in danger of having the matter settled by a vote of the people; the United States declaring the Philippines to be citizens of the United States; they must be citizens or subjects, they endanger us.

Still a Gold Standard Democrat.

The money question was given only a few words, but they had their effect in showing that the speaker did not consider the question one of the paramount issues. "I was a gold standard man four years ago and am yet. But, you had better keep your money than that you as a people should lose your independence and your individual liberty."

Protective tariff was discussed as being admitted for the purpose of raising money; Alexander Hamilton, who was the father of protection, had a conception that this country could get along without Europe, his idea was that protection was not for the purpose of obtaining employment for a citizen, that is a vicious feature which has grown with the system.

Periodical Money Panics.

Prosperity was referred to as not the gift of any president, but the result of national conditions; money panics and distressing times are periodical; they come every 10 or 14 years.

A tribute to the declaration of independence brought out, and it was not without the injunction that the speakers should not be applauded for sentiments they expressed.

The Porto Rico question was referred to as a country which it was originally intended to have been free. The sugar trust had succeeded in having a law passed providing for the treatment of Porto Rico as though a colony or dependency of the United States, with a tariff between the two countries. The speaker said that the purpose of establishing a precedent was that a similar law could be passed for the Philippines and that country exploited by timber, hemp and gold syndicates. The ruling of dependencies belongs to a strong form of despotism. England could govern colonies better than we. Aginaldo's assistance to Dewey after the fall of Manila was referred to and the Philippine situation explained, together with Senator Hoar's opinion on the subject.

THE REPUBLICAN SIDE.

Tilman Ford made a Good Argument for His Client.

John S. Giddens introduced Mr. Ford, who commenced his address with the assertion that the declaration of independence is a business proposition; what is for the best interests of the United States; there are other questions more important than the Philippine question; while making a plea for the Philippines, the speaker engaged in making contributions to the speaker's assertions as fast as they came taking from the pages the right of suffrage in Southern states. Aginaldo was portrayed as a man who had sold out to Spain for \$100,000, an agreement that he should leave the island to be ruled by his countrymen; then returned and had killed General Luna, the greatest statesman in Luzon for suggesting what he considered the best and proper way for the Philippines to go about to obtain their freedom. The United States had paid \$25,000,000 to Spain for the Philippines. Bryan resigned his position in the army and went to Washington during the treaty discussion and induced some democrats of the senate to vote for it. The speaker then asked us to retain them; they were obtained as fairly as any country ever obtained any land; the purchase of Louisiana by Jefferson, a democrat, was without the consent of the people then inhabiting that section of the country. Jefferson at that time told his opponents that he wrote the declaration of independence and that he ought to know what it meant.

The purchase of Florida from Spain in 1819 as President Monroe for \$5,000,000 came next; a cry was raised by the federalists; Monroe sent Jackson, another democrat, down there to govern and make laws; the Spanish governor claimed to be a citizen of the United States because a resident of territory under control of the government; Jackson told him that Florida was not a part of the United States and that he was not a citizen of the United States.

Constitutional law was expounded. No territory has certain rights until such right have been set forth by act of congress. If it had not been for the purchase of Louisiana, Bryan would not today be a candidate for the presidency. He would not be a citizen. Nebraska being one of the states made from the territory acquired by that Louisiana purchase.

Can't Become an Emperor.

The president cannot become an emperor; he cannot have an army without congress.

If we retain the Philippines we can say "hands off" to foreign nations; if we hand down the flag—we have no longer any interest there—Japan, Germany, Russia, or back to Spain, and we would have nothing to say—could not help it.

Platforms in Apposition.

Bryan—Free trade; McKinley opposed to it.

Bryan—Free silver; McKinley opposed to it.

Bryan—Against government by injunction; McKinley favors it.

McKinley—Protection and reciprocity; Bryan opposed to it.

McKinley—Gold standard; Bryan opposed to it.

McKinley—Law and order; Bryan opposed to it. (Laughter.)

First is protection, of which there was an object lesson under Harrison's administration; the Wilson bill and the Sherman purchasing act were discussed; the senate resolution against trusts, favored by a majority of republicans, was opposed by democrats.

Mr. Ford closed with advice to voters to talk the matter over with wife, mother, sister or neighbor, and to cast vote according to dictates of conscience.

Wood's Closing Points.

