Mr. Allen remarked today to a political friend: "That fire was all right last night, but do you know, that furniture belonged to me. I never thought of it at the time." The friend replied that he was only sorry that they hadn't thrown Mr. Marshall's desk in, too, for he was the ringleader in the foraging for fuel.

RECEIVING ELECTION RETURNS.

COUNCIL ROOM WAS CROWDED UNTIL AFTER MIDNIGHT.

A Cold Stuffed Emory Hung to a Telegraph Pole.

At 6:30 o'clock last evening news commenced to come in over the wires from the east, and the means of filling the council rooms, where a Western Union instrument had been placed with Homer H. Hallock at the key. The republicans were in best of humor from the start, for the returns all indicated big republican gains, inspiring the election of McKinley and Roosevelt.

In the office of the Pendleton Savings bank large numbers gathered also, and returns were received and disseminated for the pleasure of republicans. W. J. Farnish, a republican elector, kept close to the returns as they came in from Umatilla county particularly, and the state at large, which early showed a republican landslide. Carter & Bailey's office upstairs in the Pendleton Savings bank was the headquarters for democrats early in the evening, but the returns were not of that character as to either outcome or the spirit of the people, as these present dispersed to join the other crowds where they could enjoy themselves watching the republicans have a good time.

Ed C. Allen's saloon was also a place at which a crowd gathered. The returns were brought in as soon as received at the telegraph office and were read by Billy Bogart, then transferred to the blackboard by Dean Hull.

Both at the council room and Allen's, cartoons were exhibited, the work of Fred H. Drake, the follower of Davenport and other celebrities. One of these cartoons was shown at the council rooms, representing Mr. Bryan as the persecutor of democracy, sprawling on the ground, crushed beneath a full dinner pail. Another, at Ed Allen's, showed Mr. Bryan making a quick jump into a cyclone collar, offering the words, "So soon," as he did so. This indicated that he was surprised at the "swiftness" of the result of McKinley's election being made known, but that he was prepared for the shock.

At midnight the republicans built a big bonfire in the middle of the street at corner of Main and Court, and they held high revel for the rest of the night. They were dispensing this morning the property of appointing an auditing committee to pay for wood and other things which the boys "raided" to assist in making a hot time in the old town.

Crowded for McKinley.

J. W. Kimbrell, a lifelong republican, had a blackbreasted game hantam rooster on exhibition in the front window of the council rooms this morning, which put in the greater portion of its time strutting around and crowing for McKinley. Mr. Kimbrell said he had raised it to do that, and it wouldn't crow for Bryan under any consideration.

One Election Day Arrest.

James B. Hartley was arrested by Marshal Heatman Tuesday afternoon for illegal voting. He had gone to Pendleton precinct polling place, corner of Webb and Garden, and cast his ballot, stating that he had not been in the state six months, but that he was a resident of the United States, a native-born citizen. The judges allowed him to vote. When the facts became known, that the young man had not misrepresented things, but had voted with the consent of the judges because they and he thought he was entitled to do so, he was released upon the advice of District Attorney T. G. Halley.

An Effigy.

Swinging in the breeze this morning from the telegraph pole in front of the Wessel department store, Main and Court streets, was an effigy. It could not be said that it represented Bryan, democracy, or anything else in particular. It was just a plain cold stuffed effigy of something that looked like a big bloated sausage with stubby arms and legs. It attracted attention and provoked merriment from hundreds of passersby, and remained there nearly all of today.

UMATILLA IS REPUBLICAN.

McKinley and Roosevelt Will Have Probably a Plurality of 400.

There are a number of small precincts in Umatilla county still to be heard from, but the returns already in, as shown by the table appearing in these columns, makes it apparent that Umatilla county has given McKinley and Roosevelt a plurality of 400. The four precincts in Pendleton gave them 215 plurality, while in 1896 the same precincts gave McKinley and Hobart from 40 to 43, the election not counting the same number of votes.

Late Figures.

Complete returns from 26 of the 34 precincts in Umatilla county give the McKinley electors an average vote of 1733 and the Bryan electors an average vote of 1285. The vote of the remaining eight precincts will not materially change McKinley's plurality.

Furnish and Pierce.

W. J. Farnish, republican candidate for elector, and W. M. Pierce, democratic candidate for elector, each led his respective ticket in Umatilla county, where they both reside.

RESULT IN WALLA WALLA.

Jacob Betz Probably Defeated for the State Senate.

Walla Walla, Nov. 7.—Incomplete returns for Walla Walla county show that the entire republican ticket, with the possible exception of Betz, is elected and that Frink will carry a good majority as well as the national ticket. Judge Bronte will probably poll the largest vote, with Myers for second place and Kees, Arnold and possibly McLean following close. For the strictly local officers Glasgow for justice of the peace will win with ease, but the race will be close between Goodwin and Billman for constable.

Bryan Carried Baker County.

Baker City, Nov. 7.—Seventeen precincts out of 27 in Baker county give Bryan a majority of 29. The county is conceded to him by less than 100.

Bryan's Plurality in Baker.

Baker City, Nov. 7.—Bryan's plurality in Baker county will be about 130. A few small precincts are still to be heard from.

Harney Also for Bryan.

Baker City, Nov. 7.—Five precincts out of 18 in Harney county give McKinley a majority of 20. The strongly democratic portion of the county is still to be heard from, which justifies the assertion that Harney is for Bryan by a small majority.
