Evening Telegram: There are only three doubtful counties in Eastern Oregon, says United States Marshal House. These are Union, Baker and Harney. In each the republicans have an excellent show for success and may win. The democrats are equally confident and expect to be able to carry a victory. Every member is being put, neither side feeling justified in giving odds.

While apparently in good health, George Seabold, a well known traveling salesman, dropped dead in the Imperial Hotel Sunday morning. The coroner's jury found the cause of death to be heart failure. The deceased was in the employ of the Meyer Supply company, of St. Louis. He was seized by the hotel, when he was seized by the attack, and fell down dead. His son in Denver has been notified and is on his way to Portland to take charge of the remains. Deceased was 50 years old.

A disciple of McKinley, as a joke, remarked Monday that he would close up his business in Pendleton if Bryan were elected. The matter came to the attention of County Judge Hartman, and, not to be outdone, he posted a notice on the front door of the courthouse that read as follows: "The court house will be closed if McKinley is elected. The two manifestos taken together put the voters in such a position they will scarcely be able to tell how to vote."

The public schools gave a slight democratic majority. Bryan and Stevenson received 24 votes from the seventh grade, 20 votes from the eighth grade, and 22 votes from the High School, composed of 9th, 10th and 11th grades; total, 66. McKinley and Roosevelt received 20 votes from seventh grade pupils, 19 from eighth grade, and 20 from High School; total, 59. That gave Bryan and Stevenson a majority of 7. Sample ballots were used in voting and the pupils were required to mark them just like grown-up voters. Three McKinley votes were thrown out by judges in the High School because they were marked with a cross to the right of the brace where the names of the republican presidential and vice-presidential candidates appear, instead of placing the cross between the number and name of the elector for whom it was intended to vote. Had those three been counted Mr. Bryan's majority would have been reduced to four.

ELECTION DAY IN PENDLETON.

Sunday School Quietude Prevailed in Vicinity of Polls.

The vicinity of the polling places today were as quiet as though a Sunday school were in progress. Voting commenced at opening of polls at 9 o'clock and kept up in a steady stream of voters, but without any particular rush at any time. At 1 o'clock the following vote had been cast: Pendleton, 104; South Pendleton 113; North Pendleton, 192; East Pendleton, 196, total, 575.

At the June election there were 1076 voters registered, and a total of 880 cast. Moody (rep.) received 475 votes and Smith (dem.) 322. Republican plurality, 153.

It is thought that there will be more votes cast today than there were last June. The two principal reasons for this belief are: First, because there have been probably 150 votes sworn in by persons who had not registered; second, the large number of votes polled this forenoon.

Moody carried every precinct in Pendleton at the June election.

Frank Welch came in from Camas Prairie today to cast his ballot.

Indications at 3 o'clock this afternoon were that 1050 or more votes will be polled at the election today in Pendleton, votes polled at that hour were as follows: Pendleton, 163; South Pendleton, 198; East Pendleton, 233; North Pendleton, 290. Total, 884.
