GENERAL NEWS.

According to private dispatches typhus and other fevers are beginning to abate in the Russian army in Manchuria.

The population of the state of Wyoming, as officially announced by the census bureau, is 92,531, as compared with 65,708 in 1890. This is an increase of 41,823, or 72.4 per cent.

Five thousand Japanese and Chinese who have been naturalized during the past year may vote at the dominion election in British Columbia on December 7. The conservatives of Vancouver have obtained legal opinions that Japanese are all entitled to vote just as soon as their naturalization papers are made out.

The Rev. Dr. John Wesley Brown, the rector of St. Thomas' Protestant Episcopal church in New York, and one of the best known clergymen in that diocese, is dangerously ill but his family is unwilling to speak freely concerning his condition. Dr. Brown's church, which is in Fifth avenue, is a very large one, and is noted for the number of its wealthy and fashionable parishioners.

Secretary Root found it necessary some days ago to issue special instructions to Major-General MacArthur, governor-general of the Philippines, regarding the conduct of the campaign in Luzon, says a Washington dispatch to the Herald. These instructions were due to dissatisfaction over the successful operations of the Filipinos. General MacArthur's policy was to scatter the troops over a wide range of territory, extending in this way the policy initiated by General Otter. Filipino assembly in sufficiently large numbers to make vigorous assault upon American garrisons, who in some instances suffered distinct reverses.

PACIFIC NORTHWEST NEWS.

The city election took place at Junction City, and passed off quietly. The following officers were elected: J. J. Darnville, marshal; O. Starr, G. F. Skippworth and E. E. Van Brakin, councilmen.

Five families recently arrived from the Middle West have bought farms and settled in Morrow county, northwest of Heppner. They say that they are making money in the move, as they sold their old farms at \$40 an acre and have bought just as good soil at \$10 an acre, with a much better climate.

Although the University of Oregon eleven met defeat in their game at Portland last Saturday with the Multnomah clubmen, their supporters have not lost faith in their ability for final success in the return game, on Thanksgiving day. For the next two weeks the collegians have scheduled for them the hardest series of games for any team on the coast.

The auction sales of crown claims of the Klondike, which began on October 2, reopened on Nov. 5, in Dawson. This has created a great stir among the hardy miners, who have been industriously scouting about the field looking up the prize properties the queen has for sale. No one knows just what claims to be offered are blanks or which contain the hidden prizes. The claims embrace all the land owned by the government from failure in representation and other causes, and all that have been reserved as alternate properties.

M'KINLEY SWEEPS THE COUNTRY

The Electoral College Will Probably Give Him 292 Votes.

Returns Show Big Democratic Losses, Even in "Old Missouri."

Congress is Republican, at the Ratio of 200 Republicans to 140 Democrats, and Eight Independents.

Chicago, Nov. 7.—With the coming of daylight and conservative estimates of the returns of the various states there is no doubt whatever of a republican victory in the states which were thought to have a betting chance either way. McKinley's majority is so large that nothing but a clean endorsement can be figured. Bryan's standing is remarkable in Missouri, where it was expected he would run strong. This morning's figures from all parts of the state show Bryan losses all along the line. The city of St. Louis went democratic by only a thousand.

The best information now obtainable shows the next house of congress will have two hundred republicans to one hundred and forty-nine democrats and eight independents. The republicans carried both state and national tickets in Kansas and Indiana. These states were given up by the democratic chairman after midnight, while Kentucky is still claimed by both parties, Michigan, South Dakota, Nebraska and Minnesota are undoubtedly republican.

The Next Congress. Chicago, Nov. 7.—Chairman Babcock, of the republican congressional committee, said at noon today he was sure that there would be one hundred and ninety-five republicans in the next house, with seventeen democrats yet to hear from, and from these he expects to make the republican membership of the house fully two hundred, and possibly more. The gain so far is, California, 1; Idaho, 1; Nebraska, 1; New York, 7; Ohio, 1; Pennsylvania, 6; and Utah, 1.

The losses are probably one in Massachusetts, one in Missouri, one in North Carolina and probably five in Illinois.

Examiner Concedes It. San Francisco, Nov. 7.—The Examiner this morning conceded the election of McKinley, giving him the following states: California, 9; Connecticut, 6; Delaware, 3; Illinois, 24; Indiana, 15; Iowa, 13; Kansas, 10; Maine, 6; Maryland, 8; Massachusetts, 12; Michigan, 14; Minnesota, 9; Nebraska, 8; New Hampshire, 4; New Jersey, 10; New York, 36; North Dakota, 3; Ohio, 23; Oregon, 4; Pennsylvania, 32; Rhode Island, 4; South Dakota, 4; Vermont, 4; Washington, 4; West Virginia, 6; Wisconsin, 12; Wyoming, 3, total, 289.

The Latest From California.

San Francisco, Nov. 7.—The republicans claim the state by forty thousand and the democrats concede them twenty-five thousand. San Francisco gives McKinley thirty-six thousand and Bryan twenty-four thousand. Seven republican congressmen are elected in the state.

