BIG POTATO CROP. Suggests a Starch Factory as a Desirable Pendleton Industry. One of the biggest potato crops ever grown in Umatilla county is now being harvested by Van Orsdall & Ross from their 120-acre field on the reservation up near the foothills. They are of the famous Oregon Burbank variety, and the yield is enormous, and of a high, well-formed and the finest specimens of this famous variety you could find anywhere. In talking with Messrs. VanOrsdall & Ross, an idea was advanced, which, if developed, would add materially to the resources of the Umatilla county farmer. The land upon which this crop was planted was in wheat last year, and was to have been summer-fallowed, for sowing this fall. When plowed in the spring it was planted to potatoes. The potatoes are plowed out and then the ground is harrowed to get the remnants. When the potato crop is in, the land is ready for sowing to wheat and in magnificent shape. If a starch factory were established in Pendleton, as it easily could be, Umatilla farmers could kill two birds with one stone, as it were, and get a handsome income from their summer-fallow. The rotation of crops will insure an additional yield. The thorough cultivation of the summer-fallow secured by the double plowing of the land will not only add to the yield but also get rid of the weeds, insuring a clean land. The East Oregonian believes this to be a big idea and one that the farmers and business men can well afford to take hold of. It would seem that the stock necessary to establish such a starch factory could be easily subscribed in Pendleton alone, if the right man took hold of it. Anyway it is worth thinking about. If Grande Ronde valley can make a sugar beet factory profitable, what's the matter with Pendleton having a starch factory? VanOrsdall & Ross harvested 16,000 sacks of potatoes and now have them on hand.

BOSTON'S BARBER REGULATIONS. Board of Health Orders Sterilization of All That Barbers Use on Customers. A special dispatch from Boston, May 5, 1900, to the New York Sun gives as new regulations of the Boston board of health as to barber shops: "Mugs, shaving brushes and razors shall be sterilized after each separate use thereof. A separate, clean towel shall be used for each person. Material to stop the flow of blood shall be used only in the powdered form, and applied on a towel. Powder puffs are prohibited. THREE BOLD ROBBERS.

HELD UP THE BRAKEMEN AND JAPANESE ON A FREIGHT TRAIN.

Escaped From the Train as It Was Ascending the Grade.

Freight train No. 23 pulled out of Pendleton at about 11 o'clock last night, on its way toward Umatilla. Just west of the Umatilla river below Pendleton, when the brakemen, V. E. Vessey and E. B. Hansen, started to make a trip over the train. They came to a flat car and saw three men with their heads bowed as though engaged in silent prayer. They asked them what they were doing there, when the three men answered, as one man and with military precision drew three revolvers from hidden recesses, and leveled them at the heads of the brakemen. The robbers then took the lanterns from the brakemen, together with \$19 and a gold watch and chain from Mr. Vessey, and \$2 from Mr. Hansen. They returned \$7 and the watch and chain to Vessey and also took compassion on Mr. Hansen and gave him his money back.

One of the robbers was low in stature and fat. He held the brakemen prisoners while the other two, who were tall, took the lanterns and entered the car just in front of the flat car, in which were seven or eight Japanese on their way to Yakum, where they were going to go to work on the O. R. & N. construction. From the Japanese the robbers secured something like \$200. The two tall robbers came back into the flat car and the two brakemen were given their lanterns and compelled to enter the car with the Japanese, after which the door was closed and fastened by the robbers from the outside, who remained on the flat car.

The train in the meantime sped merrily along, without stopping until arrival at Yakum. Here the Japs and brakemen made an investigation, but the robbers had made their disappearance. There is a heavy up grade approaching Yakum from the east, and it is presumed that the robbers got off there while the train was in motion, as the train was necessarily compelled to run slowly.

POLLING PLACES.

Information for Use of Voters on Election Day. As a general thing it is pretty well known that tomorrow will be election day. For fear that some don't know it, however, or have forgotten it, a few facts will be published to emphasize the event. Presidential elections are held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November in each year which can be evenly divided by four.

Polls will be opened at 8 o'clock a. m. and remain open until 6 o'clock p. m., except that the judges may in their discretion close the polls from 1 to 2 o'clock p. m., or a portion of that time, to partake of refreshments. The judges and clerks must remain together, like jurors in a murder case, and at no time shall more than one of them be out of the presence of the other.

If a voter is entitled to register he may do so today, without waiting for the polls to open tomorrow.

Polling places in Pendleton are as follows: East Pendleton—West hall of the court house. South Pendleton—Medernach building, corner Garden and Railroad street. Pendleton—Small building at corner of Webb and Garden streets, formerly occupied by a confectioner.

North Pendleton—Large white house diagonally across the street from Hotel Pendleton. There are only four precincts or voting places in Pendleton at present, but the county court will have to re-district the city before another general