In his closing argument Mr. Wood referred to ex-governor Rutwell, Justice Brewer, Carl Churz and Senator Wellington, as distinguished republicans who had left their party and were supporting Bryan. The time from Lincoln to Cleveland was referred to. The Black Friday of '73 was under grant; panic of '83 under Arthur, and that of '93, during Cleveland's time.

The prosperity of the past four years compared with that of Canada was not greater; the reason for the prosperity of both countries was the natural resources principally; demand and supply regulate it.

An amendment to a state constitution requiring an educational qualification is different from withholding the right of franchise entirely, as proposed with the Philippines.

Mr. Wood was not fearful for Aginaldo, the Filipino or that country; the danger is to ourselves; Jefferson was not attacked for violating principles of Declaration of Independence, but was attacked for violating the constitution; all these acquisitions of territory—Louisiana, Florida, Mexico and Alaska, were to be made with France, Spain, Mexico and Russia.

Editorials were read from the Oregonian referring to the "fever of the acquisition of territory in the blood of the American people" and the "ship suddenly sunk."

Bryan insisted on the ratification of the treaty. Senator Hoar himself said the treaty settled nothing. Opposition to government by injunction was explained to be simply that workmen could quit the employ of railroads when they wished, without being enjoined from so doing. Bryan does not stand for riot, nor does Rutwell or Justice Brewer.

Largest Army Plate.

CONDITIONS AT DAWSON.

Consul McCook Writes of the Reason for High Working Cost.

Washington, Nov. 2.—Consul McCook, representing the United States at Dawson City, writes of the conditions there existing:

"There should be a continued output of from fifteen to twenty millions of dollars worth of goods. If the expenses of working are reduced, the main cause for the high cost of working at present are as follows:

"1. Combination on the part of merchants and traders to keep up prices. There are in Dawson a great many people who make a business of watching the market, forming corners, and raising prices. It is not uncommon to see the price of staple articles of food double or triple in value within twenty-four hours.

"2. High cost of transportation from Skagway to Dawson or by sea and up the Yukon river to Dawson.

"3. Bad condition of the roads and consequent excessive freight rates to the mines. At times, it is absolutely impossible to take freight along the main creeks except on mule back. This prevents the moving of machinery and involves delay. The average rate of freight from Dawson to the mines during the summer, when it was lower, cost it had over twenty dollars, now from three to fifteen cents per pound, according to the distance, or from \$60 to \$100 per ton. However, the government is making roads on several of the creeks, and these will afford considerable relief.

"4. Unsatisfactory mining regulations, which cause many disputes as to title and heavy cost for settlement. This is due to having regulations more applicable to other districts, but the government is now taking steps to reform these matters.

"5. A charge of ten percent on the gross output of any claim over \$5000 per year is made. This, with the other's license, recording fees, and other government charges, prevents the working of a great many mines.

"6. There can be no doubt that gambling has done very much towards retarding the development of the country.

"7. As a large part of the ground worked must be leased, generally with steam, immense quantities of fuel are required. The bills in the neighborhood of the mines have been denuded of forests, and the cost of fuel is increasing. From \$12 to \$25 per cord is now paid for wood. The remedy for this difficulty will be in building a railroad to the principal creeks, to convey wood and coal from Dawson to the mines."

ASTORS MAKE REALTY PURCHASES.

Buy the Famous Old Stewart Mansion and Other Valuable Structures.

New York, Nov. 3.—Real estate men are interested in the rumor that a member of the Astor family has purchased the famous old Stewart mansion at Fifth avenue and Thirty-fourth street. It is said negotiations between the Stewart heir and an agent for one of the owners of the Waldorf-Astoria have been in progress for some time. The price has been agreed upon and the transfer will take place shortly. The "Marble Palace" of the late A. T. Stewart is one of the famous old houses in New York. It required several years to build and cost at least \$1,000,000, exclusive of the ground. One of the purest marbles were brought from Tuckahoe for the outer walls, while for the interior Mr. Stewart purchased marble in Italy, cut according to the directions of his architect, piece by piece, all polished and ready to set. The Manhattan club paid \$17,500 rent for the first five years it occupied the Stewart mansion. Later this was increased to \$40,000. About two years ago the club was weakened by Croker taking a majority of its members into the Democratic club, and the Stewart mansion was given up. It is directly across the street from the Waldorf-Astoria hotel, and many people say another "annes" is to be built by Mr. Astor.