West Virginia, Too.

Parkersburg, W. Va., Nov. 7.—Indications are that McKinley has carried this state.

"Yankee Doodle" at Canton.

Canton, Nov. 7.—Ten thousand people surrounded McKinley's house at 12:30 o'clock this morning. The president on his front porch thanked the people for their call at such a late hour. The band accompanying the crowd played "Yankee Doodle." The McKinley party starts for Washington this afternoon.

Crocker Set Off Too Much.

New York, Nov. 7.—Crocker's boast to carry New York by 80,000 dwindles to 27,114. The state gave republican by 153,380. McKinley came to the line with 179,500. The legislature is overwhelmingly republican. Crocker telegraphed Bryan his condolences.

Barry and West Republicans.

Baltimore, Nov. 7.—This state is republican by 14,000 as shown by the returns.

Republicans Claim Kentucky.

Louisville, Nov. 7.—The republican committee at noon today claims that for governor Yerkes will win in the coming counties by five thousand and be elected.

Gain Victory in Kentucky.

Louisville, Nov. 7.—At 11 o'clock today the republicans claim that Yerkes, for governor, has undoubtedly carried the state by fifteen hundred. The democrats contest these figures. They will carry all but the Fifth, Eleventh and perhaps the Ninth congressional districts.

By 60,000 in Ohio.

Columbus, Nov. 7.—McKinley carries Ohio by 60,000 votes over Bryan, an increase of 10,000 over his plurality in 1896.

Triumphant in Indiana.

Indianapolis, Nov. 7.—McKinley's plurality in this state is placed at 28,000 to 20,000. The republicans probably will have eleven out of the thirteen congressmen.

Missouri is Democratic.

St. Louis, Nov. 7.—Bryan's plurality is reduced from 58,000 to about 40,000, while Flory, republican for governor, is believed to be 15,000 behind Dockery, the democratic candidate.

Kansas is Republican.

Topeka, Kan., Nov. 7.—There is no doubt that the republicans have carried Kansas for both the national and state tickets.

Missouri Congressmen.

St. Louis, Nov. 7.—The following democratic congressmen are re-elected: Cowherd, Fifth district; Clark, Ninth; Gooney, Seventh; Lloyd, First; Cockran, Fourth.

the presidency, his first question was concerning the legislature. The race between Foynter, fusionist for governor and Dietrich, republican, is very close. Still another sorrow for Bryan is the blow dealt his friend Pettigrew, of South Dakota, who is defeated.

Bryan Feels Badly.

Lincoln, Nov. 7.—Bryan cannot conceal his feelings. He looks disappointed and acts that part. He breakfasted at 9 o'clock and stated he had enjoyed a full night's rest. He pronounced a public statement as soon as he analyzed the vote. He is out to the quick over the negative position of his townspeople. It is predicted he will not remain long in Lincoln. At 10:30 o'clock the state manager informed him that the Nebraska legislature was safely fusion. The contest is close, however.

ENGLISHMEN ARE PLEASED.

London Papers Jubilant Over the Death of 16 to 1.

London, Nov. 7.—The morning and afternoon papers here declare that sixteen to one has been forever killed by Bryan's defeat and are jubilant in consequence, thus expressing the pleasure of a great majority of Englishmen at the result of the election in the United States.

Jones is Surprised.

Chicago, Nov. 7.—Chairman Jones expresses himself as greatly surprised at the result of the election. I attribute Bryan's defeat to a fear of business disarrangement and disturbance. The future of the democratic party is not discouraging, as in the last one hundred years it has suffered many defeats and a single addition to the score will not materially affect it. As to Roosevelt's presence on the ticket Jones said he had figured Roosevelt as a liability, rather than an asset, but admitted all his calculations have been wrong.

THE RESULT IN OREGON.

The Plurality for the Republican Candidates About 16,000.

Portland, Nov. 7.—Oregon gave McKinley the largest plurality ever given a candidate for office in the state. With more than half the total vote in the state counted the result is as follows: McKinley 27,129, Bryan 17,030. McKinley's plurality 10,099.

Multnomah county which includes the city of Portland with four small precincts missing gave McKinley a plurality of 5459 and it is estimated the state outside this county will return a plurality of nearly 9000, making McKinley's plurality in the state close to 15,000. McKinley has carried every county in the state with the exception of Linn, Union and Baker. In this county John McDraken, republican, was elected a member of the legislature to fill the vacancy caused by the death of A. J. Knott.

Portland—127 precincts out of 772 in Oregon including city of Portland gave McKinley 15,278, Bryan 8755. This is approximately one-fourth of the vote of the state.

Portland—The city of Portland complete gave McKinley 8674, Bryan 3855. McKinley's plurality is 4819.

Only Four Counties Democratic.

Portland, Nov. 7.—The republicans claim Oregon by 15,000; the democrats make no claims, completely abandoning, explaining their vote didn't come out. The republicans carry all but four counties.
